Stockholm, Nov. 20. O. S. The 18th an Express came hither from Carlscrona, with Letters of the 14th Instant from Lieutenant General Lieven, which brought an Account that on the 11th, the Day before that General left Stralsund, the King of Sweden arrived at that Place. The said General has only by this Express sent the Senate a short Letter from his Majesty, ordering only some Pages, Footmen, and Cooks, to be forthwith dispatched over to him; but he writes that he has also Letters with him from the King to the Queen Grandmother and to the Princess, but as he designed to set out from Carlscrona the next Morning after the Express came away, he was desirous of having the Honour to deliver them with his own Hands. This unexpected News of the King's so sudden Arrival in his own Territories, causes inexpressible Joy among all sorts of People. General Meyerfeldt sets out from hence to Day, in order to go over to attend the King at Stralsund. Private Letters which came by the forementioned Express from Carlscrona relate, that immediately upon General Lieven's Arrival there, a Frigate called the White Eagle was ordered to sail for Pommerania

to fetch over the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel, who was expected at Stralsund the 16th Instant. By Yesterday and to Days Posts, circular Letters are sent to the Governours of the several Provinces of this Kingdom, to order Thanks to be given to God in all Churches for his Majesty's safe Return.

Copenhagen, Decemb. 8. N. S. Orders are given for some Regiments to reinforce those which are already in the Posts near the Rivers Trave, Steckenitz, and Bille, to guard the Passage into Holstein; and all the Troops which are in that Duchy, have Orders to advance to the same Posts in Case of Necessity. Orders are also given for the Regiments which are in Jutland to march to Holstein. Five Men of War are fitting out, to join two which are at Sea and form a small Squadron to cruise in these Parts. General Dewitz set out from hence two Days ago: He is to be the King's first Plenipotentiary at the Congress at Brunfwick; but before he goes thither, he is to proceed to Berlin about some Negotiation with that Court. 'Tis supposed, that if the King of Sweden marches to attack the Danish Army in Holstein, General Dewitz will return immediately to his Post in the Army. 'Tis said the King will go into Holstein as soon as the Troops are all drawn together there, but this is not as yet certain: Since the Duke Administrator of Holstein declares himself openly an Enemy to this Court, it has been resolved to take Possession of his Bishoprick of Eutin,

Hambourg, Dec. 18. N. S. The Preparations of War are continued at Berlin. A good Number of Cannon, with Bombs and Bullets, are already drawn out of the Arsenal there: 20 Battallions and 10 Squadrons are actually on the March, and like Orders are sent to other Regiments: Count Dohna, General of Foot, and the Lieutenant-Generals Natfmar and Finck, are nominated to command this Body of Forces: The Prince of Anhalt-Deslau is to be Generalissimo; but if the King puts himself at the Head of them, as is believed, that Prince will accompany His Majesty, as a Volunteer: All the Prussian Officers have received express Orders to repair to their respective Regiments, on pain of being cashiered: 'Tis thought these Forces will have their general Rendezvous appointed in the Neighbourhood of Stetin. The King of Sweden continues at Stralsund, where the Hereditary-Prince of Hesse Cassel was expected some Days ago: M. de Croissy, Brother of the Marquis de Torcy, is also expected there, in the Quality of Envoy from the King of France. Count Flemming being appointed by the King of Poland to be his Plenipotentiary at the Congress at Brunfwick, is arrived from Warsaw at Dresden in his Way thither. Yesterday General Dewitz set out from hence for the Court of Berlin. The Danes have taken Possession of the Bishoprick of Eutin, and the Danish Resident here has communicated to all the other Ministers the Reasons which have induced the King his Master to that Proceeding. Baron Eofander, Quarter-Master-General in the Service of the King of Sweden, is arrived at Berlin, and has made some Propositions on the Part of his Swedish Majesty to the King of Prussia.

Ratisbon, December 10. N. S. The Envoy of Denmark has, by Order from his Court, communicated here the Copy of the Treaty between the Duke Administrator of Holstein and Count Steinbeck, for admitting the Swedish Troops into Tonningen. The Conferences for the Evacuation of Bavaria are still continued at Munich, and the Bavarian Forces will halt about Strasbourg, till some Points are settled with the Congress at Hainbron, and will then march to the Upper Palatinate, where the Elector Palatine's Troops remain without making the least Preparation yet for retiring.

Hague, Dec. 21. N. S. The 12th Instant M. Heym, one of the Directors of the Revenues of this Province, and Deputy from the City of Delft, died suddenly in the Assembly



Assembly of the States of Holland: The 15th those States having dispatched the Affairs that were, before them, separated till after Christmas. The Earl of Albemarle, having taken Leave of the States General, set out the 17th for Tourney, of which Place he is Governor, designing after he has settled some Affairs there, to go over to England. Count Effren-Minister of the Elector Palatine, having received the necessary Orders which he expected from his Court, will embark with the first fair Wind for England; to congratulate the King on his Accession to the Throne; We hear likewise, that the Marquis Ranuccini, Envoy of the Duke of Tuscany at the Palatine Court, has received Orders to go over to England for the same Purpose.
