dresses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address of the Lieutenant-Governor and States of the Island of Guernsey; presented to his Majesty by Lieutenant-General Harvey, Governor of the said Island, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough.

An humble Address of the States of the Island of Jersey; presented to his Majesty by General Lumley, Governor of the said Island, and accompanied by several Gentlemen of the said Island, who all had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand.

An humble Address of the Freeholders and others the Inhabitants of the Borough of Ashburton in the County of Devon, presented to his Majesty by — Tuckfield, Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Lincoln.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Brussels, Nov 13. On the 9th Instant at Night Mr. Cadogan arrived here from Antwerp. On the 10th that Minister and M. Vandenberg had a Conference, to which Mr. Leathes was admitted in the Quality of his Britannick Majesty's Secretary. On the 11th they settled the Routes of all the Dutch Regiments ordered for Great Britain, from their respective Quarters to Ghent, where Bylanders are ready to carry them to Ostend. Some unexpected Incidents have retarded those Troops longer than was at first imagined; but they are now all actually on the March. Five Battalions will be embarked by the 18th Instant, and sail with the first fair Wind afterwards for the Humber; the other 5 Regiments of Foot, and one of dismounted Dragoons, cannot well be at Ostend sooner than the 20th, but the Shipping and all other Necessaries for their Reception being ready, they will sail immediately after, Wind and Weather permitting, for the Thames; and they will be followed by the Royal Regiment of Ireland, which is now in the Castle of Ghent, where 100 Men of that Battalion will be left till the Exchange of the Ratifications of the Barrier-Treaty. Yesterday the abovenamed Ministers and Secretary had a Conference with the Councils of State and Finances of these Provinces, and adjusted all Points relating to Commerce. Late last Night Mr. Cadogan set out for Antwerp, and was followed by Mr. Leathes this Evening. Captain Bagnal an Irish Papist, late of D'Avila's Regiment, having deserted his Imperial Majesty's Service, and abandoned his Company, some Weeks before the Discovery of the Pretender's Design of invading Great Britain; and the said Captain having gone into England, and from thence into France with James Butler, and having lately wrote from Paris to his Servant in this Town to carry his Equipage to London, where he assures his Servant in the said Letter he would meet him in a very little Time; the Ministers of the two Maritime Potentates have thought fit to dispose of the Company which was

become vacant by the said Bagnal's Desertion: Letters from Ghent say Colonel Leathes Commandant of that Place, has sent the Lord Clermont Son to Lord Middleton, and one Gordon Son to the Pretender's Banker at Paris.

Antwerp, Nov. 13. The Barrier Treaty being brought to a happy Conclusion, was signed here on the 15th Instant by the Imperial, British and Dutch Ministers. By this Treaty care has been taken to settle the Trade of the Subjects of Great Britain to the Spanish Netherlands on a very advantageous Foot, particularly with respect to the Woollen Manufactures, and also to Spirits distilled from Corn. Yesterday Mr. Cadogan set out for Ostend, where the Troops ordered to Great Britain are to pass before him in Review, and to take an Oath of Fidelity to his Majesty King George: Five Battalions are to embark this Day for the Humber, as will the rest for the Thames by the 20th. Two British Men of War lye now ready in the Road of Ostend, to take the Transports under their Convoy. Count Kingsegg went from hence Yesterday Morning for Brussels; his Excellency designs to return to this Place in four or five Days, in order to concert Measures with the States Deputies for the punctual Execution of the Treaty of Barrier, as soon as the Ratifications are exchanged, which is to be in six Weeks or sooner if possible.

From the Camp at Sterling, Nov. 10. This Morning the Duke of Argyll received Intelligence, that the Earl of Mar with the Rebels is come from Perth to Achterarder, and that 'tis reported among them they are to advance. The three Regiments left at Glasgow and Kilsyth will join us to Morrow Noon: And then his Grace designs to pass the River, in order to meet the Rebels and attack them. Of the Rebels who passed the Fryth, and afterwards separated from their Body in the South, 400 have been taken Prisoners.

Exeter Nov. 8. The Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council of this Ancient and Loyal Corporation in Common Council assembled, have unanimously elected his Royal Highness George Prince of Wales Lord High Steward of this City of Exeter.

Whitehall, Nov. 14. On the 12th Instant in the Evening arrived Captain Williamson, Aid de Camp to Lieutenant General Cadogan, with the Treaty of Barrier signed at Antwerp on the 5th Instant, O. S.

St. James's, Nov. 14. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Charles Earl of Tankerville to be Warden, Chief Justice, and Justice in Eyre of all his Majesty's Forests, Chaces, Parks and Warrens on this side of Trent.
