THE following Address was presented to his Majesty by Dr. William Daws the President, and the Fellows of the College of Physicians, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household.

To the KING's most excellent Majesty,

The Humble Address of the President, and College of Physicians, London.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE the President, Elects, Censors, Fellows and other Members of your Majesty's Royal College of Physicians, most humbly beg Leave, that among the rest of your loyal Subjects, We may, with Hearts full of Joy and Duty, present ourselves to your sacred Majesty, to congratulate your most auspicious and peaceable Accession to the imperial Crown of these Kingdoms.

Which we are more especially bound to do, as we are immediately under your Majesty's most gracious Protection, being Members of a Society, founded and continually favoured by your Majesty's Royal Progenitors.

Our Society had the Honour to be established about Two hundred Years ago, by your Majesty's Royal Predecessor King Henry the Eighth of Glorious Memory, for the better regulating the Practice of Physick in these great Cities where the Royal Family, the Nobility, and principal Gentry of the Nation do usually reside. And as our learned Predecessors, deservedly Famous throughout all Europe for their great Discoveries and Improvements in Physick, have in their several Ages abundantly acquitted themselves of the great Trust reposed in them, so we assure your Majesty, that it shall be our utmost Endeavour to tread in their Steps, and if possible, to exceed the great Example they have set us.

Your Majesty is a Prince of that consummate Wisdom Magnanimity and Goodness, that we doubt not but your Majesty will favour and protect a Society so useful to the Publick; and as it indispensably our Duty, we shall be ever ambitious to express the highest Regard to your Majesty's sacred Person and the most constant and steady Zeal for your Majesty's Service and Government.

May your Reign over us be long, prosperous, and glorious; Victory the inseparable Attendant of your Arms; May his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, with your Crown inherit your Virtues, and this People never want a continued Succession of Monarchs, descended from your Royal Loins, to fill the British Throne.

An humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the several Denominations in the County of

Wilts, in the Name of themselves and their respective Congregations; presented to his Majesty by Dr. Edmund Calamy, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Vice-Chamberlain.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of-Clare; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

Both which Addresses his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Constantinople Oct. 7. O. S. The Apprehensions of a Rupture between this Court and the Republick of Venice have been renewed here, upon the Port's causing the Roads and Bridges to be repaired in the Country about Salonichi and Larissa, the erecting Magazines of Provisions and Ammunition there and at Negropont, (for transporting part of which Stores from hence several Vessels are employed) the ordering the Turkish Merchant Ships which use the Trade to Ægypt to be here this Winter, and the sending Orders for the Removal of nine or ten Chambers of Janisaries from Choczin to Negropont. Upon these Grounds 'tis conjectured, that the Sultan's Design is to attack the Morea the next Spring: Tho' some say the Grand Vizier is against a Rupture, and think the Port will hardly venture upon a War at this Juncture.

Venice, November 17. N. S. Letters from our Fleet give an Account, that Signior Delfino Providetore General, has taken a View of the Islands belonging to this Republick, and that he is also taking a View of the Towns and Forts, in order to the providing them with all things necessary for their Defence, in case they should be attacked. The extraordinary Preparations of the Turks by Sea and Land render this Precaution necessary; the rather because they are making great Magazines in divers Places of Romelia, Thessaly and Negropont. Men are kept at Work in our Arsenal with all possible Diligence, to finish several Ships of War of the Line which are on the Stocks. The Officers of the Land Forces are raising Recruits.

