Hereas it hath been represented unto Us, that many and great Inconveniencies have arisen among it our Forces for want of an exact Register of the Dates of all Officers Commissions, by Vertue whereof they have, or may take Rank in our Army; our Will and I leafure is, That the Officers of the Army wherefiever now employ'd, whose Commissions are not already Register'd, do enter the same with our Secretary at War, and with our Commissary General of the Musters, in the space of fix Months from the Date hereof, pursuant to the 41st Article of War, which requires that all Comm flions granted by Us our Captain General, or Communder in Chief of our Forces, to any Officers in Pay, shall be brought to the Commissary of the Musters and Secretary at War, who are to Receive and Enter the same in a Book fairly written; and that no Commission Officer shall be allowed in Muster without a Commission from Us, or the Commander in Chief for the time being, and the same Enter'd with the Commissary General of the Musters, or his Deputies and Secretary at War. And fuch Officers w o have now Commissions in our Army, and do not Enter the s. me as aforesaid, shall for such neglect lose the Bene t of such Rank as they may be entitled to by Virtue of their respective Commission ons. And all Officers who are now Abroad in our Service, are to transmit to our Taid Secretary at War, and our faid Commissary-General, Authentick Certificates of the Dates of their Commissions, signed by the Commander in Chief under whom they serve, or by any of our Deputy Commissaries of the Musters. And our Secretary at War, our Commissary General, and all the Of ficers now in our Army are required to take Notice hereof, and govern them less accordingly. Given at our Court at St. James's this 9th Day of February 1714-15. In the First Year of our Reign.

Constantinople, May 4. The Vizier is now advanced to Salonichi, whence, after foiling his Horses about 15 Days while the Asiatick Troops are coming up, he will march forward to the Moreas where we reckon he may arrive about the 10th of next Month. The Army will be stronger in Foot, than any which the Turks have drawn together in many Years. They are faid to carry with them into the Field 300 Pieces of great Cannon and 200 Field-Pieces, and they are abundantly provided with all Sorts of Ammunition:
Tis still the general Opinion that the Vizier will lay Siege to Napoli di Romania, tho' 'tis probable he may detach large Bodies of Troops from the Army, under some of the Basshaws, to beliege other Places. The Apprehension of the Emperor's coming into the War, renders the Porte very desirous to dispatch as much Work as may be possible this Year in the Morea: The Captain Pashaw is gone out of the Dardanels with the Fleets which confifts at prefent of 35 Ships of the Line, to which 'tis reported will be added 10 Mer-chant Ships lately come from Alexandria, which will carry above 50 Guns each, fome whereof are to be restted here, and others at Negropont.

Ratisbon, July 11. The Duke of Mechienbourg-Strelitz having addressed to the Dyes to be discharged from paying the Arrears of his Contingent due to the Empire, in Consideration of what his Country had suffered by the Troubles in the North, and the Loss of his Palace by Fire; his Memorial was taken into Deliberation on the 5th Initant, and on the 8th a Conclusion was made to recommend his Case to the Emperor, and desire that he may be freed from any further Demand of Arrears of Contributions to the Empire, and to his Circle, the without Prejudice to the other States. Some Days ago the Canons of Rati-bon Bad a private Meeting to consider of a Successor for the Elector of Cologne in this Bishoprick, his Refignation having been brought hither from Bonn by Count Konigsfeldt, who has had the Management of this Affair: The greatest part of the Canons readily agreed on Prince Clement, fourth Son of the Elector of Bavaria; who is about 15 Years old, and not long since received the first Tonfare from the Bishop of Frising, being like-wise designed to succeed in that see, which is much more considerable than this of Rativbon. The Pope's Bull for the Election being not yet arrived, it will be two or three Months before all is adjuled. To Day being the Elector of Bavaria's Birth-day, great Rej scings will be made at Munich, and the Illumirations will be used which had been deligned for his publick Entry. The Duke of Saxe-Gotha fends into the Venetian Service four thousand Men, who only wait for Orders to begin their March. The Duke of Orders to begin their March. The Duke of Wirtemberg furnisles that Republick with 1500 Men at present, and will supply them with 1500 more towards the Winter. The Prince of Oetting puts into their Service a Regiment of 1000 Men; and three Battallions are raising for them in the Name of the Prince of Sultzbach. Letters of the 1st Instant from Kibbs on the Frontiers of Transylvania, say the Turks were very quiet and friendly in the Ne ghbourhood, and continued to trade much more freely than they did formerly. But the Imperialists were very buisse in fortifying Weissembourg, and all their Regiments were ordered to encamp. The fine Weather gave them Hopes of a plentiful Harvest to fill their Magazines, of which they had very great Need.
