Turin, October 6. N. Vienna, October 13 N. S. Advices from Constantine-ple by the way of Transilvania tell us, that the Muscovite Ministers having settled all Matters to the Satisfaction of the Port, had liberty to return to the Czar their Master; that part of their Equipage was sent away, and that they intended to let out themselves soon after their Audience of Leave from the Grand Signor; and the freshest Letters from Constantinople, which are of the 21st and 22d of September say, that the Ministers of Poland having finished their Negetiation, went from the Turkish Court the 8th of that Month, and that on the 11th -those of Muscovy departed likewise, being dismissed with great Civilities, having 290 Horses, with a suitable number of Waggons, allowed them for the Carriage of their Baggage and Retinue. These Letters confirm the Execution of the late Prince of Wallachia, with his four Sons and Sons in-Law, and his Wife's Brother, that they were beheaded the 26th of August before the Seraglio, in the Presence of the Sultan himself; that their Bodies were publickly exposed all that Day, and the next they were thrown into the Sea. The News of the Death of the late Queen of Great Britain was come to the Port, and as the lame time that of the quiet Accession of his pre-fent Majesty to the Throne of that Kingdom. We hear that the British and French Merchants in Turkey had furnished the King of Sweden with forty thousand Dollars, to enable him to profecute his Journey, the Sums he had received from the Port not being sufficient to answer his Majesty's present Occasions. Swekholm, October 2. N. S. We find no likelyhood of continuing the Conferences about Peace with the Muscovite General Trobetskey, fince the Senare have no Orders from the King to proceed in that Negotia ion. The 18th of last Month in the Evening King Stanislaus's Confort arrived here to take her Leave of the Royal Family, and return'd the 25th in the Afternoon towards Carlscrone in order to embark for Pomerania, During her stay here she was entertained with all the Marks of Royalty; the Queen Mother, and the Princes, Royal, made her great Presents, and she had in Money and Bills from the Treasury very considerable Sums towards defraying the Charges of her Journey to Deux Ponts. We had heard that so much Snow was fallen in East Bothnia, and those parts, that we were in hopes the Muscovite Galleys would retire towards Abo; but the 26th past an Express arrived from a small Town in Lapmark called Uma on the West fide of the Bothnick Gulf, with an Account that the Muscovites had appeared thereabout with their Galleys, and landed fome Troops on an Island in the middle of the Gulf; there were some Apprehensions of a Design to make a Descent on the Continent, but as that Country is very barren, and the Winter Season so near, it is believed the Muscovites can make no Stay. However this Alarm may occasion the Troops keeping the Field somewhat longer, which were otherwise ordered to march to Winter-quarters. vices from our Squadrons at Sea tell us, that they suffered no small Inconveniencies by continuing so long on Duty.
