All which Addresses his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Constantinople, Aug. 14. 1714. The Swedish Envoy M. Groothuysen arrived here the 2d of this Month, and a few Days after had a Conference with the Grand Vizier, who began the Discourse by telling him, that his King having formerly declared at three several Times an Intention to go back to his own Dominions, and soon after changed his Mind, it was to be doubted whether his present Disposition to depart were better fixed and sure to have Effect. The Envoy answered, that his Swedish Majesty was now absolutely determined, and therefore earnestly desired the Sultan's Leave, and to be furnished by the Port with what was necessary for his Journey. The Vizier, to prevent the de-

manding of Money, said, that whenever the King would set out, the Port would furnish him with Horses, Carriages, and Provisions; the Sultan, notwithstanding the Laws forbid Musselmen to help Christians with Money, having out of peculiar Regard to his Swedish Majesty's Person already supplied him sufficiently. To which the Envoy replied, that the King had commanded him to solicit a Sum, but not to use over-much Importunity for obtaining it. The 10th M. Groothuysen was admitted to an Audience of the Grand Signior. The 13th a general Council was held in the Vizier's House, at which the Principal Ecclesiasticks, with the Civil and Military Officers, assisted. The Vizier acquainted them with what he had transacted, to the Advantage of the Port, with the Czar and with Poland; and that the King of Sweden had asked Permission to leave this Country and to return home through Hungary: That he (the Vizier) had sent for M. Fleischman the Emperor's Resident, and demanded whether the Emperor would let the King of Sweden pass freely through his Dominions; and that the Resident had assured him his Imperial Majesty would, as well because he was in Amity with that Prince, as more especially because he would gladly in this Instance oblige the Port, and that he the said Resident would be answerable for the Event. Hereupon the Council were unanimous for his Swedish Majesty's being allowed to depart, seeing the Emperor's Minister had given such positive Assurances that free Passage would be granted him. So to Morrow M. Groothuysen will be admitted to an Audience of Leave of the Sultan, and in two or three Days will be dispatched with a Letter to the King his Master; in which Letter it will be signified that his Majesty may depend upon being furnished with Horses, Carriages, and Provisions necessary for the Journey; and it is very probable a Sum of Money will be added. The 12th arrived here General Poniatowski, who went lately to Deux-ponts, and from thence returned to Demir-toca, whither 'tis suppos'd he will go back with M. Groothuysen. The Port has fixed the 4th of

of September, O. S. for the King of Sweden's Departure, if nothing intervene that may occasion a turtl or Delay. Two Capighi-Bashtas, some Chiauxes, and a certain Number of Janisaries, are to attend his Majesty to the Frontiers of the Emperor's Territories. The Ambassador of Poland is to have his Audience of Leave of the Sultan the 17th Instant; and the Russian Ministers expect theirs in a little time.

Vienna Sep. 29. N. S. Letters from Constantinople of the 25th past relate, that Baron Schapfiroff was on his Departure from thence, with his Collegues the Czar's Ambassadors, the Limit between the Russian and Ottoman Empires having been settled to the mutual Satisfaction of the Port and of his Czarian Majesty. The same Letters confirming the King of Sweden's Resolution to leave Turkey very soon, the Emperor has nominated two Lieutenant-Generals, the Counts d'Althan and de Wilzeck to receive and compliment his Majesty on the Frontiers of Transylvania, and thence to accompany him with a Guard of 300 Men: But that Prince having not yet signify'd what time he proposes to arrive in Transylvania, those Generals forbear going thither, 'till certain Advice comes, of his having actually set out: In the mean while M. Bourghard Secretary of War is dispatched to the Count de Stainville, Governour of Transylvania, with Instructions touching the Honours to be paid to his Swedish Majesty in his Passage.

Genoa, October 2. N. S. The 30th past arrived here his Majesty's Ships Rumney and Kinsale, which came with the King and Queen of Sicily to Villa-Franca. The same Afternoon arrived here the Spanish Gallies, accompanied by those of this Republick, with the new Queen of Spain. Her Majesty landing, was conducted to S. Pietro d'Arana, where a Palace was fitted up, and provided for her Reception but the Day before, it not being known sooner that she designed to touch here. She was so Sick in coming from Sestri, tho' it be but thirty Miles from thence hither, and the Sea was not rough, that she is resolv'd to proceed for Spain by Land.

