Most gracious Sovereign,

WE profume to appear in your Royal Prefence to tell he our Zeal and Affection to your Perion and Government, called to it by the juft Concern we are under from the Danger which threatens your Majefly and your People, a Danger in which not only the prefent Age, but even the lateft Pofietity is deeply concerned; for the Liberty and establish'd Religion of Britain, as they have in your Majefly and your Family the best, fo have they also, in all human Views, the last Support.

Support. In these Circumstances we shou'd forget not only out, Oaths and Obligations, but even our selves and those who are dearest to us, shou'd we not be forward to pay all due Allegiance to yoar Maje fly; and those must break thro'all she fies of natural Affection, who can now be guilty of the Crime of Treason. While we enjoyed the Blessing of out late excellent Princes: (whose Memory will be ever dear and facred to us) your Title to this Crown was always our fecond Care, as your peaceable Enjoyment of it is now become our first; and we chearfully embrace this Opportanity to declare to your Majesty what we have constantly profess, that we do acknowledge your. Majesty for the only fawful and rightful King of these Realms; and that we will by all means fuitable to our Station maintain and fupport the Tiele and Interest of your Majesty and your Family against all Oppofers whatever.

As your Majefly has been fo gracious as to promife that the Conflicution in Church and State shall be the Rule of your Government, an Assurance which has made a lassing Impression on our Minds; fo we heartily wish that all your Subjects, led to a Sense of their Duty by your Royal Example, may make the fame Confficution the Rule of their Ob.dience. Such Confent is the natural Strength of Kingdoms, and wou'd defeat the Attempts and Hopes of all our Enemies: And for our felves (whatever Reprefentations have been made to our Prejudice) we do aftere your Majefty that we have and will is infruct the Youth committed to our Care, that in their dutiful Behaviour towards your Majefty they may flew forth an Example of those Principles of Loyalty and Obedience, which this University, purfuing the Dofrigues of our Church, has ever fleadily maintained.



When there has been a Defign to introduce Popery and Arbitrary Power, the Protestant Differents have generally been first arack'd; nor know we any other Reason why we have now fuffer'd the Outrage of Papifis, Nonjurors, and other difficient Perform, but that they were fure we were a Body of Men fix'd in our Dury to your Majefty, and lay the maft exposed to popular Infults, againft which your Majefty and your two bioufes of Parliament in your great Wildom and Goodnels have given us a feafonable and we hope effectual Security for time to come

Letters from Buda of the 6th Inftant bring Advice, that the Imperialifts had begun to work on the Reparation of their Frontier-Places; and that when the Regiments of Dragoons of Pate and Vaubone, and of Wallis and Bagni Foot, now on their March from Naples and Milan, were affived, their Army would be 70000 Men; belides 7000 more which they expected from Bohemis, Silelia, and Auftria, and not including the Body of Troops already in Tranfyivania.
