St. James's, March 4. The following Address has been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Glamorgan; presented to his Majesty by Charles Talbot, Esq; introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Stanhope, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Venice, Feb. 22. Last Night the Senate elected Sig. Aloufio Mocenigo Kr. and Sig. Giovanni Emo, to go Ambassadors Extraordinary from this Republick to congratulate his Majesty King George on his happy Accession to the Throne of Great Britain: The first of these Nobles was formerly Ambassador to the late Queen of Great Britain, and since Bailo at Constantinople; the other was lately employed by this State, tho' without a Publick Character, at the Court of France: There were 7 Competitors who voluntarily stood to be chosen Ambassadors to the British Court on this Occasion; but the Majority, by the usual Method of balloting, fell upon these two. Five Men of War, five Gallies, and three Galeasses, with Men, Provisions, Money and Ammunition, are ready to Sail for the Morea; and more Ships are fitting out in the Arsenal. The Earl of Essex and the Lord Morpeth, set out from hence this Week for Rome; whence the Earl of Burlington came hither to Day.

Ratisbon, Febr. 28. The Elector Palatine having complained to the Diet, that the States General had forcibly taken Possession of the Lordship of Kessénich, which is accounted a Fief of the Duchy of Juliers, a Resolution passed on the 25th Instant to desire the Emperor to take Care that nothing be inserted in the Treaty of Barrier with the States General which might be prejudicial to the Rights of the Empire, and of that Dutchy in particular. M. Rohr, nominated by the Empire to be Governor of Kehl, has represented in a Letter dated the 15th Instant, that if the Evacuation of that Fort be longer delayed, it will be in Danger of being ruined for want of timely Repairs, (the French not taking any Care now of the Fortifications) and by the high Waters of the Rhine. Advices from all Parts agree, that the Elector Palatine has at length consented to the Restitution of the Upper Palatinate to the Elector of Bavaria; and some say, the 5th of next Month is fixed for the Exchange of it against Kehl; tho' the Elector Palatine's Minister here does not own the having any Notice of it yet. Letters from Munich, say the Elector of Bavaria is expected at Liechtenberg, one of his Country Houses some Leagues from thence, on the 18th of next Month.

Paris, March 9. The 24th of last Month, the Bailly de Mesmes, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Order of Malta, made his publick Entry into this City, with great Magnificence; and on the 26th, he was conducted to a publick Audience of the King at Versailles. His Majesty, at the Request of the Pope, has given Count Maseli leave to raise a Regiment of French for the Service of the Republick of Venice, which Regiment is to embark at Marseilles. The 27th past, Baron Dalwich, Envoy Extraordinary from the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, had a private Audience of the King at Versailles, and took leave of his Majesty. A few Days ago the Elector of Bavaria went to Blois, to make a Visit to the Queen Dowager of Poland his Mother-in-Law, whom he had never seen before: He was received with great Ceremony, and after 4 Hours stay, left Blois to return to St. Clou.

Brussels, March 7. On the 26th past Count Koningseck having ordered Deputies from the States of Brabant to attend him, acquainted them with his having appointed Commissioners for examining the Demands made on the Part of the King of Great Britain and of the States General in favour of the Commerce of their Subjects in the Spanish Netherlands, and therefore admonished them

to exhibit forthwith what they think proper to be stipulated for the Benefit of the Trade of the People of this Province, and to chuse fit Persons for giving the necessary Informations on this Head. Two Days after, M. Geldermalsen acquainted Count Koningseck that he had received a Resolution from the States General, importing, that their High Mightinesses desire to have communicated to them the Demands which the States of these Netherlands shall make for the Establishment of their Commerce with the united Provinces, before the Commissioners of Trade nominated by the States General for regulating that Affair set out this way. He further acquainted Count Coningseck, that the States General seem desirous that this Affair of Trade, as well as that of the Barrier, should be regulated at Antwerp, rather than at Brussels, as the Imperial Minister had proposed. The Garrison which the States General have in Dendermonde, having been lately reinforced by one of their Battallions from Mons, Count Koningseck has thought it proper to dispatch an Express to Vienna with Advice of that Proceeding.

Brussels, March 8. On the 6th Count Koningseck acquainted M. Vandenbergh Minister of the States General, that the Imperial Troops being no longer able to subsist in the Provinces of Luxembourg and Limbourg, the six Weeks being expired during which they were to remain in those Provinces in pursuance of the Convention made for that Purpose, and no Express being come from the Emperor for deferring their March, they would begin to move this way to Morrow. This Morning Count Koningseck receiving Advice from Count Vehlen who commands the said Troops, that he would actually begin his March with them to Morrow, he has desired a Meeting this Afternoon with two of the Council of State, to propose to them their dispatching circular Letters for the Reception of those Troops into the respective Towns where they are to be quartered in the Provinces of Brabant Flanders and Hainault, which Towns are to be such as do not make a Part of the Barrier.
