**T**HIS Day the following Address was presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Somerset, Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, attended by the Reverend the Vice-Chancellor, and several Masters of Colleges, with divers other Members of that University.

*The Humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.*

*Most gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E presume to appear in your Royal Presence to testifie our Zeal and Affection to your Person and Government, called to it by the just Concern we are under from the Danger which threatens your Majesty and your People, a Danger in which not only the present Age, but even the latest Posterity is deeply concerned; for the Liberty and establish'd Religion of *Britain*, as they have in your Majesty and your Family the best, so have they also, in all human Views, the last Support.

In these Circumstances we shou'd forget not only our Oaths and Obligations, but even our selves and those who are dearest to us, shou'd we not be forward to pay all due Allegiance to your Majesty; and those must break thro' all the Ties of natural Affection, who can now be guilty of the Crime of Treason. While we enjoyed the Blessing of our late excellent Princess (whose Memory will be ever dear and sacred to us) your Title to this Crown was always our second Care, as your peaceable Enjoyment of it is now become our first; and we cheerfully embrace this Opportunity to declare to your Majesty what we have constantly profess'd, that we do acknowledge your Majesty for the only lawful and rightful King of these Realms; and that we will by all means suitable to our Station maintain and support the Title and Interest of your Majesty and your Family against all Opposers whatsoever.

As your Majesty has been so gracious as to promise that the Constitution in Church and State shall be the Rule of your Government, an Assurance which has made a lasting Impression on our Minds; so we heartily wish that all your Subjects, led to a Sense of their Duty by your Royal Ex-

ample, may make the same Constitution the Rule of their Obedience. Such Consent is the natural Strength of Kingdoms, and wou'd defeat the Attempts and Hopes of all our Enemies: And for our selves (whatever Representations have been made to our Prejudice) we do assure your Majesty that we have and will so instruct the Youth committed to our Care, that in their dutiful Behaviour towards your Majesty they may shew forth an Example of those Principles of Loyalty and Obedience, which this University, pursuing the Doctrines of our Church, has ever steadily maintained.

St. James's, August 16. This Day the following Address was presented to His Majesty, by Mr. Nathaniel Hedges accompanied by divers Ministers of the several Denominations of Protestant Dissenters, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Middlesex.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

*The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers, of the several Denominations in and about the Cities of London and Westminster.*

May it please your Majesty,

**W**E your Majesty's most Loyal Subjects think our selves oblig'd in Duty and Gratitude humbly to acknowledge that seasonable Protection which your Majesty has been pleas'd to give to those of our Persuasion, from the late Rebellious Tumults, and for your gracious Answer to the Address of your faithful Commons, wherein they desire that a full Compensation be made to those whose Sufferings they so justly impute to their Zeal and firm Adherence to your Majesty and your Government.

We can assure your Majesty, that no just Occasion has been given by us to our Fellow Subjects for any such Treatment; nor can the Principles which oblige us to dissent from the Church of *England*, be a reasonable Provocation to any who have the least regard to the Common Rights of Mankind, or the Rules of the Christian Religion.

We desire nothing more than to enjoy our Civil Rights, with a just Liberty to profess our own Religious Sentiments, which we take to be a Privilege due to all Men. We have been always ready to assist the Church of England in defence of the Protestant Religion, when in real and imminent Danger; being agreed with them, and all Protestant Churches, in those Principles that began the Reformation; and which alone can justify and support it.

When there has been a Design to introduce Popery and Arbitrary Power, the Protestant Dissenters have generally been first attack'd; nor know we any other Reason why we have now suffer'd the Outrage of Papists, Nonjurors, and other dissenting Persons; but that they were sure we were a Body of Men fix'd in our Duty to your Majesty, and lay the most expos'd to popular Insults, against which your Majesty and your two Houses of Parliament in your great Wisdom and Goodness have given us a seasonable and we hope effectual Security for time to come.

Whilst your Majesty's Government is disturb'd at home, and threaten'd with an Invasion from abroad, we can answer for those of our Persuasion, that there are not any of them whose Principles and Inclinations will not influence them to assist and support your Majesty and the Protestant Religion to the utmost of their Power; we look upon our selves bound by the strongest Ties of Duty, Gratitude and Interest, to acknowledge and maintain your Majesty's undoubted Right and Title to the Imperial Crown of these Realms, and to declare our utmost Abhorrence of all Attempts either at home or abroad in favour of a Popish Pretender.

