Madrid, April 8.

ON the 4th of this Month Mr. Methuen arrived here from Cadiz. Yesterday he had private Audiences of the King, Queen, and Prince of Asturias, and was received with all Marks of Honour: He was introduced by the Cardinal del Giudice to the King, and by his Majesty presented to the Queen: The Cardinal is appointed to treat with him, and as he will not take any Character till the Ceremonial is entirely settled, no Punctilios on that Account will obstruct the Negotiation. The King has annulled all the Decrees which had been issued in favour of the Fiscal General to the Prejudice of the Tribunal of the Inquisition, and has commanded the Cardinal del Giudice to resume the Office of Inquisitor General, declaring that it was not made vacant, and forbidding him therefore to make any Reply or Defence for himself against the Allegations and Tenour of those Decrees. At the same Time his Majesty has restored Don Juan Antonio de Torres, Don Garcia Perez de Araciell, Marquis of Andia, and three others, to their Offices of Ministers of the Royal Council, from which they were removed by Virtue of the said Decrees. Don Fernando de Figueroa is continued Sub-Governour to the Prince of Asturias. Donna Maria de Salcedo Marchioness of Montehermoso, who had the Care of the Prince's Education, is made a Lady of the Bed-Chamber to the Queen; and her Son Don Francisco de Aguirre is appointed Major-domo to her Majesty. It has been signified to the Duke of Turfis's Agent, that the King has no further Occasion for his Gallies; and that the Demands of Arrears due for his past Services, must be given

in within two Months in due Form, otherwise no Regard will be had afterwards thereto. Letters from Barcelona of the 30th of last Month relate, that the famous Party-Leader of the Miquelets Joseph Moragas, having upon Trial been found Guilty of Conspiring to raise new Commotions, had been condemned to be dragged at a Horse Tail to the usual Place of Execution at Barcelona, and there to be beheaded and quartered; some of his Accomplices were at the same Time condemned to be hanged; which Sentences having been executed accordingly, and the Catalonians being supposed to be deterred by those Examples from attempting any Disturbance, the Expedition against Majorca is now setting forward with all Application.

Turin, April 10. The Body of the Prince of Piemont, having lain on a Bed of State exposed to publick View during three Days, was interred the 26th past at Night in the Cathedral of this City. The Corps was placed in an open Chariot, a Purple Pall was laid over the Coffin, and the Crown was set upon it; the Chariot was drawn by 8 Horses covered with Mourning. It was preceded by several Hundred poor Men bearing Torches, by the Nobility, the Officers of the Court, and those of the deceased Prince, the Clergy of the Cathedral, the Knights of the Order, and the two Princes of Carignan, all on Foot; attended by their Livery Servants, and by the Life Guards and Swiss. The Train was closed by the Prince's Master of the Horse, bearing the Sword covered with Mourning, and by the Prince's Governor carrying the Collar of the Order covered with black Velvet, accompanied by the Lieutenant of the Life Guards,
