**W** Hereas We have thought fit by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Dissolve this present Parliament which now stands prorogued to Thursday the Thirteenth Day of this Instant January. We do for that End Publish this Our Royal Proclamation and do hereby Dissolve the said Parliament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and the Knights Citizens and Burgesses, and Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are Discharged from their Meeting on Thursday the said Thirteenth Day of this Instant January. And We being Resolved to Meet Our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, Do hereby make known to all Our Loving Subjects, That we will Speedily Call a New Parliament.

For the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue, and for the Preventing and Punishing of Vice, Prophanities, and Immorality.

**W** E most seriously and Religiously Considering, That it is an Indispensible Duty on Us, to be Careful above all other things to Preserve and Advance the Honour and Service of Almighty God and to Discourage and Suppress all Vice, Prophanities, Debauchery and Immorality which are so highly Displeasing to God so great a Reproach to our Religion and Government, and (by means of the frequent ill Examples of the Practices thereof) have so Fatal a Tendency to the Corruption of many of Our Loving Subjects otherwise Religiously and Virtuously Disposed and which (if not timely Remitted) may justly draw down the Divine Vengeance on Us and Our Kingdoms: We also humbly acknowledge That we cannot expect the Blessing and Goodness of Almighty God (by whom Kings Reign) and on which we entirely rely, to make Our Reign Happy and Prosperous to Our Self and Our People, without a Religious Observance

of God's Holy Laws: To the Intent therefore that Religion, Piety and Good Manners may (according to Our most Heartly Desire) Flourish and Increase under Our Administration and Government. We have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby Declare Our Royal Purpose and Resolution to Discountenance and Punish all manner of Vice, Prophanities and Immorality in all Persons of whatsoever Degree or Quality within this Our Realm and particularly in such as are Imployed near Our Royal Person; and that for the greater Encouragement of Religion and Morality, we will upon all Occasions, Distinguish Persons of Piety and Virtue by Marks of Our Royal Favour. And We do Expect and Require that all Persons of Honour, or in Place of Authority, will give good Example by their own Virtue and Piety, and to their utmost contribute to the Discountenancing Persons of Dissolute and Debauched Lives that they being by that means reduced to Shame and Contempt, for their Loose and Evil Actions and Behaviour, may be thereby also Enforced the sooner to Reform their ill Habits and Practices, and that the visible Displeasure of Good Men towards them, may (as far as is possible) supply what the Laws (probably) cannot altogether Prevent. And we do hereby strictly enjoyn and Prohibit all Our Loving Subjects, of what Degree or Quality soever, from Playing on the Lord's Day at Dice, Cards, or any other Game whatsoever, either in Publick or Private Houses, or other Place or Places whatsoever; and do hereby Require and Command them and every of them Decently and Reverently to Attend the Worship of God on every Lord's Day, on Pain of Our highest Displeasure, and of being Proceeded against with the Utmost Rigour that may be by Law. And for the more Effectual Reforming of all such Persons who by Reason of their Dissolute Lives and Conversations, are a Scandal to Our Kingdom Our further Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Judges Mayors, Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, and all other Our Officers and Ministers, both Ecclesiastical and Civil, and all other Our Subjects, whom it may concern, to be very Vigilant and Strict in the Discovery and the Effectual Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons who shall be Guilty of Excessive Drinking, Blasphemy, Prophan Swearing and Cursting, Lawlessness, Prophanation of the Lord's Day, or other Dissolute Immoral or Disorderly Practices; and that they take Care also Effectually to Suppress all Publick Gaming Houses and Places, and other Lewd and Disorderly Houses, and to put in Execution the Statute made in the Nine and twentieth Year of the Reign of the late King Charles the Second Intituled, An Act for the better Observation of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, and also an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of the late King William the Third Intituled, An Act for the more Effectual Suppressing of Blasphemy and Prophanities, and all other Laws now in Force for the Punishing and Suppressing any of the Vices aforesaid; and also to Suppress and Prevent all Gaming whatsoever in Publick or Private Houses on the Lord's Day, and likewise that they take Effectual Care to Prevent all Persons keeping Taverns, Chocolate Houses, Coffee Houses, or other Publick Houses whatsoever, from Selling Wine, Chocolate, Coffee,

*Ale, Beer, or other Liquors, or Receiving or Permitting Guests to be or remain in such their Houses in the Time of Divine Service on the Lord's Day, as they will answer it to Almighty God, and upon Pain of Our Highest Displeasure. And for the more Effectual Proceeding herein, We do hereby Direct and Command all Our Judges of Assize and Justices of the Peace, to give strict Charges at their respective Assizes and Sessions, for the due Prosecution and Punishment of all Persons that shall presume to Offend in any the kinds aforesaid, and also of all Persons that contrary to their Duty, shall be Remiss or Negligent in Putting the said Laws in Execution, and that they do, at their respective Assizes and Quarter-Sessions of the Peace, cause this our Proclamation to be publicly read in Open Court immediately before the Charge is given. And we do hereby further Charge and Command every Minister in his respective Parish Church or Chapel, to Read or cause to be Read this our Proclamation, at least Four times in every Year, immediately after Divine Service, and to incite and stir up their respective Auditories to the Practice of Piety and Virtue, and the Avoiding of all Immorality and Prophaneness. And to the end that all Vice and Debauchery may be prevented and Religion and Virtue Practised by all Officers, Private Soldiers, Mariners, and others, who are Employed in Our Service by Sea or Land. We do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Our Commanders and Officers whatsoever, That they do take Care to avoid all Prophaneness, Debauchery, and other Immoralities; and that by their own Good and Virtuous Lives and Conversations, they do set Good Examples to all such as are under their Care and Authority, and likewise take Care of and Inspect the Behaviour of all such as are under them, and Punish all those who shall be Guilty of any the Offences aforesaid, as they will be Answerable for the ill Consequences of their Neglect herein*

