St. James's, August 1. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council, together with the Principal Inhabitants of the Borough of King's Lynn in the County of Norfolk; presented to his Majesty by Sir Charles Turner, and the Right Honourable Robert Walpole, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty, Gentlemen, Freemen and other Inhabitants of the Town and Port of Dover; presented to his Majesty by Matthew Aylmer and Philip Papillon, Esqrs; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset, Lord Warden of the Cinque-Ports.

An humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of Bedford; presented to his Majesty by William Farrer and John Thurloe Brace, Esqrs; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Kent, Lord-Lieutenant of that County.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

St. James's, August 2. Yesterday being the Day of his Majesty's happy Accession to the Crown, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction; the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and at Night there were Illuminations and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

Vienna, July 20. On the 10th Instant Prince Eugene of Savoy came back from Comorra in Hungary, where he has been to view the Fortifications. On the 11th the Count du Luc Ambassador of France had a private Audience of the Emperor. On the 13th Count Kinski was declared Chancellor of Bohemia, and on the 16th he took the usual Oath in the Bohemian Council assembled at Court for that Purpose: The Emperor has received four Letters together from the King of Sweden, who in them gives him the Title of Catholic Majesty. The Venetian Ambassadors are to make their Entry here on the 23d Instant. The last Letters from Adrianople relate, that Orders were sent to the Hospodar of Moldavia, to furnish immediately all that is yet necessary for finishing the Fortifications of Cochim; And that the Tartar Han had sent two Bodies, one of 12000 Men into the Morea, and the other of 10000 into Dalmatia, commanded by his two Brothers.

Ratisbon, July 29. The Elector Palatine having complained to the Dyet against the Incroachments of the French in seizing his Bailliage of Seltz on the Upper Rhine, the Provostship and Tolls there, with Part of the Succession of Veldentz, to which he lays Claim and was in Possession; on Pretence that those Places and Rights depend on the Sovereignty of Alsatia, the same Ground on which the famous Reunions were formerly made, tho' directly contrary to the Treas-

ties of Westphalia, Ryswick, and Baden; a Resolution has been taken to desire the Emperor would employ his best Offices and all proper Means in the Name of the Empire, for procuring his Electoral Highness due Satisfaction from the Court of France. The Duke of Wirtemberg Monbeliard, the Bishop of Spire, and the Ecclesiastical Electors on the Rhine, have Grievances of the same Nature concerning their Fiefs and Penches which lye in Alsatia; tho' as they have not yet been proposed in Form, the Resolution about them is deferred, but will not fail to be in their Favour. The Disputes between the Houses of Denmark and Holstein having been recommended to the Dyet in several Memorials by the respective Ministers, they were proposed on the 19th Instant, and by a Majority of Votes were recommended to the Emperor's Examination, that Care might be taken at the Congress of Brunswick to put an End to these Disputes according to the Justice of the Cause, the Treaty of Westphalia, and the publick Constitutions of the Empire. The circular Dyet of Swabia has been for some Days assembled at Ulm, to take the proper Measures for their Advantage and Security in Conjunction with the other associated Circles, which they judge more necessary since the dangerous Situation of Affairs in the North might occasion new Disorders in the Empire. This Morning Prince Lowenstein's Baggage arrived here from Vienna, and he is expected in a little Time. The Director of Mentz is gone for a few Days to Munich, and the Dyet will not meet again till he returns.

Stockholm, June 17. On the 5th Instant the Hereditary Prince of Hesse returned hither from taking a View of the Coast between this Place and Galle. 'Tis said his Highness will speedily make another Tour, to view all the Troops in this Kingdom. Lieutenant General Ranck set out from hence on the 15th for Stralsund; and yesterday M. Maltzbourg, who lately came hither from the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel to compliment the Princess Royal on her Marriage, went from hence likewise for Stralsund. On the 14th Instant Mr. Jackson, the British Resident, presented to the Royal Chancery here a Memorial in the Name of the King his Master, demanding Satisfaction for the Damage suffered by his Majesty's Subjects, by the taking of their Ships and Goods by the Swedish Privateers.

Copenhagen, July 27. On the 22d Instant at Night arrived here a Lieutenant dispatched by Admiral Rabe, with an Account, that the Danish and Swedish Fleets had been in sight of each other three Days; but that Admiral Rabe observing the Swedes had the Wind of him, had judged it proper to retire towards the Island of Meunen; the rather because the Swedes had 21 Men of War of the Line, and he has but 16, and therefore he desires a Reinforcement as soon as possible. Hereupon all Diligence is used to Man and send out three Ships, one of 60 Guns, the others of 50 Guns each that are in this Port, two of which will put out to Sea this Day or to morrow, and the other will follow very speedily. In the mean while Admiral Rabe lies between Meunen and Dornbusch.

Hague, August 6. To-morrow the States of the Province of Holland will assemble; and 'tis expected that the Affair of Uniting the North Quarter of this Province with that of the South, so as for the future they may both have but one Treasury and but one Committee of Council here, will be brought to some maturity in this Session. Yesterday the Directors of the East-India Company at Amsterdamb received Advice of the Arrival on our Coasts of 24 Ships from the East-Indies, besides one which was separated from the rest; and that two more may be expected in September or October.

Whereas the Parliament has presented an Address to his Majesty, that he will be graciously pleased to allow Full-Pay to such Half-Pay Officers as are not otherwise provided for, and that his Majesty will give Orders to the said Half-Pay Officers to hold themselves in a Readiness to be employ'd in such Manner as his Majesty shall think fit; it is his Majesty's Pleasure, that in Pursuance of the said Address, all Half-Pay Officers who are now in Great Britain, and not otherwise-provided for, do hold themselves in a Readiness for immediate Service.