Stockholm, November 13. 'Tis advised from Careless-croon, that 5 or 6 Ships of the Squadron commanded by Admiral Watrang were come in thither to refit, having received much Damage in the late Tempestuous Weather; but that Admiral with five Men of War continues Cruising between Riga, Revel, and Gotland. The Squadron under Vice-Admiral Lillie continues still in its former Station, off Orgrund in the Bothnick Gulph, and is ordered to remain there as long as the Frosts will permit, to prevent any Attempt which the Enemy might make to land on that Coast: The last Letters from the said Squadron say, that by reason of the late stormy Weather, they had not been able to get any certain Intelligence whether there be still any Muscovite Troops on the Isle of Aland or not. General Meyerfeldt is not yet set out for Pomerania, because there is hitherto no Advice of his Majesty's being come into Germany: Tho' the

the Meeting which that General had last Week with the principal Burghers of this City, in order to dispose them to advance immediately 50000 Rixdollars for the King's urgent Occasions, had not the desired Effect; yet upon a publick Declaration made last Sunday by the Princess and the Senate, that whoever would forthwith pay in such a Sum as they might themselves compute their next Years Contributions will amount to, would not only at this Juncture do most acceptable Service to his Majesty, but should likewise be allowed an half *per Cent.* *per Month* till the time prescribed by the King for the last Payment of the said Years Taxes, a great many both of the Nobility and Burghers have actually this Week advanced their Contributions, and particularly the Countess Piper paid 2000 Rix-Dollars. So 'tis reckoned that when General Meyerfeldt goes over, he may carry Remittances with him for 100000 Crowns. The Princess and Senate have also this Week published a Placart, to make known what Funds are by the King's express Command appropriated to the use of the Bank; and Assurances are given in his Majesty's Name, that be the Straits of the Government never so great, none of those Funds, nor any Money in the Bank, shall ever hereafter be touched. The Regiment of Dalmatia is now come hither, so that with the Guards there are at present upwards of 3000 Men Quartered in this City.

Vienna, November 21. N. S. The 16th Instant six Swedish Gentlemen came to the Post-house in this City and having staid only while they could change their Horses, proceeded immediately on their Journey. M. Sternhoek has made all the Inquiry he could, and by the Descriptions of their Persons, thinks it very probable the King was among them; which is the general Opinion here, but as yet no body knows it with any Certainty. We have certain Advice, that 300 of his Swedish Majesty's Soldiers are come to Cronstat in Transylvania, and are to be followed by about 1000 more, who are to march in the like Bodies, and to follow one another at proper Intervals for their better Subsistence, according to the Route settled for them. Mr. Jefferies the British Minister, designs to set out from hence the 23d Instant, in order to repair to his Swedish Majesty in Pomerania, or where-ever else he shall first appear in Publick.

Hamburg, November 30. N. S. Letters from Stralsund give the following Particulars of the King of Sweden's coming thither. His Majesty having secretly left his Retinue in Walachia, took his way Post by Vienna and Cassel, accompanied only by Lieutenant Colonel Duringh and two Servants. At Cassel he eat in a Publick Ordinary at the Common Table, where among others was a Swedish Colonel named Hagge, who did not discover the King in his Disguise, but at his Majesty's Request procured from the Landgrave a Passport for himself and Companions as Swedish Couriers: The Landgrave on that Occasion asked the Colonel whether the King of Sweden was not one of them, it being rumoured that his Majesty would make his Journey *incognito*; the Colonel answered that he was not, and that he knew his Majesty well: The King, without seeing the Landgrave, pursued his Journey by Zell and Hanover, and so by Danebourg, Demith, Gustrou and Tribbeler, to Stralsund, where he arrived the 22d Instant two Hours before Day-light. His Majesty went to General Ducker's House, and then laid aside his sad-coloured Coat, and black Periwig, which he had worn to disguise himself on the Road. He was obliged to have his Boots cut off, his Legs being swelled with riding so great a Journey in Fifteen Days: And one of his Legs being hurt likewise by a Fall from his Horse, a Surgeon was called to dress it. The next Day his Ma-

