Ratisbon, Jan. 24. The Elector of Cologne has complained to the Diet, by a Memorial delivered the 2 Ift Instant, that the States General had directed their Gar-

rison in Bon to remain there and be reinforced, notwithstanding the Emperour's Orders for the Evacuation of that Place: He therefore defires, that the Diet would address the Emperour to take the necessary Measures for obliging the States General to withdraw their Troops from thence, as well as from Liege and Huy. The King of Prussia's Ministers have declared here by Order, that Count Schlippenbach was returned to Berlin from Stralfund, without having been able to obtain any Ex-Security of the Circle of Lower Saxony, or to his Pruf-fian Majesty's Possession of the Town of Stetin till he is reimbursed the Sum which he has laid out on that Occasion: Notwithstanding which his Prussian Majesty continued resolved to insist on those two Points. Letters from Munich of the 22d Instant bring Advice of their having Notice there by a Courier from General Harich, that Fribourg had been delivered up to him on the 18th, and that all Preparations were making for the evacuating Brifac by the French on the 25th. But the Palatine Troops have not yet the least Orders from their Master to leave the Upper Palatinate, which should be given up on the 5th of next Month in Exchange for Kehl.

The Bishop of Rennes deputed by the Clergy, accompanied by the Prince de Leon for the Nobility, and by M. Moreau (one of the King's Secretaries) for the third Estate, made a Speech on the Part of the faid States, wherein he complimented his Majesty on the present flourishing Condition of his Assairs; to set which in a fairer Light, he described the extreme Diffress the Kingdom was reduced to about the End of the War, from whence the King by the Superiority of his Genius had found Means to extricate it, by creating Division among his Enemies when France was on the very Brink of Ruin, which had en-abled him to fave Spain and keep it in the Hands of his Grandson, and also to give Peace to Europe, on Terms perfectly glorious to himfelf and advantageous to his cople
