Groothuysen arrived here the 2d of this Month, and a few Days after had a Conference with the Grand Vizier, who began the Discourse by telling him, that his King having formerly declared at three several Times an Intention to go back to his own Dominions, and foon after changed his Mind, it was to be doubted whether his present Disposition to depart were better fixed and fure to have Effeet. The Envoy answered, that his Swedish Majetty was now absolutely determined, and therefore earnestly desired
