Brussels, March 20.

COUNT Koningseck, the Emperor's Minister, and M. Geldermalsen and Vandenberg, Deputies of the States General, did this Day conclude and sign an Agreement for the Quartering of the Imperial Troops in this Country: Which Agreement sets forth on the Part of the said Deputies, that according to the Treaties of Rastad and Baden, those Troops ought not to have entred these Provinces till after the Barrier should be settled, and till the two Maritime Potentates should have delivered them up to his Imperial Majesty; that the Count had caused the Council of State to issue Orders for the Reception of those Troops, contrary to the Regulations of the present Government of these Provinces, by which that Council is obliged to act in Subordination to and by Direction of the said two Potentates: But that their High Mightinesses having no other View or End than the establishing of a good Understanding and sincere Friendship with his Imperial Majesty, which they look upon as the sole Foundation of the Barrier, had consented (with a Salvo to their Rights, without approving the Entrance of the said Troops, and without Prejudice to any Measures which they shall take in Concert with his Britannick Majesty hereupon,) that their Deputies should confer with the Count and concert with him the Quartering of the said Troops; the whole to be done in such Manner as is consistent with the Authority of the two Potentates, according to the Establishment of the present provisional Government of these Countries. And on the Part of Count Koningseck this Agreement sets forth, that his Imperial Majesty comprehending and understanding by the Convention made for the Evacuation of Luxembourg and Limbourg, that the said Troops were not obliged to remain above six Weeks in those two Provinces, had sent him positive Orders for their marching on the Expiration of that Term; that he having waited till the 8th Instant without receiving any Counter-Order from Vienna, it was not in his Power to delay their March any longer; and finding that M. Vandenberg, to whom he then applied, had no Instruction for the Reception and Quartering of those Troops, he could not do otherwise than require the Council of State (for preventing the Disorders which the Troops might commit if they should stay in the open Country) to dispatch their Orders for it: That his Intention was not to make any Innovation thereby in the Government as it is at present established by the two Potentates, which Government shall subsist till this Country be put into the Possession of his Imperial Majesty; for Proof of which, he would not refuse to concert with their High Mightinesses Deputies, in what Towns and Places to quarter the said Troops with least Prejudice to the Country; and did agree, that they should be received and quartered by Virtue of Orders from the said Council of State, to be issued as the Ministers of the two Potentates should direct, and not otherwise. The Agreement proceeds to declare, That conformably to the Repartition of Quarters which the said Ministers of the two Potentates should communicate to the Council of State, Orders shall be issued by that Council for the Reception of the said Troops into the small Towns of the Provinces of Brabant, Hainault and Flanders: So Brussels, Antwerp and Ghent are exempted from quartering any of these Troops; as is also Bruges, unless the States General consent at Count Koningseck's Request to the quartering there of one Regiment, which coming in the Rear of the rest will not arrive at Tirlemont till the 24th or 25th Instant; otherwise, some other Quarters must be settled for that Regiment. Part of the said Imperial Troops entered Louvain to Day, others will enter Liere, Valvoerde and Mechlin to Morrow; and Count Vehlen who commands them in chief is come hither, but is to have his Head-Quarters at Alost.

St. James's, March 14. The 12th Instant, being the Day appointed by his Majesty, for the Publick Audience

of the Heers Van Duvenvoorde and Van Borsele Ambassadors Extraordinary from their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Provinces; the Earl of Grantham, and Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies, with Six Gentlemen of his Majesty's Privy Chamber brought them from Somerset-house to St. James's in his Majesty's Coach, followed by the Ambassadors Coaches in the same Order as was observed at their Entry. Their Excellencies were received at the Palace Gate by Sir Philip Meadows, Knight Marshal. His Majesty's Foot Guards were drawn up in the Court, and the Officers saluted their Excellencies with Pike and Colours, and afterwards with their Hats as they passed by, the Drums beating a March. They were received at the Door of the Guard Chamber by the Earl of Uxbridge, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and conducted by him to the end of his Command. They were received at the Door of the Room of Audience by the Duke of St. Albans, Captain of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, who were ranged on each Side of the Room; and conducted by the Duke of Shrewsbury Lord Chamberlain of his Majesty's Household. The Audience being over, their Excellencies were reconducted in the same Manner to their own House, by the Earl of Grantham, the Master of the Ceremonies, and the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber.

Afterwards, their Excellencies were conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies to an Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales: They were received at the Door of his Guard Chamber by the Earl of Hertford, Gentleman of the Bed Chamber to his Royal Highness in waiting: At the Door of the Room of Audience, his Royal Highness's Presence-Chamber, they were met and conducted by the Duke of Argyll, Groom of the Stole to his Royal Highness.
