Bruffels, March 20. OUNT Koningfeek, the Emperor's Minister. and M. Geldermaifen and Vandenbergh, Deputies of the States General, did this Day conclude and fign an Agreement for the Quartering of the Imperial Troops in this Country: Which Agreement fets ferth on the Part of the faid Deputies, that according to the Treaties of Rastad and Raden, those Troops ought nor to have entred these Provinces till after the Barrier should be fettled, and till the two Maritime Potentates should have delivered them up to his Imperial Majesty; that the Count had caused the Council of State to iffur Orders for the Reception of those Troops, contrary to the Regulations of the present Government of these Provinces, by which that Council is obliged to act in Subordination to and by Direction of the faid two Po-sentates: But that their High Mightineffes having no other View or End than the chablishing of a good Un-derstanding and sincere Friendship with his Imperial Majefty, which they look upon as the tole Foundation of jefty, which they look upon as the fole Foundation of the Barrier, had confented (with a Salvo to their Rights, without approving the Entrance of the faid Troops, and without Prejudice to any Measures which they shall take in Concert with his Britannick Majesty hereupon,) that their Deputies should confer with the Countand concert with him the Quartering of the faid Troops; the whole to be done in such Manner as is consistent with the Authority of the two Potentars, according to the Establishment. rity of the two Potentates, according to the Establishment of the present provisional Government of these Countries. And on the Part of Count Koningleck this Agreement fets forth, that his Imperial Majesty comprehending and understanding by the Convention made for the Evacuation of Luxembourg and Limbourg, that the said Troops were not obliged to remain above fix Weeks in those two Provinces, had sent him positive Orders for their marching on the Expiration of that Term; that he having waited till the 8th Instant without receiving any Counter-Order from Vienna, it was not receiving any Counter-Order from Vienna, it was not in his Power to delay their March any longer; and finding that M. Vandenbergh, to whom he then applied, had no Instruction for the Reception and Quartering of those Troops, he could not do otherwise than require the Council of State (for preventing the Disorders which the Troops might commit if they should flav in the open Country) to disparehelic Orders. should flay in the open Country) to dispatch their Orders torit: That his Intention was not to make any Innovation thereby in the Government as it is at present established by the two Potentates, which Government shall subsist till this Country be put into the Possession of his Imperial Majesty; for Proof of which, he would not retule to concert with their High Mighrinesses Deputies, in what Towns and Places to quarter the faid Troops with least Prejudice to the Country; and did agree, that they should be received and quartered by Virtue of Orders from the said Council of State, to be issued as the Ministers of the two Potentates should direct, and not otherwise. The Agreement proceeds to declare, That conformably to the Parastrician of Operators which the said formably to the Repartition of Quarters which the faid Ministers of the two Potentates thould communicate to the Council of State, Orders shall be iffued by that Council for the Reception of the said Troops into the small Towns of the Provinces of Brabant, Hainault and Flanders: So Bruffels, Antwerpand Ghent are exempted from quartering any of these Troops; as is also Bruges, unless the States General consent at Count Koningseck's Request to the quartering there of one Regiment, which coming in the Rear of the rest will not arrive at Tirlemont till the 24th or 25th Inflant; otherwise, some other Quarters must be settled for that Regiment. Part of the faid Imperial Troops entered Louvain to Day, others will enter Liere, Valvorde and Mechlin to Morrow; and Count Vehlen who commends them in chief is come hither, but is to have his blead-Quarters at Aloft.
