*Ratisbon, Jan. 13.* On the 10th Instant the Diet were again on the Business of Kehl and Philipsbourg. Several Ministers of the Princes notified the Concurrence of their Masters to the Levy of a Roman Month for that Service; but those of the remoter States, tho' they agreed to the present Proposal, renewed their Protestations against a perpetual Establishment at the Charge of the Empire, as what ought to be born by the neighbouring Circles only. A Decree of the Imperial Commission concerning the Affairs of the North, is reported to be already lodged in Prince Lowenstein's Hands: The

Contents are not yet known, but 'tis said in general the Emperour desires the States to give him their Opinion, how he ought to proceed on this Occasion. Tho' the Promotion of general Officers at Vienna has been delayed, a War with the Turks is talked of as a thing certain. Prince Francis of Hesse-Darmstad, second Son of the Landgrave of that Name, died on the 8th Instant, after 10 Days Illness of the Small-Pox, in the 22d Year of his Age. We have an Account from Switzerland, that the Resident of Venice had desired of the Cantons of Zurich and Bern, Leave to raise 4000 Men in their Territories for the Service of that State; and had also sent his Secretary to the Grisons, to sollicit Leave to raise Men in their Country.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 12.* On the 6th Instant His Danish Majesty arrived here. Rear-Admiral Kaas is come into this Port with five Men of War, from Cruising off the Coast of Pomerania. If the Frost continues, we must expect the Sound will in a little Time be shut up with Ice; and some are of Opinion that the Swedes will then come over from Schonen, and make an Attempt on this Island: But we are in no great Apprehension of such an Attempt, for besides the Seamen belonging to the Fleet, there are 9000 Men in this City and in the Neighbourhood, and 10000 more are coming from the Army which served in Pomerania, to take Quarters in Jutland and Fuhnen. The Privy-Counsellour Weebe set out from hence on the 7th Instant for Hambourg; 'tis not known what Commission he is charged with, but before his Departure the King conferred on him the Order of the Knighthood of the Elephant. This Minister

niffer is expected back in a Day or two. To Morrow *Te Deum* will be sung in all the Churches of this City, for the Successes of the last Campaign.

*Dresden, Jan. 15.* Letters from Poland have brought an Account, that the Field-Marshal Flemming had found Means to make himself Master by Surprize of the Town of Zamosc, which is the second Place for Strength in that Kingdom, with no more Loss than of three Men of the Saxon Troops; that 30 of the Malecontents were killed, and several wounded, in which Number were the Commandant and Major of the Garrison. These Letters add, that the Marshal Gorzinski, and several other Palatines, were made Prisoners; and that there was Ground to believe a General Accomodation will be concluded at Posen; in which Case most People are of Opinion His Polish Majesty will return from Posen to this Place, to be present at a General Diet of the States of Saxony. We hourly expect the further Particulars of this Affair of Lamosc, which 'tis generally believed will put an End to the Troubles in Poland; in the mean Time a Cessation of Arms is actually agreed on till the 15th of this Month.