jefty finding himself well enough, appeared abroad in a blue Suit, which has been his constant Habit. His Majesty holds frequent Conferences with the Generals Welling and Ducker, who are reported to have different Sentiments; the first being said to advise the King to stay at Stralsund, and thence to dispatch Orders frequently to Sweden; while the other is of Opinion, that his Majesty would do better to pass over to his Kingdom, and inform himself of the true State of Affairs there, that he may take proper Measures on the Spot for reforming all Abuses that may have crept into the Administration, and give Orders for covering the Country from all Attempts of the Muscovites during this Winter-Season; which done, his Majesty may return to Pomerania when all is ready for acting on this side. Tho' it be not known yet what Determination his Majesty will take, it appears most likely, that he will stay in his German Provinces, because General Lieben, who on the 24th was dispatched to Stockholm, to acquaint the Court and Senate with his Majesty's Arrival, carried Orders with him for the speedy Transportation of 4000 Horse from Schonen to Pomerania, with which, and the 3000 already there, and the Foot making 17 or 18000 Men, 'tis supposed his Swedish Majesty will think himself strong enough to march to Holstein.

Copenhagen December 1. N. S. In the Night between the 27th and 28th of last Month, an Express arrived here from the Danish Resident at Hambourg, with Advice that a Courier from Count Van der Nath was come thither, bringing an Account of the King of Sweden's Arrival at Stralsund on the 22d *pass.* This News was immediately dispatched to the King, who went the 27th to Fredericksberg and returned hither the 29th, a Day sooner than otherwise he intended to have done. General Dewitz is appointed to go as his Majesty's first Plenipotentiary to the Congress at Brunswick, and is ordered at the same time to have ready his Equipage for the Army, that he may be able to serve in either Character, as occasion may require; and 'tis likely he will go first to the Army. An Express arrived last Night, with Advice, that after several Councils of War held at Stralsund, the King of Sweden had resolved to move towards Holstein, and to begin his March in a few Days; and that the Duke of Mecklenbourg has ordered Stores of Provisions to be got together in his Country for the use of the Swedish Army.

Hambourg, Dec. 4. N. S. Our Advices from Stralsund tell us, that the King of Sweden passes the Mornings in Conferences, and the Afternoons in reviewing his Troops. The Duchy of Pomerania has granted him a free Gift of 100000 Crowns. The Swedish Regiments are to be Recruited and new Cloathed. On the 28th *pass.* his Majesty was at Grypswalde to take a Review of one of his Regiments which is quartered there, and at his return passed over into the Isle of Rugen on the like Business. As soon as the News of the King of Sweden's Arrival reached the Court of Denmark, Orders were dispatched to the Generals who command in Holstein, to put that Duchy and that of Bremen into a State of Defence, and to get the Magazines well stored: His Danish Majesty is expected in Holstein the end of this Week. 'Tis advised from Dresden, that the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, being informed it was apprehended in Saxony that after the Arrival of the King of Sweden he would lend his Troops to his Majesty to be employed in making an Invasion into that Electorate, and that Orders were thereupon given to some Saxon Troops to file towards the Frontiers with a Train of Artillery for defending the Passages; his Highness has written to assure the Regency of that Electorate, that there is no cause for any such Apprehensions, and that he

he is far from having the least Thought of engaging in an Affair so prejudicial to the Peace of the Empire. These Advices from Dresden add, that the King of Poland was expected there from Warsaw, but that the certain time of his coming was not known.

Liege, Nov. 30. N. S. Count Wells, the Imperial Minister, having called together the States of this Principality the 28th Instant, notified to them Yesterday, that the Emperor his Master did then Reinstate the Elector of Cologne Prince of Liege in the Possession of all the Territories of Liege and of the County of Loos, pursuant to the Treaties of Peace. Whereupon the Privy Council appointed by the said Prince, consisting of seven Persons who were all of his Privy Council when he retired from this City, assembled for the first time to take the Administration into their Hands. This done, Count Wells took leave of the Dutch Governor of the Citadel, and to Morrow he sets out for Brussels, thence to proceed by Antwerp to the Hague.

