Stockholm February 19. N the 15th Instant the Remainder of the Hereditary Prince of Hesse's Baggage, with fome of his Highness's Servant, arrived here from Stratiund. The next Morning that Prince took fourney, at the Defire ('tis faid) of his Swedish Mijeity, being accompanied by Lieutenant-General Taube, the Major-Generals Schommer and Palmquist. with fome other Military Officers, in order to take a View of all the Avenues on the Sea Coast to the North ward of this Cry, where it can be supposed the Musco-vites might land, in case the Czar should attempt to make a Descent in this Kingdom: And it is believed, that if the Weather prove tolerable, the Prince may go as far as the Province of Wester-bothnia, to view the Troops which under the Command of Major General Armfeldt revired laft Year from Finland. The laft Letters from Carlicrona advise, that they are now busiethere in fitting out the Squadron which is to cover the Transports defigned for Pomerania; which Squadron is faid to confift of 12 Ships from 40 to 60 Guns each, but 'tis not yet certainly known what Number of Troops are to be fent over. They have now also begun to careen the eight Men of War which are to have their Station in the Bothnick Gulph next Summer, as they had the laft, under the Command of Vice-Admiral Lillie: And after the Transport is made to Pomerania, the Squadron employed in that Expedition, which will be commanded by Admiral Watrang, is to cruife all the Summer between Gotland and the Coafts of Eaftland and Liefland, to intercept, (as was done last Year) all Ships that offer to Trade with any of the Ports teken from Sweden by the Czas.

Ratisbon, March 11. Yesterday a Letter from M. Rohi, dated from Offenbeurg the 2d Instant, was read in the Dyet; in which he represents again the ill State of Fort K-hl. (which was to be put into hie Hands the 6th & this Month) particularly that the Curtains and forme of th Bastions will be in Danger of being intirely ruined by the high Waters of the Rhine, if not prevented by timely Re paranons, which he fays might now be made at the Ex pence of gor 6000 Florins. On the 6th Infants Ambe and the Upper Palatinate were put into the Possession & the Bavarians, and the Palatine Troops retired to the Dutchy of Neuburg, where 300 Horfe, of those which ferved in Spain, are to be disbanded. The Pruffian Minifters here have received Advice, That the Swedes having forced a fmall Garrison of 12 Pruffians to retire from Wolgast, his Prussian Majesty has ordered an Officer to be dispatched to Stralfund, to demand the Restitution of the Place as comprehended in the Treaty of Schwedt, without which he should be obliged to take other Measures.

Ratisbon, March 14. M. Roht, the Governor of Keil, has acquainted the Dyet, that the French have put that Fort into his Hands, but in a much works Condition then he imagined, most of the Pallisades being broken down, and the under Part of the Curtain and Baffions worn aw by the Water about 4 Foot deep in feveral Places. Yafterday a Memorial was presented to the Dyet in the Name of the Elector of Cologne, defiring them to address the Emperor for the Removal of the Garrison, which the States General ftill have in Petersberg near Macftricht, and for the Demolition of that Fort which has been lately built on the Territories of Juliers without his Confent. Letters from Munich continue to fay, that the Elector of Bay fria is expected at Furtienfeld, one of his Country-Hotfes,

before the End of this Month.

Bruffels, March 23. On the 21st a Regiment of Im-perial Dragoons, confisting of fix Squadrons, arrived here; three of which Squadrons advanced yesterday towards Deinse and Harlebeck, and the other three pro-ceeded this Morning towards Alost, Grammont and Ni-nove, their respective Quarters. The other Regiment of Dragoons is distributed in Liere and Mechlin. Of the three Regiments of Imperial Foot, confishing of

is advancing towards the small Towns of the Province of Hainault; and the third which is expected to Morrow at Tirlemont is proposed to be quartered at Bruges, but that will not be determined till the Return of a Courier from the Hague. A numerous Deputation arrived here Yesterday from the States of Hainault, to make a Remonfrance to the Conference, to the Regency, and to Count Koningfeck, against quartering any of the Imperial Troops in the open Towns: A like Remonstrance hath been made on the Part of the States of Flanders, in Fa-vour of the Inhabitants of the Places where those Troops are defigned to be quartered in the Chatellanies of Aloft and Courtray, and defiring that the faid Forces may be lodged in the great Cities. M. Vander Dussen and Gockinga, Deputies of the States General for regulating the Treaty of Barrier, are returned to Antwerp from

Hague, March 26. The States General have agreed, that the Regiment of Imperial Foot which Count Koningfeck proposed should be quartered in Bruges, shall be received there. 'Tis advited from Hambourg, that the King of Sweden has let the King of Pruffia know that he is determined to keep Poffession of Wolgast. A Regulation lately Published in the Name of the King of Sweden, relating to the Swedish Privateers in the Baltick, is fo rigorous, that the Merchants of Amsterdam being very much alarmed at it, have fent Deputies to the States of Holland, to inquire how they shall be secure in their Trade; and to defire that an Embargo may be laid on the Ships which are laden for the Eaft Country, to prevent their putting to See: The States have effected that to the Atlantalty of Amilerdam. General Cadogan is expected here by the End of this Week from Vienna, and we hope that he has had fo good Success in his Negotiation at that Court, that the freaty of Barrier will form be brought to a good Conunon. Tis advised from Paris, that the Elector of Bavaria was preparing to fea out by his own Dominions, and proposed to take his Way, Werdun, Mets and Surasbourg. My Lord North and Gray, with his Lady, s arrived here.