May that gracious Providence that has so signally appear'd in bringing your Majesty to the Throne of these Kingdoms, continue to protect and defend your Royal Person and Family, against all Attempts of your open and secret Enemies.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Commission of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

May it please your Majesty,

Your Majesty having had the Goodness to communicate to your People the certain Information you have had of mischievous Designs against our present Happiness, as to our dearest Concerns:

*We should be guilty of an unaccountable neglect of our Duty, if we did not upon such an Occasion express our deep Sense that our Religion, our Laws, and our Liberties are, under the good Providence of the Almighty and infinitely wise God, owing to your Majesty's seasonable and happy Accession to the Throne of these Nations, to which you alone, Great Sir, had the just Title; and the signal Advantages we have been already Partakers of, and still enjoy under your Majesty's wise and just Administration, give us such a comfortable Prospect of our own and our Posterity's future Happiness under the auspicious Settlement of the Crown upon your sacred Person, and the Protestant Line in your Royal Family, that there is nothing that ought to be so dear to us as not to hazard for preserving such an excellent Establishment as makes all that is dear to us our own, and is, under God, our strongest Bulwark against Popery and Slavery.*

*When we reflect upon the lamentable Circumstances these Nations would be in, both as to Religion and Civil Liberties, if a Pretender, educated in the Abominations of Popery and Maxims of Tyranny, supported from abroad by such as rare Enemies to the Liberties of Europe, and by a deluded Jacobite dissaffected Party at home, should succeed in his Designs, we cannot but be sensible that the having a Sovereign who hath the Happiness of his People for his great Aim, is so valuable a Blessing as must make us have the utmost Detestation of whatever may have the least Tendency to deprive us of it.*

*We therefore, Great Sir, beg Leave, to assure your Majesty, that we shall always endeavour in our Stations to testify our constant Fidelity and Affection to your sacred Person and Government, and our Readiness unanimously and heartily to concur in whatever Method shall be suitable to our Character with all your other Subjects, who are true Protestants and sincere Lovers of your Majesty's Royal Person and the Settlement of the Protestant Succession, for the Stability of the Crown upon your sacred Head, for the Protestant Religion, and all the valuable Blessings that in the Goodness of God we are now possessed of under your happy Administration, against the Pretender and all other Enemies to the true Interest of these Nations.*

*May your Majesty under Divine Protection and Conduct long sway the Scepter over your People for the publick Good at home and abroad; may you be a Terror to all your Enemies, and for ever dash the Hopes of all that are Opposers of your just Title; and may you, after fullness of happy Days upon Earth, be crowned with Glory, Honour and Immortality in Heaven, transmitting the Scepter of these Nations to your Royal Progeny through all future Generations. These are the sincere and fervent Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, Your Majesty's most Faithful, most Obedient, and most Loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in the Commission of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.*

*Genoa, August 13.* The Gloucester, a British Man of War commanded by Captain Passengers, hath been detained here some Days by bad Weather; but the Wind being now favourable, the Captain designs to sail this Evening, in order to joyn Admiral Baker who is at Port Mahon.

*Ratisbon, August 15.* The Dyet continue still their Vacation, and the Prince of Lowenstein is not yet set out from Vienna. Letters of the 4th Instant from Segedin, say the Turks had invested Napoli di Romania, the Garrison of which Place consisted of 6000 Men: There was a Report as if the Grand Signior had a Design of wintering in Belgrade, for which End some Preparations were making; and the neighbouring Provinces were obliged to bring in great Quantities of Corn, Cannon Balls, &c. for the Magazines. Letters from Buda of the 6th Instant bring Advice, that the Imperialists had begun to work on the Reparation of their Frontier-Places; and that when the Regiments of Dragoons of Pate and Vaubone, and of Wallis and Bagni Foot, now on their March from Naples and Milan, were affixed, their Army would be 70000 Men; besides 7000 more which they expected from Bohemia, Silesia, and Austria, and not including the Body of Troops already in Transylvania.
