ST. James's, January 24. The following Address has been presented to his Majesty.

Vienna, Jan. 16. We have Letters from Constantinople of the 11th past, which being dated but two Days after those which brought an Account of the Port's having declared War against the Republick of Venice, afford nothing new, only that the Turks had changed their first Resolution of hastening the Departure of the Venetian Bailo and other Subjects of that State out of their Departure and had determined to detain them. their Dominions, and had determined to detain them till their own Subjects be permitted to retire out of the Venetian Territories: They have also stopped the Venetian Ships in their Ports, and taken off their Rudders. The Swedish Troops returning from Turkey, are all passed by here towards Lintz,

Ratisben Jam. 20. On the 18th Instant the Imperialists evacuated Munich, all but 150 Men, who being left as a Guard for the Administration, keep the ordinary Posts, tho' the Bavarian Guards and the Regiment of Arco are already entred. On the 25th the Town and the Administration will be intirely put into the Hands of the Bavarians in Exchange for Frybourg, as the same Day Ingolstat is to be delivered up for Brifac, but the French keep Possession of Kehl till the Upper Palatinate is furrendred.

Stralfond, Jan. 8. O. S. The Hereditary Prince of Heric Cassel was detained on the Island of Rugen by contrary Winds till the 28th path, when his Highness imbarked; and the King of Sweden (who with the Duke Administrator of Holstein and several Officers and other Gentlemen of Diffinction went to fee him aboard) having staid till the Vessel he was in and the a Frigates appointed for Convoy were under Sail, came back to a Gentleman's Seat on the Island, where he lay that Night, and the next Morning returned hither. The 1st Instant arrived here the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel; his Majesty went out of Town to receive him, and conducting him to the Lodgings which were prepared for him, they re-mained together there near an Hour. The next Day they dined in publick, and are fince much together. The

Chancellour Mullern arrived here the 2d Inftant from Vienez: As he has taken on him again the Function of Minister of State, Count Welling who has officiated for him during his Absence, has refigned the transacting of all Foreign Affairs into his Hands. The 4th Mr. Jefferyes, the British Minister, had a private Audience of his Swedish Majesty, and congratulated him in the Name of the King his Master, on his safe Return to his ows Dominions.

Paris, January 28. Yesterday the Earl of Stairs went to Versailles, and to Day had a private Audience of the Kipp. The Persian Ambassadour is arrived, and 'tis said is to make his Publick Entry on Sunday next. Baron Sporr is also arrived, with a Commission from the King of Sweden to this Court. The Scine having been rendred unnavigable in these Parts of late by the dry Weather that has lasted several Months, the People here have been in great Want of Wood for firing; which has obliged the Magistrates and Officers who have the Care of feeing good Order kept in this City, as well in its being abundantly supplied with Necessaries as in all other Respects, to have Recourse to the Parliament, who have iffued an Arrest dated the 22d instant, importing (among other Particulars) that the Prevost des Merchands and Eschevins shall immediately dispatch such Eschevins and Counsellours of the City as they shall chuse, into the adjacent Country for ten Leagues round at least, whereever Wood may be cut for firing, and cause all the Wood which they shall find already cut for that Use to be conveyed hither, notwithstanding all private Contracts which may have been made for the same; the said Wood to be piled up at the City-Gates, or on the Wharss to be chosen for that purpose by the Prevost des Marchands and Eschevins; leaving the Proprietors so much Wood for their own use, as may be sufficient to serve their Families one Year: The said Wood to be paid for and to be distributed here, at the usual and moderate Rates. The Commissioners are impowered to fet Men to Work in the Country to cur such Wood as is fir for firing, sparing such Timber-Trees as are more proper to be preserved for the Uses of Building; and to regulate the Rates of Waggons, Carts or other Carnages that must be employed to bring it hither. They may also compel Farmers, Husbandmen, and Carrers or Waggoners to furnish their Carriages, Teams and Harness for this Service, at such Rates as they shall think fit to allow, to be paid at the Delivery of the Wood here. The Owners of the Wood who shall contest the Execution of this Commission, are made liable to the Penalty of Imprisonment and of a Fine of 3000 Livres; and the Farmers, Husbandmen, and Waggoners who shall

offer to disobey the Commissioners, are to be punished with Imprisonment, and with Confiscation of their Carriages and Hones. No Suit at Law against the Commissioners by Parties pretending to be aggrieved by them to be allowed, not any Complains against them to be heard in any Court, but only by Appeal to the Parlia-ment. The other Articles of this Arrest (too long to be mentioned here) feem to be as well contrived and as rigorous, as the Necessity and Urgency of the Affair require. Two Arrests of Council have also been published, dated the 19th Instant, the one importing that the King being informed, that the Arrest of the 16th of October 1714, which exempted the larger and lesser Cattle of every Species for Food, either imported from Cattle of every Species for Food, either imported from Abroad or bred in the Kingdom, from all Duties and Tolls, to the last of March 1715, is not sufficient for repairing the Loss occasioned in the Provinces by the Mortality among the Cattel; his Majesty has thought fit to prolong the faid Exemption to the last of March 1716. The Tenour of the other Arrest, is, that the King having by an Arrest of the 24th of February 1714, forbid the killing of Lambs in Paris, or in any of the Provinces of the Kingdom, from that Time till White fontide 1715; His Majesty being informed that 'tis ne-cessary for the Increase of Sheep, and for the Advan-tage of the Manusactures which suffer by the Scarcity of Wooll in the Kingdom, to prolong the said Prohibition, does accordingly on very fevere Penalties forbid the killing of Lambs throughout the Kingdom 'till Whitfontide 1716.
