St. James's, February 12. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Bailiff and Burgessees of the Borough of Midhurst in the County of Sussex; presented to his Majesty by John Fortescue-Aland, Esq; Solicitor-General to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Gentlemen Owners of Tyn Lands and Tyn Bounds Adventurers for Tyn, Tynners and others concern'd in Tyn in the County of Cornwall; presented to his Majesty by Hugh Boscawen, Esq; Comptroller of the Household, and Lord-Warden of the Stanneries of Cornwall.

Both which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

St. James's, Feb. 12. An humble Address of the Gentlemen Owners of Tyn Lands and Tyn Bounds Adventurers for Tyn, Tynners and others concern'd in Tyn in the County of Cornwall, was this Day presented to his Royal Highness the Prince by Hugh Boscawen, Esq; Comptroller of the Household, and Lord-Warden of the Stanneries of Cornwall.

Luboh, Feb. 8. The 20th of last Month being the Day appointed for returning Thanks to God for his Majesty's Accession to the British Throne, was celebrated by Mr. Worleley his Majesty's Envoy at this Court, with great Magnificence. All the Factory and the Captains of the British Ships in Port were invited to a splendid Dinner; and the Factory having supplied all those Ships with Powder for the occasion, they fired a Round at every publick Health that was named, for which a Signal was made to the Ships from the Envoy's House. At Night there was a noble Entertainment and a Ball for the Ladies. On the 5th Instant, the Portuguese Fleet, consisting of about 20 Sail, under Convoy of one Man of War, put to Sea for Brasil. The Son of M. Orry, who has had the chief Direction of the Finances of Spain, has been some Days at this Court Incognito.

Vienna, Jan. 30. M. Beschowitz, one of the Emperor's Privy-Council, and others who had been employed in the Administration of the Government of Bavaria, are arrived here from Munich, which Place they left on the 18th Instant; the Imperial Garrison having marched out, and the Bavarians taken Possession of it the same Day. The Scheme of a Bank which the Emperour has established on the Fund of his Revenues, is made publick here, and sent to be published likewise in the other chief Towns of his Hereditary Dominions. The 24th a Courier arrived from Venice, with Dispatches of the 12th Instant, advising that Sig. Zane and Morosini were preparing their Equipages with all Diligence, in order to set out for this Court, in the Quality of Ambassadors Extraordinary from that Republick, for congratulating the Emperour on his Accession to the Imperial Dignity, and for other Affairs.

Stockholm, Jan. 15. Yesterday the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel made his Entry into this Place. His Highness was first met in the Morning at an Houe about three Leagues off by the Counts Reenshierna and Tessin, two Senators, where he took a Breakfast; and about one in the Afternoon he arrived at the City Gate, where he was received by the young Duke of Holstein, accompanied by his Governour Count Horn and the other Senators who were in Town, attended by six of the King's Coaches each with six Horses, together with most of the Officers of the Court. After some Compliments the Prince was conducted into the first Coach of State, where the young Duke of Holstein sat on his Left

Hand, Count Stromberg Lord Treasurer and Count Horn sitting overagainst them: Three of the King's Coaches, with the under Marshal of the Court, the chief Matter of the Ceremonies, and the Senators, came first; then the Coach wherein sat the Prince, followed by the rest of the King's Coaches, with several others of the Nobility which went also to meet his Highness; and all proceeded through the Town to the Lodgings prepared for him in Count Oxenshierna's House, where as soon as he had alighted Forty Cannon were twice Discharged from several places of the Town; the King's Guards which were drawn up near the House gave him two Volleys, and the City Militia-Horse who were also in Arms on this occasion did the like; but it happened to be a very rainy Day which made the whole Appearance less splendid than it would otherwise have been. After the Duke of Holstein and the Senators had staid with the Prince about half an Hour, they took their leave and went to the Palace which almost joins to Count Oxenshierna's House. At six a Clock the Prince had an Audience of the Queen Grand-Mother, who introduced him to the Princess Royal in her Bed-Chamber; and after about an Hour's Conversation there, they all returned to the Queen's Apartment and supped together: The Duke of Holstein was at Table, and 'twas observed that he sat above the Prince, as being a Sovereign. The Prince had a very narrow escape at Sea from the Danes; two of whose large Frigates chased the Ship he came in for some Leagues, and gained so fast of her, that had she had two Leagues more to run when she entered Carlshaven, 'tis reckoned they had certainly taken her: They forced another Ship, in which was most of the Prince's Baggage, to save her self by venturing in among the Rocks.

Hambourg, Feb. 15. 'Tis advised from Berlin, that the King of Prussia being returned thither from Oranienbourg, held frequent Councils; and that all Diligence was used in the Preparations for an Army of 30000 Men to take the Field early in the Spring; they are to be commanded by the Prince of Anhalt Dessau, and 'tis said are to rendezvous between Swede and Prensflow: The Prussian Gens d'Armes are to make the Campaign; as is also the Regiment of Guards, which is to pass in Review before his Majesty at Brandenburg. Letters from Stralsund give an Account, that the King of Sweden has made an Agreement with Shipwrights of that Place, for building four Men of War from fifty to sixty Guns each, and six Frigates from twenty to thirty Guns each, which are constantly to cruise on the Coast of Pomerania, in Conjunction with four or five more under the Command of Admiral Heuke, to protect the Commerce and Navigation of those Parts.

Hague, Feb. 19. M. Duyvenvoorde, Ambassador Extraordinary from this State to the King of Great Britain, and Count Effern Minister of the Elector Palatine, set out from hence this Morning, in order to embark for England. The States of Holland and West-Friseland, who adjourned the 16th Instant, will meet again to Morrow. The Bavarian Minister residing here, has notified to Baron Heems the Emperor's Envoy, that the Elector his Master is preparing to leave France very speedily, in order to return to Munich. Some Advices say the Elector of Cologne has ordered three Regiments to march to take Possession of Bonn, in which there are at present two Battallions of the Forces of the Circle of Westphalia, and but one Battallion of Dutch.
