Which we are more effectally bound to do, as we are immediately under your Majefly's most gracious Protection, being Members of a Society. founded and continually favoured by your Majefly's Royal Progenitors.

Conflaintimople Ofl 7. O. S. The Apprehentions of a Rupture between this Court and the Republick of Venice have been renewed here, upon the Port's cauling the Roads and Bridges to be repaired in the Country about Salonichi and Lariffa, the creating Magazines of Provifions and Ammunition there and at Negropont, (for transporting part of which Stores from hence feveral Veffels are employed) the ordering the Turkilh Merchant Ships which use the Trade to Egypt to be here this Winter, and the fending Orders for the Removal of nine or ten Chambers of Janifaries from Choczin to Neagropont. Upon these Grounds 'tis conjectured, that the Sultan's Defign is to attack the Morea the next Spring: The' fome fay the Grand Vizier is againft a Rupture, and think the Port will hardly venture upon a War at this Juncture.

Venice, November 17. N. S. Letters from our Fleet give an Account, that Signior Delfino Providetore-General, has taken a View of the Iflands belongaing to this Republick, and that he is alfo taking a View of the Toyvns and Forts, in order to the providing them with all things neceffary for their Defence, in cafe they should be attacked. The extraordinary Preparations of the Turks by Sea and Land render this Precaution neceffary; the rather becaufe they are making great Magazines in divers Places of Romelia, Thefaly and Negropont. Men are kept at Work in our Arfenal with all poffible Diligence, to finish feveral Ships of War of the Line which are on the Stocks. The Officers of the Land Forces are raising Recruits.

cers of the Land Forces are raifing Recruits. Stockholm, November 13. 'Tis advifed from Carelfcroon, that 5 or 6 Ships of the squadron commanded by Admiral Watrang were come in thither to refit, has ving received much Damage in the late Tempefluous Weather; but that Admiral with five Men of War continues Cruiting between Riga, Revel, and Gotland. The Squadron under Vice-Admiral Lillie continues fill in its former Station, off Orgrund in the Bothnick Gulph, and is ordered to remain there as long as the Frofts will permit, to prevent any Attempt which the Enemy might make to land on that Coaft: The laft Letters from the faid Squadron fay, that by reafon of the late ftormy Weather, they had not been able to get any certain Intelligence whether there be full any Mufcovite Troops on the Ifle of Aland & not. General Meyerfeldt is not yst fet out for Pomerania, becaufe there is hitherto no Advice of his Majefty's being come into Germany: Tho the

the Meeting which that General had laft Week with the liefly finding himfelf well enough, appeared abroad in principal Burghers of this City, in order to difpole them to advance immediately 50000 Rixdollars for the King's urgent Oscafions, had not the defired Effect; yet upon a publick Declaration made laft Sunday by the Princefs and the Senate, that wheever would forthwith pay in fuch a Sum as they might themfelves compute their next Years Contributions will amount to, would not only at this Juncture do most acceptable Service to his Majefty, but should likewife be allowed an half per Cent. per Month till the time prefcribed by the King for the laft Payment of the faid Years Taxes, a great many both of the Nobility and Burghers have actually this Week advanced their Contributions, and particularly the Countels Piper paid 2000 Rix-Dollars. The Princels and Senate have also this Week published a Placart, to make known what Funds are by the King's express Command appropriated to the use of the Bank; and Affurances are given in his Majefty's Name, that be the Straits of the Government never fo great, none of those Funds, nor any Mony in the Bank, shall ever hereafter be touch-ed. The Regiment of Dalcarlia is now come hither, to that with the Guards there are at prefent upwards of 3000 Men Quartered in this City. Vienna, November 21. N. S. The 16th Inftant fix