Paris October 13. N. S. The Advices from Barcelona of the 18th past import, that when the last Assault was made the 11th, divers Priests and Monks of the Place signalized themselves, especially one named Don Antonio, who was killed in the Breach, and being extremely lamented by the Inhabitants, his Body was sought out, and Interred the 12th with great Solemnity. The Be-

sieged would have disputed every Foot of Ground, and maintained their Intrenchments behind the Breaches much better, had they not been attacked when they least expected it, for they did not imagine the Assault would have been given before the Mines were sprung. They shew'd the utmost Resolution however in recovering the Bastion of St. Peter, and in contending to keep it, as well as in other Actions of that Day, which cost them four of their chief Leaders killed, and three (viz. the Marquis de Villbroel Dalmau and Romana) wounded. The 12th at Noon they surrendered, after their Deputies (who went out the Evening before) had with the greatest Difficulty been brought to submit their Privileges to the King's Discretion, upon promise of having their Lives spared, and that they should not be plundered. The Marshal Berwick has since caused the People to be disarm'd, and three Decrees to be Published, by which he has dissolved the Deputation, the Military Arm, and the Magistracy or City-Corporation; substituting in their room fifteen Persons devoted to the Court, who proceed in their Administration by new Rules. Cardona, the only fortified Place left in the Possession of the Catalonians, has surrendered on the same Conditions as Barcelona. Thirty five Battalions of French are to remain in Catalonia to keep the People in awe, till the Laws and Forms of Government of Castile be introduced, and established in that Province. The Marshal Berwick, for his many eminent Services to the Crown of Spain, has had a Yearly Pension of 100000 Livres settled upon him by his Catholick Majesty.

Hamburg, October 9. N. S. Letters from Petersbourg relate, that the Czar made his Entry there the 20th past with great Magnificence, being attended to the Place of landing by the Gallies, and other Vessels which he took from the Swedes: They add, that after the Entry his Czarian Majesty being in full Council, was saluted with the Title of Vice-Admiral, for the Services in which he distinguished himself personally this Campaign by Sea; and having accepted that Character, he will act in it when he goes to Sea again. His Czarian Majesty treats his Swedish Prisoner Rear-Admiral Ehrenschild with great Generosity and Kindness, causing him to be lodged in his own Palace. The Russian Fleet is returned to Cranflot. 'Tis advis'd from Warsaw, that the King of Poland arrived there the 22d of last Month; and that his Majesty has judg'd it necessary for his Service, to send Order to the Saxon-Troops, who were actually on their March out of the Kingdom, to halt. The Swedish Troops in Pomerania are increased to a considerable Body. The Court of Berlin (as our last Letters from thence say) being inform'd that 19 Squadrons, and 14 Battalions of Hessians, with the Swedes lately come into the Country from Deux-ponts, design'd to pass over the Prussian Territories to Pomerania, General Natznar is sent to the Frontiers with 15 Regiments of that King's Troops to observe their Motions. Dispositions are likewise made in the Electorate of Hanover, upon the same Occasion. 'Tis advis'd from Copenhagen, that the King of Denmark will shortly return to Holstein, to be nearer at Hand to oppose the Swedes in Pomerania, in case they make any attempt upon the arrival of their King. We have also Advice from other Parts, that divers great Potentates design to write jointly to his Swedish Majesty, as soon as he has left Turkey, to exhort him to consent to the setting a Negotiation on Foot, for terminating the War in the North.

Brussels,

Brussels, October 13. N. S. M. Van der Duffen, Gockinga, Geldermalsen, and the Count de Rechteren, Deputies from the States-General of the United Provinces, for regulating the Barrier and Commerce in the Spanish Netherlands, arrived the 1st of this Month at Antwerp. Baron Heemes, the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary at the Hague, came to Antwerp at the same time, in order to confer with Count Konigseck. Deputies from the several Provinces of the Spanish Netherlands repaired thither likewise, pursuant to the circular Letter sent to the States of each Province by that Count, and having delivered Memorials to him, concerning the Interests of their respective Provinces, are since returned home. The 4th the first Conference was held in the Town-House at Antwerp, between the Imperial and Dutch Plenipotentiaries. The 5th they met again, and on the 6th had a third Conference; which ended, Count Konigseck dispatched an Express to Vienna, and the States Deputies sent another to the Hague.

Hague, October 12. N. S. The 4th Instant the Ratifications of the Treaty of Peace and Commerce between the Crown of Spain and this Republick, were Exchanged at the Earl of Strafford's House, by the Duke d'Osuna, and the Marquis de Monteleon on the one Part, and the Baron de Renswoude on the other; the French Ambassador, the Marquis de Chateaufeuf, being likewise present. The same Day M. Klinggraff, the Brunswick Resident, was with the Earl of Strafford, to inform his Excellency, that the Princess of Wales proposed to set out from Hanover the 9th instant, and to arrive here the 17th; before which time 'tis expected the Yachts will be returned on this side to take on Board her Royal Highness. The Marquis de Monteleon having received Orders to go to the Court of Great Britain, in Quality of Ambassador Extraordinary, and Plenipotentiary of the King of Spain, set out Yesterday Morning for Utrecht, designing to proceed from thence to England by the way of Calais.