Hague, Dec. 7. N. S. The 5th Instant the States of Holland and Westfriseland began their ordinary Assembly here, upon which it was expected that the Nomination of the Ambassadors of this Republick to the King of Great-Britain would have been made Yesterday, but we do not hear that it is yet done. The said States have under Deliberation, the Diminution of the Taxes which during the late War were laid upon the Lands of this Province. Monsieur Rigoine is come hither from France, to take care of the Interests of the House of Chaulons, in relation to the Succession of the late King William as Prince of Orange, and has presented a Memorial to the States-General on that Subject. Count Wells, who has resided during the late War as Stadholder on the Part of the Emperor at Liege, is expected here in a few Days, and will after a short Stay set out from hence for Vienna. The Earl of Strafford is gone to Utrecht and Amsterdam, and is expected back here in a Day or two. The French Forces employed on the Canal and Port of Mardyke, are newly reinforced with six Regiments from the Frontiers of Germany. 'Tis advised from Italy, that the Venetians are arming by Sea and Land, for the Defence of the Morea, if the great Preparations of War which are making by the Turks should be employed against that Country; and that the Knights of Malta are providing with all Diligence for the Defence of their Island, in case the Turks should turn their Arms upon them. Letters from Vienna of the 24th past, give an Account of the Lord Cobham and Mr. Secretary Stanhope's Arrival there the 22d.

Brussels, Dec. 8. N. S. General Cadogan arrived here three Days ago from Antwerp, and assisted Yesterday and this Morning at the Conferences usually held on the ordinary Affairs of the Spanish Netherlands. Count Koningseck, the Imperial Plenipotentiary, is also expected this Evening from Antwerp. The Emperor having resigned the Administration of Liege, and absolved the States of that Country and the Chapter from their Oath of Fidelity to him, Count Wells who was Administrator there in his Imperial Majesty's Name, is arrived here; The Occasion of his passing this way, is to confer with Count Ko-

ningseck upon a Dispute arisen between those of Liege and those of Limbourg, concerning some Duties of Transito levied by the latter on the Merchandises of the former, which Difference Count Wells is charged to adjust. M. Pesters, Interdant for the States General at Ipsres, is come hither by Order from his Principals, to assist their Minister in the Conferences here: He is likewise directed to furnish the Dutch Deputies at Antwerp with such Informations as they shall desire of him relating to the District under his Direction.

Hague, Dec. 11. N. S. The 8th Instant Baron Heims the Imperial Minister was in Conference with the Deputies of the States-General, on the Affair of the Barrier, and is said to have demanded the immediate Evacuation of the Towns and Provinces of Luxembourg and Limbourg to the Imperial Troops, which were ready to take Possession of them. Count Rechteren, and M. Geldermalsen, two of their Highmightinesses Deputies at Antwerp for settling the Barrier, are expected from thence in a Day or two. M. Stockum, Resident of the King of Denmark, has communicated to several of the foreign Ministers and to the chief Members of this State, the Treaty concluded between the Duke Administrator of Holstein and Count Steinbock, upon the admission of that General with the Swedish Army into the Town of Tonninguen; the Original of which Treaty was found by the Danes when they took that Town, and is now at Copenhagen. The Nomination of the Ambassadors of this Republick to the King of Great-Britain, has been put off to the 14th or 15th Instant.

St. James's November 29. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint his Grace Charles Duke of Bolton, to be Warden and Keeper of the New Forrest in the County of Southampton, and of the Duckoy there, and of the Mannor and Park of Lindhurst, and the Hundred of Rudbergh.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Collonel William Southwell to be Captain of the Company of Foot-Guards armed with Battel-axes, who are to attend the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland as his Guard.

St. James's, Nov. 30. This Day Monsieur Bonet de St. Germain, Resident from the King of Prussia, delivered his Credential Letter to his Majesty at a private Audience. He was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, December 3. Dr. John Shadwell was Sworn Physician in Ordinary to his Majesty on the 15th of October, and on that Occasion had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.