Hamburg, November 30. N. S. Letters from Stralfund give the following Particulars of the King of Sweden's coming thither. His Majesty having secretly left his Retinue in Walachia, took his way Post by Vienna and Caff l, accompanied only by Lieutenant Colonel Duringh and two Servants. At Caffel he eat in a Publick Ordimary at the Common Table, where among others was a Swedish Colonel named Hagge, who did not discover the King in his Disguise, but at his Majesty's Request procured from the Landgrave a Paſsport for himſelf and Compations as Swedith Couriers: The Landgrave on that Occafion asked the Colonel whether the King of Sweden was not one of them, it being rumoured that his Majesty would make his Journey incognito; the Colo-nel answered that he was not, and that he knew his Majefty well: The King, without feeing the Landgrave, purfued his Journey by Zell and Hanover, and fo by Danebourg, Demith, Guftrou and Tribbefer, to Stralfund, where he arrived the 22d Inftant two Hours before Day-light. His Majefty went to General Ducker's House, and then laid afide his fad-coloured Coat, and black Periwig, which he had worn to difguife himfelf on the Road. He was obliged to have his Boots cut off, his Legs being fwelled with riding fo great a Journey in Fifteen Days: And one of his Legs being hurt likewife by a Fall from his Horfe, a Surgeon was called to drefs it. The next Day his Ma-

a blue Suit, which has been his conftant Habit. Wis Majefty holds frequent Conferences with the Generals Welling and Ducker, who are reported to have diffe-rent Sentiments; the first being faid to advife the King to flay at Stralfund, and thence to difpatch Orders frequently to Sweden; while the other is of Opinion, that his Majefty would do better to pass over to his Kingdom, and inform himfelf of the true State of Affairs there, that he may take proper Measures on the Spot for reforming all Abufes that may have crept into the Administration, and give Orders for covering the Country from all Attempts of the Mufcovites during this Winter-Seafon ; which done, his Majefty may return to Pomeranis when all is ready for acting on this fide. Tho'it be not known yet what Determination his Majefty will take, it appears most likely, that he will flay in his German Provinces, because General Lieben, who on the 24th was difpatched to Stockholm, to acquaint the Court and Senate with his Majesty's Arrival, carried Orders with him for the fpeedy Transportation of 4000 Horse from Schonen to Pomerania, with which, and the 3000 already there, and the Foot making 17 or 18000 Men, itis fuppofed his Swedifh Majefty will think himfelf ftrong enough to march to Holftein.

Copenhagen December 1. N. S. In the Night between the 27th and 28th of last Month, an Express arrived here from the Danish Refident at Hambourg, with Ad-vice that a Courier from Count Van der Nath was come thisher, bringing an Account of the King of Sweden's Arrival at Strahund on the 22d paft. This News was immediately difatched to the King, who went the 27th to Fredericksberg and returned hither the 29th, a Day fooner than otherwise he intended to have done. Ge-neral Dewitz is appointed to go as his Majefty's first Plenipotentiary to the Congress at Brunswick, and is ordered at the fame time to have ready his Equipage for the Army, that he may be able to ferve in either Character, as occasion may require; and 'tis likely he will go first to the Army. An Express arrived last Night, with Advice, that after feveral Counc Is of War held at Stralfund, the King of Sweden had refolved to move towards Holftein, and to begin his March in a few Days; and that the Duke of Mecklenbourg has ordered Stores of Provisions to be got together in his Country for the ule of the Swedish Army.

Hambourg, Dec. 4. N. S. Our Advices from Suf-fund tell us, that the King of Sweden paffes the Norn-ings in Conferences, and the Afternoons in reviewing his Troops. The Dutchy of Pomerania has granted him a free Gift of 100000 Crowns. The Swedish Regiments are to be Recruited and new Cloathed. On the 28th past, his Majesty was at Grypswelde to take a Review of one of his Regiments which is quartered there, and at his return passed over into the life of Rugen on the like Busincis. As foon as the News of the King of Sweden's Arrival reached the Court of Denmark, Orders were dispatched to the Generals who command in Holftein, to put that Dutchy and that of. Bremen into a State of Defence, and to get the Magazines well stored : His Danish Majesty is expected in Holftein the end of this Week. 'Tis advised from Dreiden, that the Landgrave of Heffe Caff ; being informed it was apprehended in Saxony that after the Arrival of the King of Sweden he would lend his Troops to his Majefty to be employed in making an Invation into that Electorate, and that Orders were thereupon given to fome Saxon Troops to file towards the Frontiers with a Train of Artillery for defending the Paffages; his Highnels has written to affure the Regency of that Electorate, that there is no caule for any fuch Apprehentions, and that

he is far from having the leaft Thought of engaging in ningfeck upon a Difpute arifen between an Affair fo prejudicial to the Peace of the Empire. Those of Liese and those of Limbourge These Advices from Dresden add, that the King of Poland was expected there from Warfaw, but that the concerning fome Duties of Transito levied certain time of his coming was not known.

