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*St. James's, May 16.*

**T**HE following Addresses having been transmitted from Ireland to the Right Honourable the Earl of Sunderland, were, in his Lordship's Absence, presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury and Gentlemen, Freeholders of the County of Westmeath.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriffs, Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the County and Town of Carrickfergus.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

*Vienna, May 8.* A Guard of 20 Men of the Garrison of this City, is placed at the Gate of the House where Ibrahim Aga the Turkish Envoy is lodged, to prevent his being incommoded from the Curiosity of great Numbers of People, who otherwise would press in to see him. He is allowed for his Subsistence 85 German Florins a Day. 'Tis said he will not have his Audience of Prince Eugene of Savoy before the End of this Week; and that the Court will delay his Departure from hence as long as possible, in order to secure M. Fleischman (the Emperor's Resident with the Port) from an Insult, in case Hostilities should be begun on our Frontiers before he has Notice to retire. The Empress Dowager Amalia, with the two young Archduchesses her Daughters, made a Visit Yesterday to the Emperor and Empress at Luxembourg. They were received with great Ceremony, and dined with their Imperial Majesties in the Apartment of the Empress, who gave the upper Hand to the Empress Amalia. After which their Imperial Majesties took the Diversion of Hunting; and the Elector of Trier arriving at Luxembourg at 6 in the Evening, went and met their Majesties as they were returning from Hunting. His Electoral Highness is lodged in the Castle of Luxembourg with the Gentlemen of his Court, and such of his Household as are necessary about his Person; the rest of his Domesticks are lodged in the Villages, adjacent to the Seat and to this City. 'Tis talked at Court, that the Elector Palatine is expected here very shortly. The Imperial Cuirassiers of Schelling which is one of the finest Regiments among the Emperor's Forces, has received Orders, as have also some others as well Horse as Foot, to hold themselves in a Readiness to march, without its being certainly known whither; but 'tis supposed it will be towards the Frontier of Silesia, there to form a Body of 4000 Men, who may observe the Motions of the Swedes, in case they should attempt to penetrate into Poland, or to disturb the Peace of the Empire. General Wackerbaart went this Day to Luxembourg with Prince Eugene, having received Orders to set out Post in 4 or 5 Days to go and take upon him the Command of the Saxon Forces which are marched to the Prussian Camp near Sterin.

*Ratisbon, May 13.* On the 10th Instant the Dyet took into Consideration the Means of repairing and providing the Fortresses of Kehl and Philipsbourg at the common Expence of the Empire. General Rohr in a Letter of the 6th Instant has given Notice, that the high Waters of the Rhine have worn away already part of the Dam and Glacis at Kehl, and that the Countercarp would be in Danger, if not prevented by timely Repair, to which he demands a speedy supply of Money. The Imperial Commissioner Prince Lowenstein is not yet arrived, being detained at Vienna by his private Affairs. Count Furstemberg, who has been employed by the Emperor for some Years in the Upper Circles, went thro' this

Place last Week for Vienna, being named a principal Judge or chief Officer of the Imperial Chamber at Wetzlar.

*Stetin, May 13.* The Marquis de Croissi, Envoy Extraordinary from the Court of France, had Audience of the King of Prussia on the 9th Instant in the Camp, and delivered two Letters to his Majesty: On the 12th that Minister set out for Stralsund. 'Tis affirmed that his Prussian Majesty has declared he will wait till the 20th Instant the King of Sweden's Resolution on certain Terms of Accommodation, which the Marquis de Croissi is to propose to him; and in the mean time the March of the Prince of Anhalt-Deffau, with a Body of Prussians in order to dislodge the Swedes from the Island of Use-dom, is suspended: All the Saxons from Lubben have joined the Prussian Army.

*Hague, May 21.* The States of this Province of Holland and Westfriseland adjourned themselves on the 18th to this Day, and accordingly they met again this Morning. The Men of War which are to form the Dutch Squadron designed for the Baltick, are to rendezvous in the Texel to Morrow; Rear-Admiral de Veih is appointed to command it, and 'tis said he has Orders to make directly to the Kattegat near the Sound, there to meet and join the British Squadron, to proceed with them into that Sea, and to assist in seeing the Merchant Ships of both Nations bound for the Places there now in the Possession of the Muscovites safe into their respective Ports. The young Princess Carolina Daughter of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, continues in very good Health: The Ladies of her Court will be treated to Night by Mrs. Cadogan: Her Highness waits only for a fair Wind to embark at Rotterdam for England, her own and her Retinue's Baggage having been sent Yesterday on board the Yachts. Prince Kurakia, Minister of the Czar of Muscovy, went from hence this Evening to pass over to England in the Packet-boat. The Bishop of Munster having for some Years kept a Garrison of his own Troops in Bentheim, the Count of that Name has lately represented to the States General, that those Troops are very burthensom to the Inhabitants, that the former Bishop of Munster had promised to withdraw that Garrison, and therefore desires them to use such Instances as may prevail with the present relate of that See to withdraw the same, the rather because that Place is situate on the Frontiers of the Province of Over-Yssel: Their High Mightinesses have sent this Remonstrance to their Deputies at Antwerp, with order to press Count Koningseck to use his good Offices to the End the said Troops of Munster may be now withdrawn.

*Edinburgh, May 6.* On the 4th Instant the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland met here, and chose for their Moderator Mr. William Carstares one of his Majesty's Chaplains. His Majesty's Commission to the Right Honourable the Earl of Rothes was read, as was likewise his Majesty's most gracious Letter to the Assembly. His Majesty's High Commissioner made a Speech to the Assembly, which was answered on their Part by the Moderator, and a Committee was appointed to draw up a dutiful Answer to his Majesty's most gracious Letter, which being reported this Day was unanimously approved and presented to the high Commissioner to be transmitted to his Majesty.

*Edinburgh, May 9.* Mr. James Maitland Minister of Innerkethnie, and his Brother Mr. John Maitland Minister of Forgue, having been suspended by the Provincial Synod of Aberdeen for not observing the 20th of January last as the Day of Thanksgiving for his Majesty King George's happy Accession to the Crown, and for not praying for his Majesty by Name, they did appeal from the said Synod to the General Assembly: Who having considered



Appeal, and the Reasons alledged for and against it, on this Day by an unanimous Vote approve the Synod's proceeding in that Matter; and the two said Ministers refusing to answer to any Questions for removing the Suspicion they lye under of Disaffection to his Majesty, the General-Assembly did by another Vote depose them *Simpliciter* from the Office of the Ministry, and appointed their Churches to be declared vacant.
