*Stockholm, August 9.* Letters from Carlscrona  
of the 3d of this Month advise, that Admiral  
Sparre would use his utmost Endeavours to get  
the Fleet speedily refitted, and that he hoped to  
be at Sea again in 14 Days with at least 10 Men  
of War. Two Days ago arrived an Express from  
Gotland, with an Account that last Week six Mus-  
covite Frigates landed about 200 Men on that  
Island, and carried off a Minister with some few  
Peasants, without doing any other Harm to the  
Inhabitants, but told them that they would very  
shortly make them another Visit. The King had  
lately given secret Orders to Admiral Lewenhaupt  
to carry through the Belt to Stralsund what Fri-  
gates and Gallies he could possibly fit out at Got-  
tenberg; accordingly that Admiral sailed the last  
Week from thence, with 2 Frigates of 20 and 24  
Guns, and 5 or 6 small Gallies.

*Copenhagen, August 31.* Our Fleet under the  
Command of Admiral Rabe was to have sailed  
from Steffens some Days since, but by our last  
Advices from thence we find they had staid for a  
new Supply of Canon Ball, and Beer, and were  
still at Anchor Yesterday near the Bay of Kiog;  
but we expect that the Admiral will now sail with  
the first fair Wind, he having received some Or-  
ders sealed, which he is not to open till he comes  
near the Island of Bornholm. We flatter our selves  
here that the Muscovite Fleet will suddenly come  
and join ours. A Placard has been publish'd here  
some Days since relating to the Commerce with  
both Altena and Hamburg, in which Places it is  
represented that some Marks of a contagious Di-  
stemper have appeared.

*Copenhagen, September 3.* The remaining Tran-  
sports, which were waiting for Convoy sometime  
under the Island of Mona, having not been able  
to stir by reason of the stormy Weather, which  
we have had of late, Vice-Admiral Troeyel re-  
turned last Week and joynd Admiral Rabe near  
Steffens; and on Friday last the 30th in the Eve-  
ning all the Danish Fleet, consisting of 19 Ships of  
the Line, weighed Anchor by Order from the  
King, and as we judge are gone first to convoy  
those Transports towards the new Deep, being af-  
terwards to cruize on the Coast of Rugen in order  
to cover Vice-Admiral Sehestedt during his Ope-  
rations, and to hinder any Succours coming from  
Sweden. We are assured that 7 or 8 light Mus-  
covite Frigates have been on the Coast of Jotland  
to view it, the Czar having a Design to make  
himself Master of that Island.



*Amboorg, September 6.* Mr. Wich his Britannick Majesty's Resident is returned hither from Amboorg, whither he had gone to deliver his Letters of Credence to that Senate. The Magistracy here being much concerned at the Report of the Plague being crept again into this Town, have had diligent Search made by Physicians, Surgeons, and others authorized for that Purpose, who have made their Report, and given Attestations upon Oath that they find no manner of contagious Distemper at present here, whereupon the foreign Ministers residing in this Town have likewise given their Certificates to the same Effect. And it is hoped that by forbidding any Communication with Altona, and by other Precautions which the Magistracy takes this City will be preserved from Infection. It having been resolved that Vice-Admiral Scheffeldt should attack the Island of Ruden, which seems necessary to be done, before a Descent can be made on the Island of Rugen with Advantage or with any probability of Success, we are daily in Expectation of hearing of the Issue of this Enterprize, which the late stormy Weather is said to have hindered hitherto, besides that some other Transports which were expected are not yet come from Denmark.

*Ratisbon, Sept. 2.* On the 26th the Electoral College came to a favourable Resolution in behalf of the Town of Spire, which by reason of its low Condition has desired to be relieved from paying the Arrears it owes to the Imperial Chamber; and 'tis believ'd the College of Princes will agree to it in their next Session. All the Letters from Vienna speak of the Empress's being with Child as a thing certain. To Day M. Bosen the Saxon Minister set out for Vienna, where he expects to stay about 2 or 3 Months.

*Hague, September 10.* The Articles of the Provisional Treaty of Agreement between North and South Holland, concluded the end of last Month by the States of this Province, are in Substance, That the Deputies for the Quarter of North Holland shall give Security for the more exact collecting of the Taxes and Excise, so that neither any Burghers of Towns or Inhabitants of the Country shall be exempted from Payment, nor shall the Collectors be suffered by Connivance of the Magistrates to escape a strict Examination of their Accounts. South-Holland shall charge its Chamber of Finances with half of the Expence of the Military Forces assign'd on the Northern Quarter for this Year. South Holland shall lend to the other a Sum sufficient to pay off all the Arrears due to the Forces which have been on the Repartition of North Holland. The Conferences for settling the Barrier Treaty are resumed at Antwerp. Yesterday Morning the French Ambassador received an Express from Paris, and soon after delivered to M. Burmania, who presides this Week in the Assembly of the States General, two Letters, one from the new King, the other from the Regent, notifying the Death of the late King, and the Duke of Orleans's being made Regent. The States have ordered the Scotch Battalions in their Service to move towards the Coasts, to be at hand to embark, if occasion should require, pursuant to the Engagements which their High Mightinesses are under to furnish a certain number of Troops to the Assistance of his Britannick Majesty; and two of those Battalions are already on their March from Maastricht to Ipres.
