ST James's, September 12. The following Addresses have been presented to his Majesty.

An humble Address of the Lord Lieutenant High-Sheriff, the Grand-Jury, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentlemen, and other Freeholders assembled at the Assizes held at Kington upon Thames in the County of Surry; presented to his Majesty by Ja. Plume, Esq; High-Sheriff, accompanied by several other Gentlemen of the County, introduced (in the Absence of his Grace the Duke of Argyll, Lord Lieutenant of the said County) by the Right Honourable the Earl of Manchester, being the Lord of the Bed-Chamber in waiting.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen Capital Burgesses and chief Inhabitants of the Corporation of Stafford; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Uxbridge, Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Stafford.

An humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen met at the Assizes held for the County of Stafford the 23d Day of August; presented to his Majesty by William Ward, Esq; one of the Knights of the Shire for the said County, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Uxbridge, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

An humble Address of the Bailiff Burgesses, and Commonalty of Ipswich in the County of Suffolk; presented to his Majesty by Sir William Thompson and William Churchill, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Grafton, Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Suffolk.

An humble Address of the Bailiffs and Citizens of the City of Litchfield; presented to his Majesty by Samuel Hill, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Uxbridge Recorder of the said City.

An humble Address of the Barons, Freeholders, and other Gentlemen of the Shire of Lanark, met at Hamilton by Advice from her Grace the Dutchess of Hamilton, High-Sheriff of that Shire, the 30th Day of August; presented to his Majesty by James Lockhart of Leith, Esq; their Representative in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Salkeld, Lord-Lieutenant of the Shire of Lanark.

Which Addresses his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Venice, Aug. 23. On the 21st arrived a Felucca, sent by the Proveditore General Emo from Dalmatia, with two Colours taken from the Enemy, and the following Relation. On the 2d of this Month the Turks invested Singh, and on the 3d attacked the Suburbs. The Inhabitants, supported by a Detachment of Grenadiers, and other Foot of the Garrison, stood two Assaults with great Bravery; But the said Suburbs having no Fortifications for its Defence, they were obliged to give way at last, and let the Besiegers take Possession of it, as also of some advanced Works of the Place. Then the Turks raised a Battery of five Cannon and two Mortars, with which they played on the Wall of the Town; and having made a sufficient Breach on the 14th, they gave an Assault, which held till the next Day in the Evening. The Besieged defended themselves so resolutely, that they forced the Infidels to retire, and to raise the Siege:

Their Retreat being observed to be very disorderly, the Inhabitants with the Garrison led by General Spaar sallied out, and being joined by the Country-Militia, (the Priests and Monks taking Arms among them on this Occasion) pursued them close killed a great Number, took their Cannon and Baggage, and made them repass the Cattina with Precipitation to secure the Remains of their Army in the Mountains on the other Side of that River. The Senate has appointed Sig. Sebastian Mocenigo and Bortolo Erizzo to be extraordinary Proveditores in Dalmatia. We have Advice of the Arrival of the Bailo Memo at Modon.

Ratisbon, September 5. On the 2d Instant the Council on for discharging the Inhabitants of Spire from what they owe to the Imperial Chamber, was finally adjusted; with an express Clause, that this Favour which has been granted in Consideration of what that Town had suffered, should not be drawn into a Precedent; and that they should be regular in their Payments for the future, in Default whereof the Dyet reserve to themselves a Power of selling in the Arrears which are now remitted. Advices from Vienna tell us, that tho' Count Konigseck was publicly declared Ambassador from his Imperial Majesty to the Court of France, yet he is not to go thither till the Peace of Baden shall have been fully executed in every Point; for which End a Conference had been held with the Count du Luc Ambassador of France, but he only took upon him to make Report of what passed to his Court, without explaining himself on any Particular.

Hambourg, September 10. In the late stormy Weather, the Danes lost some small Vessels and Boats; but they have taken a Swedish Ship having on Board 7200 Weight of Powder, 4000 Musquets, 1000 Pair of Pistols, and a great Number of Swords: Letters from the Confederate Army, of the 7th Instant, give an Account likewise, that the Saxons had made a Booty under the very Ramparts of Stralsund, consisting of a great Number of black Cattle and Horses; which without any Loss they brought off safe to the Prussian Camp, tho' they were exposed to the Shot of more than 20 Cannon. The Confederates are said to have good Information, that there are 4 Places on the Island of Rugen, proper for attempting a Descent, viz. at Spie, Peidbusch, Wittau, and from the Side of Greiffswalde: 20000 Men are appointed for that Descent; a less Number was ordered at first, but the Kings of Denmark and Prussia being informed that his Swedish Majesty has drawn all his Forces together on that Island, they have judged it necessary to augment their Troops detached for that Enterprize; for which a Day is not yet fixed, the Prussian heavy Artillery being first expected from Stetin, and some Transports from Copenhagen. Commissioners are named for settling a Cartel between the Prussians and Swedes. Letters from Copenhagen of the 7th of this Month relate, that on the 5th at Night a Man of War of 50 Guns, detached from the Muscovite Fleet arrived there; which had renewed the Discourse that the said Fleet is ordered to join the Danes, and that there is on Board a certain Number of the Czar's Land-Forces.

St. James's, September 6. This Day Count Gyllembourg, Minister from the King of Sweden, had a private Audience of His Majesty to deliver his Credential Letter dated at Stralsund, May
