Who all appear'd upon Return of their Writs on Monday last in the High Court of Chancery, and were severally Sworn, and this Day they met in the Inner Temple Hall, attended by the Gentlemen of the Inns of Court and Chancery, and counted before the Lords Chief Justices and all the Judges who put on their Hoods and Coifs, and my Lord Chief Justice Parker made a Speech to them upon the Occasion, and then they proceeded to Westminster, attended by the Gentlemen of the Inns of Court and of Chancery and their Officers, the Warden of the Fleet, the Usher, Marshalls, and Officers of the Courts at Westminster in Party-colour'd Gowns and Habits. When they were at Westminster they counted according to Custom at the Common Pleas Barr; the Lord Chancellor the Lord Chief Justice King, and Judges of the said Court sitting on the Bench; the Lord Chief Justice Parker and the Judges of the King's Bench sitting on the Right Hand side of the Court, and the Lord Chief Baron Dodd and the rest of the Barons on the Left Hand side of the Court; and a Gentleman of the Bar, on behalf of each new Serjeant, delivered Gold Rings to the Lord Chancellor, the Chief Justices, and all the Judges and Serjeants present, with this Motto, (Omnia iura Vides.) After which they returned to the Middle Temple Hall, where they treated the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President, and many others of the Nobility; the Lords Chief Justices Chief Baron, Judges, Serjeants, and many other Persons of Quality and Distinction at a splendid Entertainment.

Brassels,

Brussels, Feb. 4. Count Coningsbeck, the Imperial Minister, came hither the 1st Instant from Antwerp. He is gone this Morning to Mechlin, to give the Deputies of the States General a Meeting there; but he will return hither to Morrow and expect Mr. Cadogan's Arrival from the Hague, unless those Deputies have any new Instructions which may occasion his going back with them to Antwerp sooner. Yesterday the said Count took a Review, on the Esplanade of this Place, of the Regiment of Horse commanded by the Marquis de Westerloo. The Commissaries who were charged with the Quartering and Providing for the Imperial Troops in Limbourg and Luxembourg are returned hither; having quartered for the present 2000 Horse or Dragoons on the Peasants of the Country of Limbourg, which being too burthenfome to so small an Extent of Ground, they must necessarily be removed in a short time. The Regency have received an Account from Flanders, that the States of that Province excuse themselves from giving the Subsidy asked of them, on Pretence of the Emperor's approaching Inauguration. This Refusal will put the Council of State under great Difficulties to find Means for subsisting the Troops assigned on that Country; however, the States of Flanders have ordered them Two Months Pay of the Seven due out of the Subsidy formerly granted. The Regency, in Compliance with Count Coningsbeck's Desire, have published Orders for opening a free Trade between Namur and Luxembourg and the other Parts of the Spanish Netherlands.

Hague, February 5. The States, in the Letter which they have written to the Bishop of Munster, on Occasion of his commanding Officer in Bon's producing his Order for refusing to admit into that Place a Battalion of their Forces, represent to him their great Surprize, that without Commission from the Emperor, or the Consent of the Empire, or so much as consulting the Circle of Westphalia, he should of his own Authority proceed in such a manner; putting him in Mind of his Obligations to them for his election to the See of Munster; and in Conclusion exhorting him in very earnest Terms to recall forthwith his said Order. The Estimate and Establishment for the Military Service this current Year, having been presented by the Council of State to their High Mightinesses, has been sent to the respective Provinces for their Approbation and Consent: In the Preamble to it, commonly called the Petition of the said Council, they represent, That the maintaining with the neighbouring Potentates mutual Friendship and good Correspondence, is the true Means to preserve the Peace, and therefore advise the States not to be wanting thereto on their Part; That however, the Republick ought to continue armed, least it might sooner or later be surprized, as it was in 1665 and in 1663: They also set forth the Necessity of the State's keeping able Generals in its Service, as well as inferior Officers, and are urgent for their being allowed reasonable Pensions: They observe, that by the Treaty of Alliance in 1701, made between the Emperor, Great Britain and this State, it was stipulated that the Spanish Netherlands should serve for its Barrier, that however, the Country is so open from Concé to Lille, that considering the Extent of that Opening, and the situation of the chief Towns of the United Provinces which are of no Defence, they think the State ought not to rely wholly on that Barrier, but to look also to the Security of its antient Frontier, particularly to Bergen op zoom, Bolduc and Nimeguen, and be at the Expence of well repairing their Fortifications, the rather because

our Neighbours are strengthening their Frontier Places which lie opposite to this State: They represent the Necessity of keeping the Magazines of Provisions and Ammunition always full. They likewise urge the Necessity of the State's having constantly a sufficient Number of Men of War in readiness for Service, considering that of the seven Provinces four are Maritime; and therfore propose the Plan formed in 1685, according to which the State would have 96 Ships of War always ready; and as there is Want of Ships, they shew that the Building a certain Number yearly would be very expedient. They earnestly exhort the States of the several Provinces, so to direct Affairs in this Time of Peace, that not only the present Inhabitants may continue in the Country, but Foreigners may be encouraged to come and settle in it, seeing its naturally strong Situation, the Constitution of the Government, and the Protection their High Mightinesses are able, and always ready to give their Subjects, joined with Liberty of Conscience, do all contribute to invite Foreigners into their Dominions. They argue the absolute Necessity of encouraging Commerce with Foreign Nations, from this plain Reason, that the Taxes with which the People are charged are more than double the Revenue which the Products of the Land yield: They represent, that this Country ought to be looked upon as an Artificial Store-house or Mart, for all sorts of Goods and Merchandize between the North and the South; and that therefore great Care should be taken that Trade in general and particularly that of the Baltick, be not disturbed or diverted into new Channels. The Mennonists in this Country, a Sect much like that of the Quakers, having received Advice, that the Canton of Berne have newly imprisoned some of their Brethren in Switzerland, and condemned five of those Prisoners to the Gallies for Life, have Petitioned the States to renew their Interposition with the said Canton in behalf of those Sufferers, to the end they may be set at Liberty and sent away to the Palatinate or to Alsace or hither, after being permitted to dispose of their Effects, in case the Regents of Berne have determined not to let Persons of their Perswasion live any longer among their People, which from this last rigorous Proceeding 'tis supposed they have absolutely resolved upon; and indeed, the peculiar Foundation and Security of the Swiss Liberty, being the training up all their Subjects to Arms, and not keeping any hired Troops, the Mennoists could hardly have found a part of the World so unqualified as Switzerland to tolerate their Opinion of the unlawfulness of using Arms. The States in compliance with the said Petition have written to the Lords of Berne.
