**T**HE following Associations and Address have been presented to His Majesty.

An Association of the Bayliffs, Coroners, Common-Councilmen, Town-Clerk, Vicar, Curate, Trustees of Trinity House, Masters, Owners and Part-Owners of Ships and Vessels, and of other the principal Inhabitants of the Corporation of Scarborough in the County of York. Presented to His Majesty by William Thompson and John Hungerford, Esqrs; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Right Honourable the Duke of Devonshire.

A humble Address of the Lieutenant-Governour, Council, and Assembly of the Island of Nevis. Presented to His Majesty by Joseph Jorey, Esq; Agent for that Island, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An Association of the Mayor, Capital Burgeses, and Assistants of the Corporation of Tiverton in Devonshire, together with the Gentlemen, Ministers, Tradersmen, and others within and near the said Borough. Presented to His Majesty by Thomas Bere, Esq; Member of Parliament for the said Borough, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dorset.

*Which Associations and Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.*

*Rome, Jan. 21.* On the 13th Instant the Pope held a Consistory, and made a Speech to the Cardinals who were present, setting forth the Dangers with which Christendom (and especially Italy) is threatned, by the great Preparations of War now making by the Turks. He therefore exhorted them to give, each according to his Ability, a Sum of Money towards the Charge of the Preparations which he had resolv'd to make for the Defence of Christendom and the Ecclesiastical State. To this Service Cardinal Acciajoli has contributed 1000 Crowns, the Cardinals Marscotti and Scotti 2000, Cardinal Albani 3000, some 500 each, and others have severally promised divers Sums; the like is expected from the most considerable Persons of this Court. On the 17th Count Gallasch, the Emperour's Ambassadour, had a long Audience of the Pope; the Discourse between them was about Means for opposing the Progress of the Infidels, and on the Resolutions pass'd for

that End in several Congregations: The Pope, for the better enabling his Imperial Majesty to exert himself in the Defence of Christendom, consented to his levying the Tenths of all Ecclesiastical Incomes, secular and regular, in Austria and the other Hereditary Countries. The same Day the Ambassador of Venice had Audience of the Pope, communicated to him the Resolutions which the Senate had taken to send a considerable Body of Troops to Corfu, for the Security of that Island, and propos'd Means for acting in other Parts against the Turks. 'Tis said the King of Portugal has promised to furnish six large Men of War, which are to sail from Lisbon in March, to joyn those that the Pope designs to cause to be fitted out, for reinforcing the Venetian Fleet.

*Venice, Jan. 31.* On the 19th Instant our Patriarch went to the Lido, where he said Mass and gave the Communion to 1600 Soldiers, part of them Italians, the rest Germans; who afterwards receiving their Pay, went aboard the Ships appointed to carry them, some to Dalmatia, others to Corfu. On the 23d was launched a new Man of War, call'd La Madonna del Arsenale, carrying 80 Guns; and 5 other new Men of War will be launched before the 1st of May. General Schulembourg is preparing to set out in a few Days for Naples, whence he is to go to Corfu: He has been to view the new Fortifications at the Lido, for which 'tis hop'd there will be no Occasion, if the Emperour declares War against the Turks, and if the Republick do effectually furnish the Troops which they have promised to that General. The Towns of the Terra-firma have resolv'd to pay in forthwith their respective Contingents of the Sums necessary for raising 10000 Men, on the Estimate of 30 Ducats for each Soldier. A great Number of Cannon, Bombs, and Arms from the Bergamasque are arriv'd at Brescia, and are to be conveyed to the Adige, in order to their being brought hither. Sig. Francesco Dona and Giorgio Balbi, are chosen Proveditores extraordinary in Dalmatia; the latter defended Singh against the Turks the last Campaign. The Electoral Prince of Bavaria, and also the Electoral Prince of Saxony, are both expected shortly, to pass the Carnival here; the former arriv'd last Night at Vicenza. The Frost has been so great in these Parts for 8 Days, that People with Carriages have come over the Lagune on the Ice from Masteré to this City.

*Brussels,*

*Brussels, Feb. 15.* On the 12th Instant the Imperial Troops took Possession of Mons and Ottend; Count Vehlen Major-General is to command in the former, and M. Salablanca in the latter. The Imperialists are this Day to take Possession of the Castle of Ghent; and some of those Troops are on the March towards the other Garrisons which are to be evacuated by the States General. Westerloo's Regiment of Horse marched from this Place the 12th for Courtray, and Deyenitz's Regiment of Foot arrived here Yesterday from Mons. Letters from Ratisbon of the third Instant advise, that Count d' Ursel and M. del Campo Burgomaster of Antwerp, two of the Persons deputed by the States of Brabant to represent their Grievances at Vienna, passed through that Place on the 30th of January; but that the Bishop of Antwerp, who is the third Person in that Deputation, was not then arrived. The Count d' Ursel takes his Way by Munich, in order to pay his Respects to the Elector of Bavaria.

*Whitehall, Feb. 13.* Yesterday Morning arrived an Express with the following Account.

*Montrose, Feb. 6.* On Saturday the 4th of February the Pretender received Advice here, about 4 in the Afternoon, that Part of the King's Army was advancing towards Aberbrothick, a Town within 8 Miles of this Place; whereupon he ordered the Clans which had remained with him after his Flight from Perth, to be ready to march about 8 at Night towards Aberdeen, where he assured them a considerable Force would soon come to them from France. At the Hour appointed for their March, the Pretender ordered his Horses to be brought before the Door of the House in which he lodged, and the Guard which usually attended him to mount, as if he designed to go on with the Clans to Aberdeen: But at the same time he slipped privately out on Foot, accompanied only by one of his Domesticks, went to the Earl of Mar's Lodgings, and from thence by a By way to the Water Side, where a Boat waited, and carried him and the Earl of Mar on board a French Ship of about 90 Tuns called the *Maria Teresa* of St. Malo: About a Quarter of an Hour after, two other Boats carried the Earl of Melfort and the Lord Drummond, with Lieutenant General Sheldon and ten other Gentlemen, on board the same Ship; and then they hoisted Sail and put to Sea. The Lord Tinnmouth, and the Earls Marishal and Southesk, were left behind to shift for themselves. The Clans are for the most part dispersed and run to the Mountains; the few who continue in a Body are gone towards Aberdeen. Lieutenant General Cadogan arrived here Yesterday in the Afternoon, with the Regiments of Wills Edgerton and Clayton, and 600 detached Foot. The Duke of Argyll came last Night to Brechin, within 5 Miles of this Place, with all the Dragoons: Lieutenant-General Vanderbeck with the Foot, lay at Aberbrothick; and they all continue their March to Day towards Aberdeen, in Pursuit of the Rebels.
