(Waiting and Loading Restrictions) (Amendment No. 99) Traffic Order 1994

Notice is hereby given that the Council of the London Borough of Merton, after consulting the Commissioner of Police of the Metropolis, in exercise of power conferred by section 6 of the Road Traffic Regultion Act 1984, have made the above-mentioned Order on 2nd February 1994. The Order will come into operation on 14th February 1994.
