All which Addresses his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Turin, Octob. 3. N. S. The King and Queen being returned from Sicily, and on the Road to this Capital, were met the 1st Instant at Carignan by our Magistrates in a Body, and by the Governor the Marquis de Carail, and the same Day they made their Entry into this City. Their Majesties and the Princes their Sons were in a Travelling Coach, the Duchesse Dowager

with the Princes and Princesses of the Blood were in another, followed by the Ladies, Officers and Gentlemen of their Majesties Household and Retinue in several Coaches, a Detachment of the Horse Guards closing the March. The Governor having come back hither before them, stood ready at the Gate to present the Keys to the King. At their Majesties entrance the Cannon on the Ramparts were discharged; and as they pass'd thro' the Square of St. Charles, the Burghers who were drawn up in two Lines, fired their Musquets, as did the two Battalions of Hachbret and the Regiment of Schulembourg, which were posted in the Square before the Cathedral; where their Majesty's alighting, were received at the Door of the Church by the Clergy, Nobility, and others of Distinction: Their Majesties going up to the High Altar, the Choir Sung the *Te Deum* to Musick, the Artillery firing a second time: Their Majesties having received the Benediction of the Vicar-General, (who Officiated in chief, the Archbishop being dead) and having performed their Devotions in a Chappel of the Cathedral, proceeded to the Court: The Cannon gave a third Salvo at their entering the Palace, where they were received and complimented by all the Ladies in the great Hall of the Swiss Guards, and by the Magistrates and Senate in the State Room; and then their Majesties being fatigued retir'd from Company. It having rained continually for several Days past till this Morning, the Nobility have been hindred from making a Cavalcade as they designed in Honour of their Majesties; the Rain has likewise prevented the finishing a Triumphal Arch, and the playing of a Firework. This Court have revived the Ceremonial that was observed here before the last War, according to which the Knights of the Order, the Ministers of State, and the Captains of the Guards, with the Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber, when in waiting, are the only Persons allowed to enter the Chambers of the King and Queen, all others being obliged to keep in the Anti-chambers and State Rooms. The Count de Wartlin is left Governour of Messina, and the Marquis d'Andourne Governour of Palermo. The Commodore of the British Ships of War which were of the Convoy that came with their Majesties from Sicily to Villa-franca, being come hither with two other Officers of those Ships, the King has made him a Present of his Picture set with Diamonds, and presented the other Officers in proportion; the Queen has likewise been very liberal in her Acknowledgments to them.

Turin, October 6. N. S. Since the Arrival of the King and Queen, the Confluence of the Nobility and Ladies at Court has been very great, and they have appeared in the utmost Magnificence of Dress and Equipage: The Queen has had a Circle every Evening, at which the King has been present; but yesterday the Court went into Mourning again for the Death of the Queen of Great Britain. The Deputies of divers Towns of Savoy and Piemont, who came hither to Congratulate the King and Queen on their Arrival, set out on their return yesterday; as did likewise most of the Gentlemen who came hither on the same Occasion, and have no Employment at Court. The Weather being settled fair, and a Triumphal-Arch representing the Temple of Glory being finished, all the Houses of the City began to be illuminated last Night; and this will be continued every Night to the 7th, when the said Arch will be illuminated with several thousand Lights, and the Firework erected before the Town-House will be let off. The Company of Sicilian Life-Guards, form'd entirely of Gentlemen of that Kingdom, chosen out of the best Families, some of which bear the Title of Princes, is expected here very soon, the greatest part of them being actually arriv'd at Coni. The new Battalion of Sicilians, with the Swiss Guards, and those of the Palace, which are already arriv'd in this Country from Sicily, are likewise expected in a few Days.
