Yesterday between eight and nire in the Morning the Duke of Orleans came into this City to the Parliament, attended by the Guards in the same manner as when the King comes to Parliament, the Duke of Guise with an Half-Pike in his Hand, being at the Head of the Regiment of French Guards, of which he is Colonel. The Duke of Orleans made a Speech to the Parliament, in Expressions of high Esteem and Regard for them and their Authority, and demanded the Regency without Limitation or Restriction, as of Right belonging to him by Proximity of Blood, and by the Usage and Laws of the Kingdom, without allowing any Disposition to the Constrary which might be made by the Will or
