ST. James's, August 15. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, and other Dignitaries of the Cathedral Church of St. Peter in Exon, and of the Cergy of the City of Exeter and Parts adjacent; pre-fented to his Majesty by the Reverend Dr. Lynford, Archdeacon of Barnstaple, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Foundend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. N. B. The Address from the City of Exter was

not presented by Dr. Lynford, as was faid by Mi-itake in the Gazette of the 9th Infant. An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Coadjutors, Gentlemen and other Inhabitants of the Corporation of Newark, pre-fented to his Majesty by the Honourable Conyers Darcy and Brigadier Sutton, their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke

of Newcastle.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Stockholm, July 16. The former Polt from Carlforona brought an Account, that the Swedish Fleet put to Sea on the 6th Inflant, confisting of 21 Ships of the Line of Battle; and Letters of the 11th which arrived this Day from Carlshamb confirm the same, adding that on the 8th they heard fome Cannonading towards the Isle of Rugen. Three Days before the Fleet sailed Admiral Henck joined it with three Frigates from Stralfund, and brought the King's last Orders what the Admirals should undertake. M. Henck brought also a Letter from the King to the Prince of Hesse, up in the Receipt whereof his Highness gave Order for his Baggage to be forthwith fent to the Army, which is now formed at the same Place it, was last year, and confifts of about 10000 Foot and 2000 Horse: Yesterday Morning the Prince himself set out for the Camp; the Head Quarters being at a Village called Hunsby about 10 Leagues from this City: Before his Highness went to the Army, he and the Princess were for some Daysen. tertained by the Queen Grandmother at her Palace of Drotning-Holm. Six Gallies which should have reinforced Vice-Admiral Wachtmeister's Squadron in this Neighbourhood above two Months ago, but could not be manned till now, will in a few Days fail to join him under the Command of Rear-Admiral Ornfeldt: In the mean time 'tis reported that the Muscovites have already made a Descent upon the Island of Gotland; but whether there be real ground for this Report we cannot yet learn.

Hambourg, August 16. Letters from the Danish Camp relate, that on the 13th the Confederate Army drew up in Order of Battle, and fired three Vollies by way of rejoicing for the Advantage gained by the Danes in forcing the Swedish Fleet to retire to Carlscrona, The Prussians at Stetin have begun to imbark the heavy Artillery which was brought thither from Berlin, in order to its being transported to the Camp before Stralfund, which may be done without any Risque now that the Danes are Masters at Sea; and 'tis expected that the Attack designed to be made on the Island of Rugen will not be delayed many Days. | vents went from hence yesterday. Copenhagen, Augult 13. We have received an Account, that on the 7th Inflant the Danish Fleet came in Sight of the Swedish Fleet, which was then near the filand of Rugen, and under sail to, wards Carlscrona; but there being 5 Leagues Disance between the m, and the Wind at South-West, all that the Danes could do that Day was to endeavour to approach the Swedes, who made the best of their way to the Eastward in order to avoid an Engagement. On the 8th in the Mornaling the Danes got, up with them; both Fleets plyed the same way with the same Wind, the Danes to the Larboard of the Swedes.