PRESENT

The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Orrery Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Somerset: His Lordship this Day took the Oaths appointed to be taken instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

St. James's, January 7. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in behalf of themselves and their respective Congregations in the County of Gloucester; presented to his Majesty by Mr. Samuel Jones, and Mr. Samuel Rosewell, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Wharton, Lord Privy-Seal.

An humble Address of the Provost, Burgesses, and Freemen of the Borough of Traly; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

Both which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Constantinople, Novemb. 28. Yesterday a great Divan was held in the Vizier's House, at which were present the Mufti, Caddieskiers Chief Men of the Law, the Heads of all the Orders of Soldiery, the Captain Pathaw or Admiral, and others, and after Deliberation War was resolved and declared against the Venetians, and Prayer for Success was said as usual. This done, the Bailo of Ambassador of the State of Venice, who had been sent for on this Occasion, was introduced, and the Grand Vizier acquainted him, that the Republick not having given Satisfaction upon the just Demands which had been several times made by the Part of the Grand Signior, but made frivolous and dilatory Answers, without ever coming to a Conclusion, his Highness had determined to endeavour to do himself Right by Arms; that therefore it was his Highness's Pleasure, that he the Bailo should give Notice to all the Consuls and Subjects of the Republick to depart this Empire within 21 Days: And then the Bailo was sent to the House of the Topgibafchi, where he remains under a Guard, being allowed to cause his Furniture, Equipage, and other Effects to be brought to him from his own House, and to make the necessary Preparations for his Departure; accordingly 'tis said he proposes to imbarck within a few Days on a Venetian Ship. The Turks Preparations both for the Land and Sea Service are so far advanced, that in all Appearance they will open the Campaign early. All Diligence is used to send forth with some Ships of War to cruise for intercepting the Transports with Provisions and Ammunition which 'tis supposed the Venetians are about sending by Sea to their Places in the Morea.

Vienna, Decemb. 29. We have Letters from Constantinople of the 28th of November N. S. but the Courier who brought them did not leave that Place till the 30th: He reports, that before he came away, the Turks had not only put the Venetian Bailo under a Guard, but had caused the other Subjects of that Republick to be seized together with their Effects, on Pretence of securing them till they had paid their Debts. It is said, that this Court, upon Advice of the Preparations which the Turks were making, ordered the Imperial Minister at the Port to declare, that in Case of a Rapture with the Venetians, the Emperor would be obliged to assist that Republick, pursuant to the Treaties in Force between them; and to offer his Imperial Majesty's Mediation for procuring Satisfaction to the Turks in Case they had any Complaints to make.

Venice, Dec. 22. On the 20th Instant a Man of War of the Line was launched, and all Diligence is used in building others, and fitting out those which are repaired, that they may be ready in a little time to sail for the Levant, with a considerable Number of Transports which are to be sent thither with Stores of all sorts and some Land-forces. We have confirmed Advice, that a Turkish Man of War newly built at Rhodes, has been cast away in a Storm, with 350 Soldiers and 150 Mariners on board, who all perished: That Ship was conveying a great Number of Saicks laden with Provisions, designed for Thessalonica, Lepanto, and other Places, where the Turks are erecting large Magazines: Those Saicks were dispersed by the Storm, and there is yet no certain Account what is become of them. The Turks are building at Rhodes divers light Vessels; they have got ready at Negropont several Quintals of Biscuit; they are also repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of the Castle of Lepanto and of some other Places; and the Regencies of Algiers, Tunis and Tripoli have had Orders sent them from the Port, to have their Squa-

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Squadrons ready to joyn the Ottoman Fleet in the Spring. Upon the Rumour that the Turks will attack Malta the Marshal Staremberg has offered to take upon him the Command of the Troops of that Order, of which he is a Knight; the Number of those Troops will be above 25000 Men. Several Companies of Veteran Soldiers, who were at Brescia and in other Towns of the Terra-firma, are arrived at Lido, in order to imbarke: New Levées are also making by this State, and besides what Regiments are raising in Italy, some Princes of the Empire have granted Leave to Lift Men in their Territories.

