A PROCLAMATION,
 In order to the Electing and Summoning
 the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have in Council thought fit to Declare Our Pleasure, for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Thursday the Seventeenth Day of March next ensuing the Date hereof. In order therefore to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to Sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by Advice of our Privy Council, Issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly Charging and Commanding all the Peers of Scotland to Assemble and Meet at Our Royal Palace of Holy Rood House in Edinburgh, on Thursday the Third Day of March next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to Nominate and Chuse the Sixteen Peers to Sit and Vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies for such as shall be Absent, such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly Signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being Qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to Officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively Required to Attend such Meeting, and to Administer the Oaths Required by Law to be Taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to Certifie the Names of the Sixteen Peers so Elected, and Sign and Attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and Return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we strictly Charge and Command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly Published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty five Days at least before the time hereby Appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to Proceed to such Election.

Witness Our Self at Westminster, the Seventeenth Day of January, 1714. In the First Year of Our Reign.

St. James's, January 21. The following Address has been presented to his Majesty.
 An humble Address of the Survivors of those who first secured the City of Londonderry in Ireland, on the late happy Revolution in the Year 1688, and of the late Governor, Officers of the Garrison, and Citizens of that City who defended the same, and were Sufferers there during the long memorable Siege thereof in the Year 1689; presented to his Majesty by Sir Alexander Cairnes, and Lieutenant General Meredith, introduced

by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Venice January 11. On New Year's Day the Doge held a Chappel, according to Custom, in the Church of St. Mark, being accompanied by the Signiory and the Pope's Nuncio. After Mass Publick Prayers were begun, for imploring the Assistance and Protection of the Almighty, in the present Juncture of an approaching War with the Turks; on which Occasion the Patriarch Barbarigo has publish'd in the Pope's Name a Bull of plenary Indulgence, to be obtained by those Subjects of this State especially, who shall perform the Acts of Religion therein prescribed. A Courier from Vienna arriving the 31st past, with Letters from Constantinople giving an Account of the Port's having actually declared War against this Republick, the Senate have chosen two extraordinary Ambassadors to go to the Emperor to solicit his Assistance, viz. Sig. Zani and Sig. Morosini. Count Colonna, Ambassador from the Emperor in the Room of Prince Ercolani, is expected here in a few Days, having almost finished his Quarantine on the Frontier. Barks arrive daily from several Towns of the Terra firma, laden with Artillery, Ammunition and Provisions, which are to be put on board the Transports that are ready to sail for Dalmatia, with the Troops appointed to reinforce the Garrisons of the fortified Places of that Country, which are putting into a Condition to make a vigorous Defence in Case they should be attacked. Sig. Castelli and Zugo, Major-Generals, are sent for, in order to be dispatched to view the Places of Strength in our Islands, and especially on the Morea, in order to the supplying them with all things necessary. Most of the Veteran Regiments which were in the Towns of the Terra firma, are on the March to embark here for the Levant, and their room will be supplied by Militia. A Treaty is said to be already made, for taking into the Service of this State 7500 Saxons; and Negotiations are on foot for procuring other Regiments of several Princes of Germany, and for a General to command them; some Forces will also be hired of the Swiss and Grisons. The beginning of next Month, 5 Men of War, 2 Gallies, and a great Number of Transports, having on board Troops, Ammunition and Provisions, will be ready to sail for the Levant, under the Command of Sig. Fabio Buonvicini; Sig. Marco Loredano is appointed Provveditore extraordinary of the Fleet, and Sig. Marcello and Piombino, Nobles, are chosen to accompany him, *London, Jan. 7.* The Prince Piombino, who accompanied the Queen the whole Journey from Italy, is preparing to return to Rome: Whereupon the King has nominated the Widow of the Count d'Altamira, who died Ambassador at the Court of Rome in 1699, to be first Lady of the Bed-Chamber to the Queen; the Marquis de Grimaldo to be her Majesty's Secretary, and the Prince de Cellamare (Nephew of the Cardinal del Guadice) to be her Master of the Horse. His Majesty has appointed M. Bourk, a Native of Ireland, who had resided here some Years in the Quality of Envoy from the Court at St. Germain, to go to Stralsund, to Congratulate

late the King of Sweden on his Return to his Dominions from Turkey. The Prince of Campoflorido, a Sicilian, is made Captain-General of Guipuscoa; in Consideration of his having been removed by the present King of Sicily from the Command in chief of the Gallies of that Kingdom. The King has named to the Archbishoprick of Toledo, Don Francisco Velero y Lofa, in Consideration of his Learning and Exemplary Life; to which Qualities he owed his first Preferment, in the Year 1706. to the Bishoprick of Badajoz, from the Station of Parish-Priest of a small Place in la Mancha. The Preparations at Barcelona, Alicant, and other Places, for reducing the Island of Majorca to the Obedience of his Catholick Majesty, are carried on with all Diligence, in order to the going upon that Enterprize as soon as the Season will permit: The Land-Forces designed to be employed in it are 8000 Foot and 2000 Horse; a Squadron of 8 Men of War appointed for that Service, was to have been Commanded by Don Andrew de Pez; but he having desired to be excused, that Command is conferred on Don Pedro de los Rios and the Marquis Mari, which last set out Post from hence for Barcelona 5 Days ago.

Paris, January 26. The 23d the Earl of Stairs arrived here, and went yesterday to Versailles.

St. James's, January 22. Thursday last being the Day appointed for a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the King's happy and peaceable Accession to the Throne, his Majesty with their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, attended by the chief Officers of State, and others of the Nobility, was pleased to go from hence to the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, where after the Divine Service appointed for the Occasion, a Sermon was preached by the Lord Bishop of Gloucester. The Lord-Mayor and Court of Aldermen of London gave their Attendance in the accustomed Manner; the City Companies in their Liveries were in their respective Stands, the Streets being lined by the Militia: The Guns in the Park were fired on a Signal at the Singing of *Te Deum* in the Cathedral, as they were also at his Majesty's Setting out from, and Return to his Palace: And at Night there were Illuminations, Bonfires, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy.
