Madrid, February 4.

LAST Week a Courier was dispatched to the Cardinal del Giudice at Bayone, with an Order for his repairing speedily to this Court: 'Tis reported, that the King of France has mediated a Reconciliation between his Catholick Majesty and that Cardinal; and the Copy of a Letter to his Eminency is handed ab. ut here, in which his most Christian Majesty exhorts him on his Return hither to assist the King his Grandson with his Counsels; whence 'tis inferred that he will have a principal Part in the Management of Affairs at this Court. The Secretary at War having given Order for the Life Guards to change their Antient Quarters for others very inconvenient for them, without the Knowledge and Consent of the Duke de Popoli their Captain, he took such Offence at it that he drew up a Representation and presented it to the King, setting forth the Indignity offered to his Person and Employment by that Proceeding, which he said besides was with design to ruin those Guards for the Readiness they shewed in obeying the Queen's Orders. The King in Answer to this Remonstrance declared he would speedily redress the Grievance complained of, and accordingly has signified his Pleasure that the Guards shall continue in their former Quarters. Three Days ago a Courier arrived from France, with the Treaty concluded between this Crown and Portugal, in order to its being ratified. Notwithstanding the Disgrace and Absence of the Prince of Ursin, the Count de Phego is actually made a Grandee of Spain pursuant to the Promise made him on the Part of the King, in Consideration of his giving his Daughter in Marriage to Don Alessandro Lanti, Nephew to that Prince. 'Tis advised from Saragossa, that the Prince of Piombino has passed through that Place in her way to Barcelona. The Preparations for the Expedition against Majorca are in great Forwardness.

Vienna, Feb. 23. Yesterday Count Guichardi Brother of the Envoy of the Duke of Modena residing at this Court, set out from hence for the Court of Great Britain, where he is to take upon him the Character of Envoy from that Prince, to congratulate his Britannick Majesty on his Accession to the Throne. It having thawed here for some Days past, the shoals of Ice coming down the Danube carried away Yesterday one half of the Bridge which joins this City to the Suburbs called Leopoldstadt. The Aga expected from Constantinople is not advanced far on his Journey, there being no Advice yet of his having approached the Frontier. The usual Diversion of Masquerading during the Carnival, is forbidden at Court this Season.

Ratisbon, Feb. 18. This Day the Proposition for providing the Fortresses of Kehl and Philipsbourg at the common Expence of the whole Empire, was begun to be taken into Deliberation by the Diet, but with little likelihood of being brought to a good Issue; the remoter Circles alledging that they are obliged to take care of their own

Frontiers in time of Peace, without any Assistance from the rest of the Empire, and therefore this burthen ought only to extend to the States in the Neighbourhood, who are more immediately concerned in the Preservation of those Places. The Upper Palatinate is still in the Possession of the Elector Palatine.

Hambourg, Feb. 22. 'Tis advised from Copenhagen, that the King of Denmark is intirely recovered of his late Indisposition; and his Majesty's Resolution to pass into Holstein in a very short time, is confirmed. Count Steinbock had desired his Danish Majesty's Permission to go to Stockholm for two Months, but was refused, and is continued under Confinement, only two of his Servants being allowed to attend him. An Order of his said Majesty has been published in Holstein, forbidding under severe Penalties the Exporting of Bread-Corn or Oats from that Country to other Parts. The Swedes are laying Men with all Diligence, in order to take the Field in the Spring with a considerable Army. 'Tis advised from Berlin, that the King of Prussia has determined to Command in Person the Body of 30000 Men which he has ordered to put themselves on the March, and which are to be cantoned so as to be able to draw together at 24 Hours warning in the Camp marked out at Lockenitz. The Prince of Anhalt-Deffau is to serve under his Prussian Majesty in the Quality of Field-Marshal; the Counts Dhona, Doahoff, and Vinck, as Lieutenant Generals of the Horse; M. Natzmer and Arnheim as Lieutenant-Generals of the Foot; M. Gromkawa as Commissary-General of War; and M. Ilgen is to accompany his Majesty as Minister of State.

St. James's, Feb. 21. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint his Grace John Duke of Montagu to be Master Forrester and Warden of Rockingham Bayliwick, and of Geddington-woods within the Forrest of Rockingham in the County of Northampton.
