**St. James's, August 29.** The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Grand-Jury, and other Gentlemen assembled at the Assizes held at Lanceson in and for the County of Cornwall on the 17th of August, 1715; presented to his Majesty by Joseph Silly, Esq; High-sheriff of that County, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Radnor, Lord-Lieutenant, and accompanied by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Winchester, the Right Honourable Hugh Boscow, Esq; Comptroller of his Majesty's Household, and other Gentlemen of the said County.

An humble Address of the Gentlemen and Inhabitants of Portsmouth formed into a Regiment under the Command of the Right Honourable General Erle, his Majesty's Governor there; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable General Erle.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Port of New Romney in the County of Kent (one of his Majesties Cinque Ports) presented to his Majesty by Sir Robert Furness, Bart. one of their Representatives in Parliament; introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset and Middlesex, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Corporation of Portsmouth presented to his Majesty by Sir Charles Wager, Kc. one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Grafton.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder Representatives in Parliament, Deputy-Recorder, Aldermen, Town-Clerk, Capital Burgesses, Clergy, Gentlemen and Inhabitants of the Corporation of Stamford in the County of Lincoln; sent up by the Right Honourable the Earl of Exeter, and presented to his Majesty by Sir John Brownlow, Bart. in the Absence of the Representatives of the said Corporation, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Devonshire.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

**From on Board His Majesty's Ship the Cumberland at Revel, July 30.** The 17th Instant we sail'd from Dantzic, and on the 22d being off the Island of Dagho we met a Muscovite Squadron consisting of 7 Sail, which was going to cruise upon the Coast of Finland. On the 23d we passed by the Muscovite Fleet, which lay at Anchor under a Place called Roguerwyck, and were about 19 Men of War commanded by Admiral Count Apraxin; for the Czar on board his Ship wears the Distinction of Vice-Admiral of the Blue. The same Day we came to Anchor in this Port, whether the Muscovite Fleet returned the next Day. Sir John Norris upon their Arrival sent a Compliment, and waited that Night on his Czarish Majesty on board his Admiral; the Czar has since been on board our Admiral, and was received with the Salutes which the Fleet has always paid to Princes. Orders are sent to hasten the Trade from Petersburg, and to bring them to the Rendezvous here, after which we shall proceed to gather in the Trade from Riga, Coningsberg and Dantzic in order to convoy them thro' the Baltic.

**Copenhagen, August 24.** The 19th Vice Admiral Trojel was detached with 7 Men of War, and a new Flame or flat-bottom'd Boat, toward the Isle of Rugen to be assistant in covering Vice-Admiral Schellon's Flotilla; several Trans or

Ships joined the said M. Trojel at Sea, which were to carry Artillery, Provisions and other Necessaries to M. Schellon; we expect daily to hear that this last Vice Admiral has forced the Passage by the Isle of Ruden, and that M. Rosenpalm has at the same time made a Descent in that of Rugen. The 20th two Ships of Admiral Rabe's Squadron, that is the Wenden and the Fuhnen were brought into this Port to be disarmed, and the Jorteburg and the Sudermanland are fitting out in their stead. Admiral Rabe who has lain for some Days at Anchor with 12 Men of War at Steffens near Kiog, to be ready to go to Sea in case the Swedes had come out of Carlscrona so soon as they had said they would, having now received all his Provisions, and having been thoroughly refitted for Service, was to set sail Yesterday in the Evening in order to join Vice Admiral Trojel on the Coast of Rugen. We hear that Rejoicings have been made at Stockholm on account of the last Sea-Fight, and to Morrow Te Deum will be sung here on the same Occasion, with a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Town and Citadel, and of all the Ships in this Harbour.

**Hambourg, August 30.** Letters from Carlscrona of the 20th Instant advise, that the Swedish Fleet being refitted was ready to put to Sea again, and was reinforced by 3 Ships of War. They add, that the Swedish Admiral in Chief has Orders to oppose at all Hazards a Descent on the Island of Rugen or on that of Ruden; so that 'tis likely there will soon be another Naval Engagement. The Prames carrying heavy Artillery, with several Transports and Galliot, having joined the Danish Vice-Admiral Schellon, 'tis supposed he is now in a Condition to open a Passage through the New Deep, and that in Consequence a Descent on the Island of Rugen will be attempted by 15000 Danish, 10000 Prussian Foot and Cavalry in Proportion, who are appointed for that Enterprize; of the Success of which we may expect to hear very suddenly.

**Ratisbon, August 26.** Baron Zundte, formerly Minister of Bavaria to the Dyet, and designed again for the same Post, is dead at Munich. It is said he will be succeeded here by Count Konigsfeldt, who was lately employed in a Commission from the Elector to his Brother at Cologne. But that Count cannot come hither before France has given the Elector Palatine Satisfaction about the Bailliage of Germerheim, the Elector of Bavaria's Investiture and Restoration to his Rank in the Empire being delayed till then by the Imperial Court. Count Bosen the Saxon Minister here sets out the next Week on his Ambassy to the Imperial Court, in order to receive the Investiture of that Electorate. Some Letters from Vienna of the 17th Instant, say there was great Probability of that Court's declaring War against the Turks, the Venetians offering to advance to the Emperor 5 Millions of Dollars, and to pay a Million of Dollars yearly as long as the War shall last; the Pope offers likewise a considerable Sum, and to empower his Imperial Majesty to levy annually the Tenths of the Revenues of the Clergy of his Hereditary Dominions during the War.

**Brussels, August 31.** The Deputies of the States General for adjusting the Treaty of Barrier arriving at Answer on the 22d Instant, Count Konigsleck the Emperor's Minister went thither on the 23d.
