St. James's, November 15. The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the County of Oxon, in beh^d of themselves and their People; presented to his Majesty by Mr. John Troughon, Minister at Wulfesley, who had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Murray; presented to his Majesty by Alexander Grant, Esq, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Aldermen, Burgesses and Inhabitants of the Borough and Corporation of Liverpoole in the County Palatine of Lancaster; presented to his Majesty by John Ward, Esq and other Gentlemen of the said County, who had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Aylesford, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Capital Burgesses and Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Wootton-Basset in the County of Wilts; presented to his Majesty by the Honourable George St. John, Esq; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Pembroke, Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Wilts.

An humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in the County of Southampton, on behalf of themselves and their respective Congregations; presented to his Majesty by Mr. Browne, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Wharton, Lord Privy Seal.

An humble Address from the University of Edinburgh; presented to his Majesty by Mr. Carstairs, Principal of the said University, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address from the Synod of Aberdeen; presented to his Majesty by Mr. David Anderson, Professor of Divinity in King's College in Aberdeen, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address from the Town of Brixton; presented to his Majesty by Dr. Graham, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address from the Presbytery of Dunbarton; presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Derby; and also of the Grand-Jury at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held at Chesterfield in a Court for the said County on the 5th Day of October last; presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Steward of his Majesty's Household.

All which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Vienna, Nov. 7. N. S. Letters from Piresti in Wallachia of the 21st past relate, that the King of Sweden was arrived there, having avoided passing through the Capital Town of that Province; and that General Sparr with his Troops from Bender was expected in 4 or 5 Days. His Majesty had determined not to enter the Emperor's Territories, till he had received an Answer from the Holstein Envoy M. Fabricius, whom he had sent before to make some Proposition to this Court; which Answer having been dispatched to his Majesty, 'tis reckoned he will enter Transylvania about the middle of this Month. These Letters confirm, that before his Swedish Majesty's Departure from Demotica, his Envoy M. Groot-huyken desired to borrow of the Port, in his Master's Name, 3 or 400 Purfes of 500 Crowns each, which the Port refused, yet offered his Majesty 100 Purfes as a farewell Gift; but notwithstanding his Wants, his Majesty answered, that the Port having refused him the Loan he asked, he would not accept any Present in Money. The Swedish Colonel Daldorff, and the Com-mandary Wolters, who came hither from Hambourg about 3 Weeks ago, with design to proceed and meet the King their Master, being informed that their meeting him in Transylvania or Hungary would be very uncertain,

he fled to set out yesterday for Prague, and if he does not come that way, to go on to Pomerania. Sunday last being the Feast of St. Charles, whose Name the Emperor bears, it was celebrated by this Court, in Honour of his Imperial Majesty, with all Magnificence. In the Morning the Emperor and Empress, accompanied by all the Nobility, the Ministers, and other principal Persons of the Court, in very splendid Habits, went in Cavalcade to the Cathedral of St. Stephen, where a solemn Service was performed, in annual Commemoration of the Image of the blessed Virgin of Boz, being (as is reported) seen to shed Tears that Day in the Year 1696 which Image was placed in publick view on the High Altar. Their Majesty's returning to the Palace dined in publick, and Supped in the like manner; there was a very great Appearance at Court on this Occasion, and the Company was entertained with Consorts of Musick. On the same Day Count Palfi, the new Palatine of Hungary, treated at Presbourg the Stares of that Kingdom, who to the number of 300 and upwards, were placed at 5 Tables.

Hambourg, Nov. 13. N. S. Letters from Stockholm of the 3d of this Month advise, that the House of Count Oxenstiern was fitting up for the Reception of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel: But his Highness was not expected there till after the King's safe Arrival in his Dominions. Count Welling is arrived at Stralund: That Count having passed through the Territories of Mecklenbourg attended by a Guard, gave Occasion for a Rumour that it was King Stanislaus. The Consort of that King with his Mother and Daughter, have passed through Demitz incognito, in their way to Deux ponts. 'Tis said the King of Poland has ordered 10000 Men to file towards the Frontiers of Hesse, to observe the Motions of that Landgrave's Troops.

Madrid, Nov. 4. N. S. Yesterday Morning the Marshal Duke of Berwick set out from hence to return to the Court of France, after having made a Cession in the legal Forms of the Duchies of Liria and Gerica, situate in the Kingdom of Valencia, to his eldest Son who is called Earl of Tynmouth; which Duchies were granted to him by the King in 1707 after the Battle of Almanza, and the Reduction of the said Kingdom. Upon Advice from Antibes, that as the Queen's Journeys were regulated she may be expected here about the 10th of December, a Courier has been dispatched to her Majesty's Household, with which the Duke de Medina Celi is come back from Alicant to Almanza, to order them to proceed through the Kingdom of Valencia, and by Saragossa to Pampelona; and 'tis said the King will go to Guadalaxara to meet her. This City had proposed to give a Tournament and a Bull-Feast on occasion of the Royal Marriage, but it has been signified by the Court, that all Demonstrations of Joy which the City shall think fit to make will be acceptable, excepting only the Bull-Feast. Prince Tserelaes de Tilly being appointed General Governor of Catalonia, set out from Saragossa with his Consort and Family; but at Lerida a Courier overtook him with express Orders to suspend his further Progress: Whereupon he dispatched a Messenger to Court, with some Representation relating as 'tis supposed to his said Government, in Answer to which the Court sent back an Order to him to proceed to Barcelona, where 'tis reckoned he might arrive the 28th of last Month. 'Tis reported that secret Orders were sent to him at the same time, upon which he is to consult and Act in Concert with the Chevalier d'Asfelt who Commands the French Troops in that Province. The People of Catalonia continue quiet, but have remonstrated that 'tis impossible for them to pay the additional Contributions which the Court has caused to be demanded of them, alleging that their Country is ruined, which is not believed
