above three hours in conference, with the Cardinals, defigned to meet him there, but taking leave of them, and of several Bishops and Grandees of the Court, who came thither to at-

tens him, fer fail for Legerne.

Cardinal Chify in order to his Voyage to Milan, as Legat from his Holyneis to salute the Infanta, has taken up fifty thousand Crowns out of the Popes Chamber, and is fitting his train, intending to appear there accompanied with a great number of persons of quality, and therefore, besides those that go from kence, he has fent to the Cardinal Legat of Bologne, Ferrara, and to the Governors of the most principal Towns in the Popes Territories, that from each of them persons may be sent to attend him to make his appearance the more glorious: but his Eminence intends not to let forwards, till he receives the certain news of the Debarcation of the Infanta, either at Genoua, or Finale, intending to be es little while absent from this Court, as possibly he can: But 'cis much doubted that this Legation will not end with the surssection and content as is delited: The Spaniards having declared not to admit any to the prefence of the Infanta, who with their traines appear not in Mourning for the King of Spain, which is a posture not so well agreeing with the Ceremonials of this Court, who never appear in Mourning, though for the death of the Pope himfelf.

A Courrier is arrived here from Madrid, who puffed through Florence, the Queen Regent having tent to the Dake for the use of the two Galleys that conducted the Cardinal d' Arragon. His butinets here is of the same nature, to move Cardinal Chify to dispose the Pope to send his Galleys that lie at Civita Vecchia to attend the Infanta, which is not like to be granted, nor indeed are they equipped for present service, she is resolved to Embarque at Denia, and to avoid the Guif of Lyons, and the French Ports, intending to fail more towards the Coasts of Minorca and Sardigna, The Courrier from hence intends for Naples, whither is also another dispatcht from Milan upon the same erran!, to follicite for the speedy rayling of money, which is like to be a bufineis of much difficulty, confidering the present state of affairs there.

The Queen Christina of Smedeland is preparing for a Journey into Pomerania, and possibly also to Stockholme, leaving the greatest part of her train behind her, intending to return before December: the reasons of her sudden journey are much discoursed of, many believing her business to be of a farther concernment then the fettling of her Revenues,

which is the cause prerended.
