*Venice, October 20. N. S.* The 17th of this Month arrived a Vessel from Cattaro, with Letters from Constantinople, the freshest Dates of which are on the 23d of August, and give an Account, that the Rebellion of some Bashaws in Asia was grown very formidable; that certain Officers having been sent from Constantinople, with Orders to endeavour to work upon the Rebels, either by Threats or Promises, to lay down their Arms, were so far from being regarded, that the Rebels in a Rage seized them, with some whom they had prevailed on to submit to the Porte, cut off their Noses and Ears, and sent them back to Constantinople. At the same time they sent to demand the Heads of the Grand Vizier and of several Officers his Creatures, accusing him of having put to Death for no Cause, and merely upon Suggestions of private Malice, a great Number of the Sultan's good Subjects and of being accessory to the Death of Sultan Ibrahim. The Grand Vizier sent aboard the Gallies those who came back from Asia so maulated, least the Sight of them should have excited some Tumult. At the same time he ordered a Number of Janisaries to pass over into Asia, and sent to the Bashaws of the Neighbouring Provinces to draw together all their Troops, and march against the Rebels.

*Hambourg Nov 2. N. S.* The Duke Administrator of Holstein and the Count de Welling have received Letters, the first from his Minister M. Fabricius, the other from the Swedish Chamberlain Muller, written from Demotica, and brought hither by an Express: These Letters are dated the 30th of September, and relate, that

the Sultan's Present to the King of Sweden, of 11 Horses, a Sabre, and a Magnificent Tent, being arrived, his Majesty had determined to begin his Journey the 1st of October, instead of the 4th, which he had before fixed for the Day of his Departure. That the said M. Fabricius would accompany his Majesty till he had passed the Danube, and then would go Post to Vienna, and there wait for his Majesty: That the Swedish Troops from Bender commanded by General Sparre, which we are informed do not exceed 500 Men, are to join the King near Tergovista in Walachia, and then proceed to Hermanstad in Transylvania, where their further March will be regulated: That the King had caused his Compliments to be made to the Emperor for his obliging Offers, in relation to his Passage through his Dominions, offering on his Part to take that Route which his Imperial Majesty shall advise him to be the safest: That his Majesty had also returned Thanks to the Emperor, for the Civilities shewn to King Stanislaus in his Passage through the Imperial Territories, assuring him that his Majesty looked upon them as if done to himself: That his Majesty had asked 500 Purfes of the Porte, who offered him but 100, which his Majesty declined accepting, and borrowed at Constantinople 40000 Crowns of the English Merchants, and 20000 of the French. The Duke of Mecklenbourg-Swerin is gone to meet the King of Sweden, and is said to have taken with him Remittances for considerable Sums which he designs to present to his Majesty. The Marriage of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel with the Princess Royal of Sweden, is thought to be intirely agreed; and that 'tis in Consideration of this Match, that the Landgrave of Hesse has entered into Engagements with his Swedish Majesty. The Count de Welling and his Son-in Law M. Barrier Counsellor of Holstein, went from hence Yesterday Morning very early for Harbourg, without taking leave of any Person, the Count only leaving on his Table a Letter sealed for his Secretary, directing him whither to follow him with all his Domesticks and Baggage: This Secrecy is used that the Danes may not know which way the said Count takes: 'Tis supposed he is gone to Stralsund, there to wait the Arrival of the King his Master; or to Deux ponts, or to the Court of Cassel, at both which Places 'tis not doubted that King will call in his Passage to Pomerania. We have Letters from Constantinople of the 27th of September which relate, that the Execution of Constantine Kasraba (who had govern'd Walachia 26 Years in the Quality of Hospodar or Prince) with his four Sons, who were all his Male Descendants, was for the following Crimes, viz. that he had Corresponded with the Enemies of the Porte, that he had been the Occasion of the Irruption which the Czar made into Moldavia, that during his Administration he had treated the Grand Signior's Subjects with great Violence and Injustice, extracting from them intolerable Contributions and that having purchased divers Castles and Estates in Transylvania, he had remitted the rest of his Money to Venice and elsewhere. These Letters add that the said Execution will serve for an Example to the Greeks, who at this time have the Government of the Provinces of Moldavia and Wallachia. In the mean while, the Turks were hardly ever known to talk so publicly, and with so great Freedom as they do now against their own Court, and particularly against the present Grand Vizier.

*Warsaw, October 24. N.
