'Tis advised from Vienna, that great Diligence is used, by Order of that Court, for filling the Imperial Magazines in Hungary; and 'tis said a very considerable Sum of Money is ready to be sent to pay the Forces in that Kingdom.

Brussels, September 21. On the 17th at Night Count Konigseck arrived here from Antwerp: 'Tis believed the Conferences for regulating the Barrier will be discontinued till the Return of a Courier which that Minister has dispatched to the Imperial Court; and till Count Rechteren and M. Vander Dussen, two of the States Deputies to that Congress, who are gone to Holland, come back again. Two Days ago, a numerous Deputation from those Parts of Flanders which are contiguous with the Dutch Territories, presented a Remonstrance to Count Konigseck, relating to the Extension which the States General demand of their Limits on that Side. The ordinary Deputies of the States of Flanders are also come hither, with the Act of Presentation of the ordinary Subsidies they have lately granted for the Substantance of the Walloon Troops, and for supplying the other publick Charges of that Province. The Earl of Peterborough came to this Place some Days ago from Ghent, and is gone back thither.

Stamp Office Lincoln's Inn, Sept. 15, 1715.

By the Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties on Cards and Dice &c. Whereas Information has been given upon Oath that Mary Richardson, a Woman who usually carries about second hand Cards to sell and who used to work and sell Cards for Archbishop Patus Cardmaker, has a Counterfeit Stamp made in Imitation of the Stamp used for marking of Cards according to the Statute; and there is just ground of suspicion that John Word alias Wearg now or late inhabiting by the broad Pavement in West Smithfield, and formerly in an House burnt down near the Fountain Tavern in the Strand, made or procured the said Counterfeit Stamp to be made. And whereas the said Mary Richardson and John Word alias Wearg do abscond and are fled from Justice; and whereas it appears upon Oath, that James Tilton, another Person who usually carries about second hand Cards to sell and now a Prisoner in Newgate has sold Cards stamped with a Counterfeit Stamp. The said Commissioners do hereby give Notice, that whatsoever shall apprehend and take or cause to be apprehended and taken the said Mary Richardson or John Word alias Wearg so as they or either of them may be had in safe Custody to be dealt with according to Law, shall have and receive from the Receiver General of the Stamp Duties for each the Reward of 10*l*. The said Mary Richardson is a short little Woman with a thin freckled Face, dark brown Hair, about 40 years old; and the said John Word alias Wearg is a lusty Man about 40 years old, stoops in the Shoulders formerly kept a Coour Shop and now or lately used to put Struds into Tobacco Boxes Canses &c. And the said Commissioners do further advise and give Notice to all Dealers in Cards who have any Cards not sealed up according to the Act of Parliament that they do not sell or expose them to Sale but bring them to the Stamp Office in Lincoln's Inn that the Stamps thereon may be viewed and compared to see whether they be Counterfeit because by selling such unsealed Cards the Dealers in Cards are not only liable to the Penalty of five Pounds for each Pack; but to be prosecuted for Felony in Case the Stamps thereon be Counterfeit.
