St. James's, October 17. The following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Lord Polwarth, Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-Lieutenant, Officers of the fencible Men Heretors of the Shire of Berwick or March; presented to his Majesty by Sir Andrew Hume, one of the Lords of Session, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor and Burgeses of the Borough of Truro, in the County of Cornwall; presented to his Majesty by Spencer Cowper, Esq. one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Assistants and other Principal Inhabitants of and near the Corporation of Penzance in the County of Cornwall; presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in the Absence of the Right Honourable Hugh Boscawen Comptroller of his Majesty's Household, and Recorder of the said Corporation.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Ratisbon, October 14. Letters from Milan of the 3d Instant give an Account, that the Turks had made themselves Masters of the Fortresses of Suda and Spina longa in Candia; and being encouraged by their great Successes would 'twas thought make an Attempt on the Island of Corfu before the end of the Campaign, for opening an easier Passage into Italy. The same Letters report, that a contagious Sickness was spread among the Venetian Fleet, and had carried off great Numbers of Men; and that the Pope's Gallies with those of Malta, had actually separated from them to avoid the Infection. The Electors of Cologne and Bavaria divert themselves at Munich with Operas, Balls and Hunting: The 12th and 15th Instant being the Name-Days of the Elector and Electress, were designed to be celebrated with great Magnificence. The Dyet has for some Days made very little Progress in the Affairs before them.

Copenhagen, October 15. Letters from Admiral Guldenlicu relate, that our Fleet is safely arrived at Witmont; and that several Transports which went with it have joined Admiral Seefted, in order to be employed in the intended Descent on the Island of Rugen. On the 12th a Ship of War called the Ifeland sailed from hence to join our Fleet, which now consists of 28 Men of War of the Line.

Hague, October 22. On the 16th Instant Mr. Horatio Walpole, Minister of the King of Great Britain, arrived here, with Orders for Mr. Cadogan his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, to demand of the States General the 6000 Men stipulated by the 14th Article of the Treaty of Barrier made at Utrecht in 1713, to be furnished by their High Mightynesses when the same should be required for the Defence of his Majesty's Dominions against any Attempts in favour of the Pretender. Mr. Cadogan accompanied by Mr. Walpole immediately communicated those Orders to the Pensionary, and that Afternoon they had a Conference with the Deputies of the States General and of the Council of State for Foreign Affairs. On the 17th Mr. Cadogan presented a Memorial in form on that Subject to the States General, who on the 18th passed a Resolution to order the said 6000 Men to be embarked with all Expedition for England. The Forces appointed for this Service are the Dutch Battallions of Palant, Welderren, Cronstroom, Rantsaw and Jacot, each of which Battallions consists of 500 Men in 10 Companies; the Dragoons of Wassenaar, who are to serve on foot, consisting of 500 Men in eight Companies; and five Swiss Battallions, viz. two of Sturler, two of Smidts, and one of Chambrier; each Battallion consisting of 600 Men. The General Officers who are appointed to command these Forces, are Lieutenant General Vander Beck, Major General Monteze, and the Bugadiers Sturler, Cronstroom and Labadie.

Berwick, October 12. Mr. Forster, Member of Parliament for Northumberland, having engaged one Lancelot Errington in a Design to Surprize the Castle of Holy Island for the Service of the Pretender, the said Errington with divers Accomplices attempted it, and succeeded on the 10th Instant. But yesterday some Officers with about thirty Men of this Garrison, and fifty of our



our Townsmen armed who went Volunteers, retook the said Castle; making Errington (who was shot in the Thigh) and the rest Prisoners. The Rebels in Northumberland are reported to be about 300; they plunder the Country and take Horses and Arms, and now lie about Warkworth and Felton.
