Fiema. April 20. Yesterday we received Letters from Constantinople dated the 26th of last Month, which relace, that the Grand Signior with his Court went out of that City on the 17th and encamped with a Number of Troops under Tents; that on the 20th all the Ships which were ready being sent out of the Arsenal, the Captain Pashaw went on Board and hoisted his Admirals Flag; that he waited for 12 Men of War and 4 Fireships, which twas reckoned would join him in 8 Days; and that he would then put to Sea. The Sultan with the Troops were to decamp at the same time and march towards Adrianople. 'Tis advised from Hungary, that the Turkish Aga, with a Retique of 21 Persons, passed by Essek on the 12th Instant; so that we expect him here in 3 of 4 Days, and the House where M. Matucos the Russian Minister resided is string up for him.

General Roht has again wro e to the Dyet. earneftly desiring a speedy supply of Money to prevent the Ruin of the Fortifications of Kehl. It has been notified to the Director of Mentz by an Imperial Decree, that the King of Great Britain has made a Cession of his Vote at the Dyer, as Prince of Grubenhagen, to Duke Lewis Rudolph of Brunswick, whose Minister Monsieur Kramme, will foon be introduced into the College of Princes accordingly. The Prussian Minister has acquainted the Envoys of the Princes and States of the Empire at the Dyet. That the King of Sweden far from hearkening to any Propositions which the King of Proffix has caused to be made to him for an amicable Accommodation, appears to be the more resolutely bent upon War, and feems by his Preparations to act hostilely against his Prussian Majesty; that therefore the King his Master was in Prudence obliged to provide in the best manner aainst such Attempts; that however, his Majesty to give Proofs of his Moderation had determined to wait till the

Berlin, April 21. It is forme Days past the King had held trequent Councils with his Ministers, about the Affairs of the North, and for providing every thing requisite for the Campaign; the Traops were all ordered to march to the Rendezvous affigned them; besides the Field-Artillery, Bo Pieces of heavy Campan and Mortages, with Wichlights and other Margingle of the use of the providing the march of the councils of the use of the councils. with Weolifacks and other Materials of use in making a Sege, were directed to be fent to Stetin; and the King had fixed a Day for his Depar ure towards the Camp marked out near that l'lace; yet we were not without Hopes that the King of Sweden might have been prevailed upon to prevent Extremities by accepting Tome reasonable Terms of Accomodation: But an End is put to those Hopes, for on the 23th the Court received Ade vice, that the Swedish General Ducker with 3000 Men having been landed from the Squadron commanded by Admiral Hencke on the Island of Uledom the 22d Inftant, attacked Sword in Handand carried the Penemunder Fort, making Priféners about 200 Frussians who were in it, after the Loss of some Men on both Sides. Hereupon it was immediately fignified by the King's Order to the Swedish Minister Friesendorf and his Secretary here, that within 4 Hours they should leave this Place, and departs his Majesty's Territories within 15 Hours more, two Officers being appointed to see this Order performed, and they are gone accordingly. Count Flemming, Minister of his Polish Majesty, is set out for Lubben, where 8 po Saxons are arrived, to give Orders ('tis faid) for their joyning the Prussian Army. To Day the King goes to Charlottenburg, and will proceed from thence to the Camp near Stette, where the Army will be formed by the ist of May.

Hamburg, April 30. The Swedes have made a Descent on the Island of Utedom, and possessed the emselves of the Fort of Penemunder; and some Advices say they had the like Delign upon Wollin; both which they affert ar, not included in the Treaty of Sequestration by which Steelin was put into the Hands of the King of Pruff a ; and if their Intention is to march towards Poland, both are of necessary Use to them. Some Daysago the Danes intercepted the Stralfund Post, and found several Letters from the Swedith Ministers; which we are affured contain among other things, that a Hellian Lieutenant Gollonel was arrived at Stralfund from Paris, with the Treaty of Subfidies to be furnished by France towards main aming the Hessian Troops agreed to be taken into, the King of Sweden's Service; which Treaty having been immediately satisfied by that King, was dispatched back to the Court of France by the same Lieutenant Collonel, the 15th of May being fixed for his Swedish Majesty's beginning to receive those Subfidies. Coast near Fredericksort; where being inclosed by the Danish Squadron on one Side, and by a Number of Danish Troops which marched down to the Shore from Kiehl and other Places, they were all obliged to Surrender; via. two Ships of 70 Guns each one of them ha ving Count Wachtmeister on board; one of 52, another of 42, and two of 30 Guns cach.

Hamburg, May 3. Letters from Berlintell us, that the Prince of Anhault Dessau went from thence the 27th of last Month to the Army; Mon. Ilgen, Count Dhona, and General Grumbkou, set out likewise the same day; and the King himself sollowed the 28th. His Prussian Majesly had sent Orders to General Borck to disarm the Holstein Troops which are in Garrison at Stetin.