Liege, Nov. 20. N. S. Count Wells, the Imperial Minister, having called together the States of this Principality the 28th Instant, notified to them Testerday, that the Emperor his Master did then Reinstate the Elector of Cologn Prince of Liege in the Poffeffion of all the Territories of Liege and of the County of Loos, purfuant to the Treaties of Peace. Whereupon the Privy Council appointed by the faid Prince, confitting of feven Perfons who were all of his Privy Council when he retired from this City, affembled for the first time to take the Administration into their Hands. This done, Count Wells took leave of the Dutch Governor of the Citadel, and to Morrow he fers out for Bruilels, thence to proceed by Antwerp to the Hague.

Hague, Dec. 7. N.S. The 5th Inftant the States of Holland and Weltfrifeland began their ordinary Aflembly here, upon which it was expected that the Nomination of the Ambafladors of this Republick to the King of Great-Britain would have been made Yefterday, but we do not hear that it is yet done. The faid States bave under Deliberation, the Diminution of the Taxes which during the late War were laid upon the Lands of this Province. Monfieur Rigoine is come hither from France, to take care of the Interests of the House of Chaalons, in relation to the Succession of the late King William as Prince of Orange, and has prefented a Me-morial to the States-General on that Subject. Count Wells, who has refided during the late War as Stadholder on the Part of the Emperor at Liege, is expected here in a few Days, and will after a flort Stay fet out from hence for Vienna. The Earl of Strafford is gone to Utrecht and Amsterdam, and is expected back here in a Day or two. The French Forces employed on the Canal and Port of Mardyke, are newly reinforced with fix Regiments from the Frontiers of Germa ny. 'Tis solvifed from Italy, that the Venetians are arming by Sea and Land, for the Defence of the Morea, if the great Preparations of War which are making by the Turks should be imployed against that Country; and that the Knights of Malta are providing with all Dili-gence for the Defence of their Island, in cafe the Turks fhould turn their Armsupon them. Letters from Vienna of the 24th pait, give an Account of the Lord Cobham and Mr. Secietary Stanhepe's Arrival there the 22d.

Bruffels, Dec. 8. N. S. General Cadogan arrived here three Days ago from Antwerp, and affifted Yefterday and this Morning at the Conferences usually held on the ordinary Affairs of the Spanish Nether-Count Koningfeck, the Imperial bergh. lands. Plenipotentiary, is also expected this Evening from Antwerp. The Emperor having religned the Administration of Liege, and absolved the States of that Country and the Chapter from their Oath of Fidelity to him, Count Wells who was Admini-Atrator there in his Imperial Majesty's Name, Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Se-is arrived here : The Occasion of his pas-rrell. Master of the Correspondence fing this way, is to confer with Count Ko-

those of Liege and those of Limbourg, by the latter on the Merchandies of the former, which Diff rence Count Wells is charged to adjust. M Pesters, Interdant for the States General at 1pres, is come hither by Order from his Principals, to affift their M nifter in the Conferences here: He is likewife directed to furnish the Dutch Deputies at Antwerp with fuch Informations as they shall defire of him relating to the District under his Direction.

Hague, Dec. 11. N. S. The 8th Inftant Baron Heims the Imperial Minister was in Conference with the Deputies of the States-General, on the Affair of the Barri r, and is faid to have demanded the immediate Evacuation of the Towns and Provinces of Luxembourg and Limbourg to the Imperial Troops, which were ready to take Possession of them. Count Rechteren, and M. Geldermalsen, two of their Highmightineffes Deputies at Antwerp for fettling the Barrier, are expected from thence in a Day or two. M. Stockum, Refident of the King of Denmark, has communicated to feveral of the foreign Minifters and to the chief Members of the State, the Treaty concluded between the Duke Administrator of Holstein and Coun Steinbock, upon the admission of that General with the Swedish Army into the Town of Tonninguen; the Original of which Ireaty was found by the Danes when they took that Town, and is now at Corenhagen. The Nomination of the Ambasiadors of this Republick to the King of Great-Britain, has been put off to the 14th or 15th Instant.
