The following Address was prefented to His Majesty by the Reverend Dr. Stanbope, Dean of Canterbury, by Order of his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury; introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Archbishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacon and Clergy of the Diocefe of Canterbury.

May it please your most Sacred Majesty,

W E your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, do beg Leave most bumbly and heartily to comgratulate your Majesty's safe Arrival in this Kingdom, which hath at length given you to the impatient Desires of all your People, and brought to your faithful Clergy, in particular, unspeakable Comfort and Satisfaction.

The Grief which so fensibly wounded our Hearts, for the Death of our late most prouts, must gracious, and upon all Accounts most defervedly dear Soverrign, must have been insupportable, but for the Prospect of a successfur, in whom we hope to see her Virtues still surviving, and our Happiness perpetuated. One whom we rejoice to find alred. dy inheriting not her Dominions only, but her People's Hearts; whose undisturbed Accession to a distant Throne hath scattered our very Fears of Danger, and is a happy Pledge of united Affections, long Tranquility, and chearful Obedience, under an Administration begun with so unanimous and universal Joy.

In your tried Valour, and Prudence, and Zeal for the Protestant Interest, this Church and State, great Six, intirely confide, for the continuance of their religious and civil Rights; for Justice, Protection, and Safety at home, and for the Advancement of their Honour and Prosperity abroad.

In your numerous and Royal Progeny (which we most earnessly beseech God to prosper and increase) you have brought us an additional Security, with which these Kingdoms have been long unacquainted; even Childrens Children, who after your Majesty shall have very many Years lived, and reigned (as we pray God you may) a Biessing to the present Age,
