**S. T. James's, January 31.** The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Sovereign, Justices of the Peace, Freeman, and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Charleville; presented to his Majesty by Berridge Badham, Esq; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the Portreeve, Free-Burgessees, Commons, and Freeman of Navan; presented to his Majesty by Lieutenant-General Meredith, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Grand-Jury, and other Gentlemen of the County of Dorset, assembled at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held at Blandford-Forum for the said County; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Anglesey.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

**Stralsund, Jan. 18. O. S.** Prince George of Hesse-Cassel, a General Officer in the Service of the King of Prussia, arrived here some Days ago, and 'tis said will make but a short stay. M. Poniatowski is gone from hence, on a Commission from the King of Sweden, to King Stanislaus at Deux-Ponts. The Prussian Garrison in Stetin is newly reinforced, and the Commander in chief there is very diligently storing the Magazines with Ammunition and Provisions of all sorts: The Prussians persist likewise, in refusing to let the Swedes raise Contributions in the Country on the other side of the River Pene: But 'tis hoped here, that the Landgrave of Hesse, who set out from hence this Morning early for the Court of Berlin, will accommodate these Differences, and rectifie all Misunderstandings between the two Kings. Last Week his Swedish Majesty took a Review of his Troops cantoned on the Island of Rugen, and in the Neighbourhood of this Town; they are now in Number 14000 effective Men; Recruits are continually coming in from divers Parts; and Cavalry is expected from Sweden.

**Vienna, Jan. 23.** M. Prebendowski, Great Treasurer of Poland, is arrived here with a Commission from King Augustus; but he has not yet taken any publick Character on him, nor is the Business he is come to Negotiate yet known. M. Bentenrieder, who was Secretary to Prince Eugene of Savoy at the late Treaties of

Rastat and Baden, is made one of the Aulick Council. The Count de St. Luc is expected here from the Court of France about the middle of April, two very fine Houses (one within the City the other without) being already hired for him. The Emperor has of late held frequent Councils, on Occasion of the Ottoman Port's Declaration of War against the Republick of Venice; but not having taken a final Resolution on that Subject, a Courier who was some Days ago ordered to be in readiness to set out for Constantinople, is not yet dispatched. M. Groothuysen, who had resided at the Turkish Court on the part of the King of Sweden, and several other Swedes who stopped here, set out from hence Yesterday, to overtake and join the Swedish Troops on their March.

**Ratisbon, Jan. 28.** On the 25th Instant, the Diet came to a Resolution about the Means for satisfying the Publick Debts and Engagements on the Chest of War, and sent it to the Emperor for his Approbation. To Day they deliberated on the Representations made to them concerning the Garrisons of the States General in Liege, Huy, and Bon, and resolved to address the Emperor to procure their being withdrawn from those Places. On the 25th, the Administration of Bavaria, with the Towns of Ingolstat, Donawert, and Donaustauff, were surrendered into the Hands of the Elector's Officers; and some of his Troops are advanced into the Upper Palatinate, as far as Castel and other Places within two Hours March of Amberg the Capital, tho' the Palatines make no Motion yet to leave their Possession; but Couriers pass frequently between the Courts of Vienna and Dusseldorp for regulating that Affair. The King of Sweden's Retinue and Troops which were in Turkey, continue their March through Bavaria, and are expected at Ingolstat the 1st or 2d of next Month.

**Hague, Feb. 5.** On the 2d Instant the States-General received Advice from Bon, that one of their Battalions having marched thither from Luxembourg to reinforce that Garrison, the Collonel of a Foot Regiment of the Troops of Paderborn, making part of the said Garrison, had by Order opposed the entering of the Dutch Battallion, which was thereupon obliged to canton without the Town. Hereupon their High-Mightinesses have dispatched an Express to the Bishop of Munster and Paderborn, to desire him to revoke his said Order, so the end that Battallion may be admitted into Bon. Mr. Cadogan, the British Envoy, and Mr. Horatio Walpole, having since the 1st Instant had frequent Conferences with the Deputies of the States-General on the Affair of the Barrier, Mr. Cadogan set out
