Ount Kinigsegg the Imperial Minister arrived at Antwerp on the 27th of last Month, with the Emperour's Ratifications. On the 29th Mr. Leathes His Britannick Majesty's Secretary arrived there also with the Ratifications of the King his Master. On the 30th the Imperial Minister and the Deputies of the States-General settled and signed the Accompt of Loans and some other particular Contracts: And on the 31st the Ratifications of the Barrier-Treaty were exchanged about One a Clock in the Asternoon at Count, kinigsegg's House, to the Satisfaction of all Parties. On the 1st Instant Count Kinigsegg and Mr. Leathes returned hither from Antwerp. Yesterday the Councils of State and Finances were discharged by the Conference from the Oath of Subordination which they had taken to the two Maritime Powers, whose Ministers remitted at the same Time the Government of the Austrian Netherlands into the Hands of the Imperial Minister Count Kinigsegg; and this Day the several Councils, the Chamber of Accompts, the Magistracy, and all the Persons of Distinction in this Place, complimented his Excellency on this Occasion. That Minister has not settled any new Form of Government: He intends to continue the Council of the Finances, and by their Advice and Assistance to issue his own Orders in all Matters relating to the Administration, till he receives surther Instructions from Vienna,

ament Assembled, taking into Our most serious Consideration the wicked and unnatural Rebellion broke out and still carried on in some Parts of Great Britain against the most Gracious, Just, and Best of Kings, contrary to the most Solemn and Religious Obligations, by which the Consciences of Men can be bound; And having a thorough Sense how much the Safety of Our happy Constitution in Church and State depends upon the Preservation of the Sacred Person of His Majesty King George, Do, too the Detence of the Establish'd Church of this Kingdom, and the Protestant Interest of Europe, and for the maintaining the Ancient Government, and the Laws and Liberties of Great Britain and Ireland, hereby engage to Assight God, and to one another, to assist and detend His most Sacred Majesty King George, Our only Lawful and Rightful Soveraign, and the Protestant Succession in His Royal House, with Our Lives and Fortunes, against the Person who during the Life of the late King James show upon him the Stile and Title of Prince of Wales, and since the Decease of the said King James hath assigned the Name and Title of James the Third King of England and Ireland, or James the Bighth of Scotland, commonly called the Chevalier de St. George, or the Prevender, and all his Abestors; and never to depart from this Cause until an End be put to the said Rebellion, and our Religion, Laws and Liberties shall be so far secured to Us, as not to be endangered by the said Popish Prevender, or any of his wicked Adherents, who think

themselves bound by their Religion and Principles to reduce Us to Popery and Slavery. And whereas the Person of His most Sacred Majesty, and the Person of His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, may be exposed to Danger, and to the curs'd Atalempts of Papists, and other bloody Men; We do therefore solemnly Engage to God, and one another, That if any such Attempt be made upon them, or either of them, We will pursue, not only those who make it, but all their Adherents, and all that We find in Arms against His Majesty, or the Settlement of the Crown in His Royal House, with the utmost Severity of a just Indignation, until they are brought to condign Punishment: And that the Perpetrating of any such willanous and detestable Crime (which God of His infinite Mercy prevent) shall not divert Us stom prosecuting this Cause which We now undertake; but that it shall engage Us to carry it on with all the Rigour that so barbarous a Practice shall deserve.

To their Excellencies the Lords Justices of Ireland. The Humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament Assembled.

E the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parkliament Assembled observing, with Intire Satisfaction, the great Care which Your Excellencies have taken to preserve this Kingdom in Tranquility, and to prevent the restless Malice of the Enemies of Our Peace from bringing their wicked Designs to Essect; do think it incumbent on Us to rehder to Your Excellencies Our hearty and unfeign'd Thanks for the Vigilancy and Prudence of Your Administration in these Times of Difficulty and Danger.

The Dispositions alread's made by Your Excellencies of those Forces which are in this Kingdom, and the Directions given to all Magistrates by Your Excellencies late Order in Council, to quicken them in the Execution of the Laws against Papists and disaffected Persons, might seem to take away all occasion of addressing Ourselves to Your Excellencies on either of those Subjects: Yet since We have reason to be lieve that the Pretender is assually landed in North Britain, We crave leave in this Manner to express Our Zeal and Concern for the Sasety of His Majesty's Person and Government; desiring Your Excellencies to proceed in putting this Kingdom into the best Posture of Desence it is rapable of, as the most proper Means to prevent intestine Commotions, and disappoint any Attempt that may be made against it from Abroad.

And the We have no Inclination, without great Necessity, to apply for the Execution of Penal Laws, yet Our Regard to the Preferencion of Our religious and civil Interests, and the Peace of the Kingdom, oblige Us at this Time to make it Our Request, that Your Excellencies will strictly require that the Laws in force against Papists, and more particularly those against Regulars, and all Persons of the Popular Religion exercising Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, be put in immediate Executions as the most effectual Method to clear the Land from those incendiages and Promoters of the Pretender's Interest among the common People, whose Credulity leads them to an intire Dependancy on their Priests and Friars.

An Address of the House of Commons ha ving been presented on the 17th to their surances of our sincere and steady Inclinations Excellencies the Lords Julices, that they would be pleased to give proper Directions for securing such Papists, and other Perions as they flould suspect to be Disaffected to His Majesty's Royal Person and Government; their Excellencies were pleased to return the Answer following.

U Pon the first Intelligence We had of the Presender's Landing in North Britain, tho' she Particulars are not yet full enough to be communicated to the House, We thought it our Duty to do all that in Us lay for the Security of the Kingdom; for which Purpose We writ Letters in Council to all Governours of Countres, Sheriffs, Mayors, and Chef Magistrates of Corporations, to put the Militia in immediate Condition for Service, requiring them at the same Time, and all other Magistrates whom the same might concern, strictly to execute the Laws against Papists, and to secure not only the Arms, a d serviceable Horses, but likewise the Persons of all such as they should have just Reason to suspect; taking Care to proceed therein according to Law, and as thath been usually practised in like Cases of Danger,

Orders are likewife given for Cantoning the Regular Troops forthwith, and for distributing the Half Pay Officers in Such Manner is may make them most tapable of defending the Country, and of repelling any Attempts either at Home or from Abroad, to disturb the Feder of this Realm. But we are throughly sensible, that nothing

can contribute more to discourage the evil. Designs of the Enemies to His Majesty's Person and Go. vernment, than the good Refolutions and Unanimity of His Luyal Commons.

On the 18th the Afforiation was read, and Mr. Speaker and all the Members present subscribed the same. On the 19th the House with their Speaker attended their Excellencies the Lords Justices, with the Address of the House to His Majesty, which is as follows.

And their Excellencies were pleased to return the Answer following.

We shall take Care to lay this Loyal Address before His Majesty, wherein his faithful Commons of Ireland continue to fet so good an Example to the rest of His Majesty's Subjects.

On the 21st Leave was given to bring in Heads of a Bill, to Ratify and Confirm the Afforiations entred into by both Houses of Parliament, for the Preservation of His Majesty's Sacred Person, Royal Family and Government; and to oblige all Persons that have any Employments: Ecclesiastical, Civil or Military, to subscribe the same.