*Stralsund, Dec. 25 O. S.* The King of Sweden having notified by a Letter to the King of Prussia his Arrival at this Place, that Prince sent hither General Slippenbach to congratulate his Majesty thereupon, and to treat with the Swedish Ministers concerning the Sequestration of Stetin: What M. Slippenbach proposed in the Name of the King his Master was chiefly this, that his Prussian Majesty was willing to restore Stetin with all its Dependencies, provided the King of Sweden would reimburse him the Expences he had been at; to which his Swedish Majesty did not think fit to agree, alledging, that the Treaty of Sequestration being concluded without his Knowledge or Participation, he was not obliged to have any Regard to it. As neither Party would abate of their Pretensions, the Negotiation which has continued here two or three Weeks, was broken off, and General Slippenbach set out from hence some Days ago, in order to return to Berlin. 'Tis said the King of Prussia refuses to let the Swedes raise Contributions, or collect any Duties from the Inhabitants of the Country on the other side of the River Pene, in which District are comprehended, besides Stetin, the Towns of Anclam, Uker-munde, and several other small Places, which the Swedes look upon as an Infraction of the Treaty of Sequestration: But notwithstanding all Difficulties, the Swedes entertain Hopes that this Affair may yet be adjusted in an amicable way. Three Days after the Arrival here of General Meyerfeldt from Stockholm, Lieutenant-General Sparre was dispatched to the Court of France; and we hear that M. de Crilly, who is appointed to come Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty to the King of Sweden, will not set out for this Place, till after Lieutenant-General Sparre's Arrival there. The Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel is on his Departure this Day for Sweden; the King with several Officers and other Gentlemen, will accompany him to the Place where he is to imbarke in the Isle of Rugen.

*Madrid, Dec. 24.* The Queen arrived at Pampelona the 11th Instant; the News of which being brought hither, Illuminations were made throughout this City four Nights successively. The 18th came Advice of her Majesty's having left Pampelona the 15th, whereupon the Princess of Ursini set out from Court the 20th to meet her at Jadrique: Yesterday at Noon the King with the Prince of Asturias went from hence, lay last Night at Alcala, and to Day proceeded to Guadalaxara, where the Queen is to arrive to Night. Their Majesties are expected here the 26th or 27th. The Cardinal del Giudice having resigned the Office of Inquisitor-General, the King has nominated two Inquisitors-General, viz. Father Robinet a Jesuit his Confessor, and Father Macanas a Dominican Fryar; but 'tis said Father Robinet has desired to be excused from accepting that Employment. The King, on occasion of his Marriage, has recalled the Duke de Ferdinandina, who about a Year and

half ago was expelled the Court for killing a Man on his Estate at Villafraanca; and on the 21st that Duke was admitted to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

*Paris, Jan. 12.* An extraordinary Courier from Madrid, has brought Advice, of the Queen of Spain's being received by the King at Guadalaxara; 'tis reported that the Princess d'Ursini who was sent before to meet the Queen at Jadrique, having given some Offence to her Majesty, was commanded to leave the Spanish Court, and that she is on her Way hither. The Elector of Cologne went from hence two Days ago towards Dinant. The King has given the Government of Strasbourg to the Marshal d'Huxelles, who still keeps that of Alsace which he had before. M. Francis de Salignac de la Mothe Fenelon, Archbishop Duke of Cambrai, one of the Forty of the French Academy, Preceptor of the late Duke of Burgundy and Berry and of the present King of Spain, Author of the Adventures of Telemachus, died some Days ago in his Diocess.

*Hague, Jan. 11.* On the 9th Instant the States of Holland and Westfrisland began their ordinary Assembly here. Mr. Cadogan his Britannick Majesty's Envoy extraordinary to this Republick arriving here two Days before Mr. Secretary Stanhore imbarked for England, both those Ministers had a Conference the 9th at Night with the States General, on the Affair of the Barrier. General Sparre is arrived here from the King of Sweden, designing after a short Stay at this Place to proceed to the Court of France. M. Palmquist, that King's Envoy to this Republick, has presented a Memorial to the States General, complaining of a Placart published by their High Mightinesses in the Month of July last, relating to the Molestation given by the Swedes to the Trade in the Baltick. Count Tarouca and Don Louis d'Acunha, Plenipotentiaries of Portugal, are come hither this Evening from Utrecht.

*Deal, January 6.* His Majesty's Yacht Henrietta came in hither yesterday Afternoon, and having landed the Earl of Albemarle, sailed this Morning for Dover Peer.

*St James's, January 7.* His Majesty has been pleased to direct Letters Patents to pass the Seals, for creating the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Wharton, Keeper of his Majesty's Privy-Seal, a Marquess of Great Britain, by the Name, Style and Title of Marquess of Wharton in the County of Westmorland, and of Malmsbury in the County of Wilts; and also for creating his Lordship Baron, Earl and Marquess of the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Name, Style and Title of Baron of Trim in the County of Meath, Earl of Rathfarnham in the County of Dublin, and Marquess of Catherlogh in the County of Catherlogh.

His Majesty has been pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Matthew Kirwood, Esq.

Daniel Harvey, Esq; Lieutenant General of his Majesty's Forces, to be Governor of the Island of Guernsey, and Castle of Cornet.

Hugh Cholmeley, Esq; to be Surveyor-General of all his Majesty's Honours, Castles, Lordships, Forrefts, Chaces, Parks, Lands, Woods, &c. in England and Wales.
