St. James's, August 12. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Common-Council Men of the Borough of New Woodstocke; presented to his Majesty by General Cadogan, one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough.

An humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Grand-Jury at the Assizes held at the Castle of Winton the 2d Instant; presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Bolton, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household.

An humble Address of the Portreeve, Bailiff, Gentlemen and other the chief Inhabitants of the Borough of Honiton in the County of Devon; presented to his Majesty by William Yonge, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Noblemen, Barons, Freeholders, and Commissioners of Supply for the Shire of Edinburgh; presented to his Majesty by John Baird, Esq; Member of Parliament for that Shire, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Argyll.

An humble Address of the Bailiff, Burghers and Burgesses of Burroughbridge in the County of York; presented to his Majesty by Sir Richard Steele and Thomas Wilkinson, Esq; Members of Parliament for the said Borough, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

An humble Address of the Borough of Aldborough in the County of York; presented to his Majesty by William Monson and William Jessop, Esqrs; Members of Parliament, and Mr. Charles Wilkinson, Magistrate of the said Borough, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Justices, Sheriff, Town-Clerk, Burgesses and Grand Jury of the Town and County of Poole, presented to His Majesty by Sir William Lewen, one of their Representatives in Parliament.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Vienna, August 3. The Marquis de Prie is now said to be designed for Ambassador from the Emperor to the Court of France. Letters from Adrianople of the 18th of July, N. S. advise that a Review being made of the Grand Vizier's Army at its Entrance into the Isthmus, it was found to consist of 14794 Horse and 59200 Foot; that there was a great Mortality among their Horses and Cattle; that the Venetian and Turkish Fleets being in Sight of one another near Andros, they expected to hear very soon of an Engagement; that on the 1st a great Flie at Constantinople had consumed 10000 Houses, being a fourth Part of that City; that on the 6th an Aga arrived there with Orders from the Grand Vizier to the Camaician Pashaw to release the Venetian Prisoners who were in the Seven Towers, as also the Bailo, and to give them Liberty to go by Sea to Venice; whereupon they hired a French Vessel, on which they embarked with their Goods, and lay off the Dardanel, on the 17th, in order to take in the Bailo, and to continue their Voyage to Venice.

Copenhagen, August 10. On the 6th sailed from hence a Prame, carrying 250 Men and 46 Guns, and this Morning was followed by 3 Gallies newly arrived from Norway, in order to join the Danish Fleet on the Coasts of Rugen.

Hamburgh, August 16. Letters from the Danish Army advise, that on the 17th instant the King of Denmark received an Express from a Admiral Rabe, with the News that on 8th, that a Admiral attacked the Swedish Fleet, consisting 21 Ships, in the Heighth of Jasmund, and after a vigorous Engagement, obliged the Swedes to retire, who, having a fair Wind, arrived the 9th at Carlscrona, and though several of their Ships were damaged, yet they all escaped. Vice-Admiral Jues, of the Danes, was killed by a Cannon-Shot. The Danish Fleet is near Rugen, and is said the King of Denmark has ordered, that the Provisions for his Army shall be sent for the future by Water, his Majesty's Fleet being now Master of the Sea.

Brussels, August 19. The King of Great Britain having been pleased to recall the two Regiments of British Foot, garrisoned in Newport, Brigadier Preston arrived there on the 7th, in order to their speedy Imbarcation for England. These Troops will be replaced by two Battalions of Imperialists from Bruges, and the latter by the Regiment of Baden, which Regiment will reach this City to Night, to pursue their March to Morrow to Ghent, and be conveyed by Water the next Day to Bruges. Count Koningseck, his Imperial Majesty's Plenipotentiary for regulating the Barrier, returned to this Place Yesterday Morning from the Court of Great Britain. That Minister proposes to be going in a few Days to Antwerp, in order to renew the Conferences there with the Dutch Deputies, who are expected back from Holland by the 24th Instant. M. Pesters, Intendant of the States General in the new Cantons, is lately come hither from the Hague, and will set out this Evening for Valenciennes, where he is to confer with M. Berniere, for adjusting the great Demands he makes in the Name of the French King, on the Chaullany of Tournay, as well for Arrears of Subsidies before that Place was reduced by the Allies, as for what is due since upon Account of Fortifications.
