Rome, Dec. 23.

Esterday the Pope silled up Three of the vacant places in the Sacred Colledge, by a promotion of Cardinals, the perfons are Signior Borromeo, at present Secretary of State, Signior Massimi, his Macstro de Camera, and Signior Carpegaz, Nep'ew to the Cardinal of that name, who this day accordingly received their Caps in a publick Consistory, and were complimented by all the persons of condition; at the same time the Pope bestowed the place of Maestro de Camera upon Signior Crescentio. Great and splendid preparations are here making for Don Pedro of Arragon, Vice-Roy of Naples designed hither, in quality of Ambassador of Obedience from his Catholick Majesty, who is expected here by the beginning of the next month, most part of his equipage being already arrived. The Cardinal Maldachini hath, it is said, offered the said Ambassador the use of his whole house ready furnished; during his stay here.

Vienna, Dec. 24. By an Express arrived here from General Major Heister, we are informed, that the Count Kestey having after the death of the Count de Tekeley, desended the Fortress of Kasmar for some days, was at last sorced to render the same; the Garrison within being reduced to great straits, and in all but 500 men; notwithstanding this news is scarce credited; several Letters out of the Upper Hungary assuring us, that the Germains who were in that place, were resolved to desend the Town till the Emperor should send them their pardons for what was past. We have advice that there is arrived at Raab a Turkish Chiaus from the Bassa of Buda on his way hither, what his errand may be is not

yet known.

Copenhagen, Dec, 27. The 23 instant the King was to view the Castle of Cronenbourg, where he gave Orders to General Major Holke, who is at present Governor there, to cause three Batteries mor to be made on the Sea side, and on each to place Nine Great Guns, for the better commanding that passage, and obliging, as is given out, all ships to strike as they pass; this work is to be gone about immediately, and will be so warded with all possible speed.

From Zell they write, that there hath lately been another meeting of the Princ s of Lunenburge and Brunswick concerning the preter sions of the Bishop of Munster upon the City of Hoxter, and that they have resolved to raise 4000 Horse more for the assistance of the Duke of Wolfemburel, who in the mean time is making all necessary preparations here for the defence of the place, having lately augmented the Garrison with 500 men, there being daily, more expected. They have advice there, that the Bishop of Munster hath an Army of 15000 men on foot, which he daily encreases by the Levies he is making in all parts.

Venice, Dec. 27. The Process against Captain General Morosini goes on but slowly, his accusors not appearing at present so many, or so violent against him as formerly, so that after all it is thought, he will come off with honour. The Marquis Ma-

langon, late Ambassador from his Catholick Majesty at Vienna, is returning to Madrid, in which employment the Marquis de los Balbaces Spinola now succeeds him. By Letters from Chauenna on the borders of the Valtoline we are told, that the 10th instant passed by there, the Count Alfonso Casatta Ambailador from Spain on his way to Bada, where the Swiffers are now met: the occasion of their Affembly is faid to be upon the near approach of the French in Lorrain, of whose motions they begin to be jealous, and to consider what answer to return his most Christian Majesty, who desires it seems a Levy of 4000 Swissers more for his service. From Legorn they write, that Vice-Admiral Everson was arrived there from Messina with Two Zealand Vefsels. By a Barque' coming from Argiers we have advice that those Corsairs have Seven men of war abroad, and that they were setting out only Two more, being in great want of Men, Ammunition, and all kind of Provisions, and the people in general very much disheartened, through the great losses they have of late received by the English.

Letters of the 30 November from Constantinople say, That Signior Molino, Ambassador from this Republick was arrived there from Adrianople, and that he had obtained leave to raise again the Latine Church in the Suburbs of the City which the Turks had formerly taused to be demolished. The same Letters further say, that Monsseur Nointel, Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty was arrived there, and had made his publick entry. That there was expected an Ambassador from Smeden, who they

fay is on his way thirher.

That the Grand Signior had been hunting near Constantinople, but would not enter into it, fearing the Janisaries and the rest of the Sultanes faction might have made some attempt upon his person.

Hambrough, Ian. 6. Here hath been a report for fome few days, that the Rebels in Muscovy under the corduct of Stephan R dzin had been lately defeated by the Emperors forces, but feeing the last Four or Five Posts have not brought us any Letters from thence, and the last Letters from Liefland not making any mention thereof, but rather of the contrary, this hardly finds any credit here. The last Letters from Poland tell us, that all things are there very still and peaceable, at home, but that from abroad they have great chuse to apprehend a war from the Turks, that besides the great preparations the Grand Signior makes, which they fear to be chiefly intended against them; the Chain of Tartary was ready to enter into the Uhrain by order of the Grand Signior with a very powerful Army, fo foon as the Ice will permit them a paffage over the large Morasses and Fens which divide their Territories. That the Grand Signior had likewise sent Orders to the Princes of Moldavie and Walachie to be ready with all their forces against he should have occasion to command them; that the King had here-upon sent to the Great General Sobiersky, and to the under General Demetrius Wilnowitsky his Uncle immediately to repair to Warlaw, that there, together with the other Senators of the kingdom, they might consult on the means to oppose any designe those Insidels may have against his Dominions,

Nilan, December 26. The Count Ercole Vifcomii, Enveye from His Catholick Majesty to the Great Dike of Toscany, is retuined thence extremely satisfied with his entergainment in that Court.

