

St. James's, November 19. The following Address from the City of Dublin, was presented to his Majesty by John Eccles Esq; one of the Aldermen of the said City; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, at an Assembly held at the Tholsell of the said City on the third Day of November. 1714.

**W**E humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your happy Accession to the Crown of these Realms, with Hearts filled, on this glorious Occasion, with such an unspeakable Joy as will be better testified by our Duty and Obedience, than 'tis in the Power of Words to declare; your Majesty's Loyal Subjects of this City being highly affected with that Esteem for your Person and Government which is due from a grateful People to the consummate Wisdom, Justice, and Experience of the greatest and best of Princes.

When we consider that the Protestant Interest of Europe is strengthened, our Fears of Popery and Arbitrary Power dispelled, and our Liberties secured to us upon so firm and lasting a Foundation, by your peaceable Accession to the Crown, we cannot sufficiently admire that Providence which accomplished it, nor do Honour enough to the Memory of that Prince, who settled the Crown in your Royal Family.

We of this City early felt the happy Effects of it, when our Civil Liberties were invaded, our Endeavours to defend them traduced as factious, and our Persons and Reputations exposed to the Insults and Reproaches of the vilest of the People; when the Administration of Justice in this City had been for many Months suspended, and we (for want of Magistrates) reduced to a State of Confusion by the unaccountable Administration of some Men, who made it a Merit to oppress us; in this Extremity your Majesty's Royal Justice relieved us.

May your Majesty long live to enjoy the Reward that is due to those who vindicate the Cause of the Oppressed, and after many, very many Years, may your Memory be transmitted to Posterity under the glorious Character of having been a Father of your People, a Terror to your Enemies, and the Support of the Protestant Interest of all Europe; and may these Kingdoms ever want one of your Royal Progeny to rule and govern them. In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be herewith affixed.

Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously; and at the same time conferred the Honour of Knighthood upon Alderman Eccles.

his Majesty by the Lord Bishop of Peterburgh, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Bishop with the Clergy attending him had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

An humble Address of the Provost, Burgesses, and other Gentlemen, Inhabitants of the Corporation of Strahan in the County of Tyrone, and Kingdom of Ireland; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff Justices of the Peace, and Gentlemen of the County of Fermanagh; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Common-Council, Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Liverpool in the County Palatine of Lancaster; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable James Earl of Derby, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotularum of the said County, attended by several Gentlemen Free of the said Corporation.

All which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Stockholm, Octob. 30. N. S. The King's Orders relating to the Taxes, and the furnishing Men for the Regiments which are directed to be made compleat, have not yet been published by the Regency; 'tis thought that they may expect his Majesty's further Pleasure upon his Arrival in Germany; because these two Articles seem to be very disagreeable to the whole Kingdom in their present Circumstances, it was resolved some time since to melt down a considerable Number of Brass Canon, which were taken by Justavus Adolphus, and the two last Kings of Sweden in their several Wars, in order to coin them into Plates, which is a sort of Money current here for Rixdollars. But the King not approving that these Trophies of his Royal Ancestors should be destroyed, a stop has been put to this Work, and the Canon which were not already split were carried back into the Arsenal. However there is about 80000 Rixdollars of this Coin struck. The King has given strict Order for remitting a considerable Sum of Money to Hamburg forthwith, to be ready for his Majesty's Service when he comes into Germany. This Remittance will be very difficult, especially since the Bank here, which used to be the Resource on all such Emergencies, is at present very low in Credit. General Taube has not yet adjusted with the Magistrates the Settlement of the Winter Quarters for the Troops which were designed to lodge in this Town next Winter, the Burghers refusing to receive above 1600 Men, Foot Forces. The late Chancellor Count Oxenstierna's House is sitting up for the Reception of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse Cassel, tho' 'tis said that he is not expected here till next Spring. The French Resident presented lately a Memorial in his Master's Name, demanding Satisfaction for all the Ships and Effects of the French Subjects, which have been seized and confiscated, for offering to go to the Ports in the Baltick now in the Possession of the Czar. The 23d being the Birth-Day of the Queen Grand-mother, on which she entered into the 79th Year-of her Age, her Majesty received the usual Compliments upon this Occasion.