The Duke d' Offunt hath given Orders forthe reinforcing the principal Garritons of this Dutchy. The Command of Field Marihal General, vacant by the death of the Count Galeazzo Troiti, is not yet diffoled of, but it is thought it may be at last conferred on Dom Inigo de-Velandia, General of the Hose, whose employment the Admiral of Enfittle is folliciting for his Son the Count de Melgar.

Don Ferdinando Balder, late Governor of Novarre, seems still unwilling to take possession of his new employment of General of the Artillery, which the Queen Regent of Spain hath lately bestowed upon him, till he be assured that his monthly Salary of Five hundred Crowns shall be continued him, instead of Three hundred which the General of the Artillery here hath.

From Mantua We have advice, that the Treaty of Marriage between that Duke, and the Princess Guistila, which was for some time interrupted by the means of the Cardinal d' Este, is renewed again, and may in a short time be concluded.

Ratisbonne, Deg. 27. So many difficulties arise here daily in the Diet about the perpetual Capitulation, a thing they have been long endeavouring at, that most begin to despair of the success, the whole matter is now put into the hands of the Directors; to be by them communicated to the Electors and the relt of the Princes of the Empire, and then to be reported back again to the Diet; nor are they better advanced in the business they are about, for the Publick Defence of the Empire, though it hath been pressed on by several Princes with great vigor and earnestness. The Emperor hath written to the Bishop of Aichstadt his Commissioner General of the Diet, telling him of the great Levies the Turks are every where making against the Spring. and that they have resolved to assist the Rebels in Mungary with an Army of 50000 men; withal minding him that it is his duty to exhort the several States and Princes assembled in the Diet, to a timely provision for the security of the pire, and to put themselves in a condition effectually to oppose the designes which so manifestly threaten them from the Ottoman Port. It is hoped that this may induce them to proceed to some speedy ! conclusion in this affair.

Stockholm, Dec. 28. This Government continues daily to fend more Forces from hence into Liefland, for the strenthening of their Garrisons in those parts, and so to secure themselves from any sodain attempt the Muscovite might make upon them: for, notwithstanding the great troubles that are amongst those people, they seem not at all inclinable to bring the differences that are at present between them and this Crown to a composure. They are knewise embarquing here several Troops to be transported into Pomerania, they intending to have in those parts a considerable force to be ready on all occasions.

Brussels, Ian. 10. His Excellency the Count de Monterey continues still at Antwerp, treating with several persons there for the advancing Moneys for the payment of the Troops. The 8th instant the Duke de Bournonville went hence towards Ostend, in order to visit the Port and Fortifications shere, and to confer with several Engineers

about the raising of some new Works for the better strength and defence of that place. His Excellency has given order for the recruiting with all speed the Eight Regiments of Walloons, and the raising several Troops in the respective Provinces.

Paris, fan. 17. The 11th instant a review was taken of the Kings Guards of Musqueteers, where the King as is faid, caused all those which were of the Reformed Religion to be disbanded; and it is said, he will make the like Reformation in his other Guards of Gensdarmes, Cheuaux Legers, and the Gardes du Corps, intending hence-forward not to have any Officer in his houshold which shall profess any other Religion then the Roman Catholick. It is here certainly faid, that the King will go hence the 13th of February next to St Germains, and there tomain with the whole Court till the beginning of April, when he intends to fet out at the head of a considerable Army towards Flanders. Yesterday Monsieur de Louvois by order of the King, gave no-tice to all the Officers of his Houshold, of these his Majesties intentions, that they might accordingly be ready at that time. It is faid that amongst the many preparations that are making against Spring, the King hath ordered all the Torches and Flambeaux which can be found ready made at Nancy or other places, to be bought up, to the number of 30000, and hath caused more to be made, on designe as is supposed, that during the great heats in Summer, the Army may march in the night, and in the cool of the mornings and evenings. They further say, that during the Kings stay with his Army at Dunkirk, the whole Fleet of 100 fail will have Orders to come and ride before that place. The King intends togoe and pals some few days at Vincennes, where they are at present making great preparations for the divertisement of the Court with several Balls and Comedies, the sirst day of this appearance, the Court is to be in very grave and ferious habits though extraordinary rich, the second day they are to appear like Hunters, and the third day in Masquerade, with all imaginable Gallantry: the King hath invited Monsieur Windisgrate the Emperors Envoye to be present there, to see on this occasion, the pomp and splendor of the French Court before his departure.

It is said that the Republick of Venice apprehending every day more and more an approaching invasion from the Turks, have ordered their Ambassador here in that case, to desire the Kings assistance against those Insidels, to which he hath not yet received any answer.
