Winchead, Jan. 17.

THe 8th instant a small vessel called the *Arroy* of this place, John Dander Master, laden with Wooll and Trains from Cork in Ireland, and bound for this Port, was by foul weather forced upon the Rocks in Freshwater Bay near Mistford; and there staved in pieces, the men were all saved and most of the Riggings put, the Goods all lost. Here is arrived the *Nepunc* of London, Pilot Don Maltes, from Guiny.

Portsmouth, Jan. 19. On Tuesday last came into this Port the *White Unicorn* of Amsterdam, laden with Hides and Tobacco from the West Indies, having suffered much damage by the late bad weather, great part of her Stern being broken in pieces, and the whole ship so torn, that with much difficulty they got into this Harbour to repair and fit her for sea again; the Master says that the French have several men of war in those parts, and that they have lately lost two great ships there, the one of 60 the other of 40 pieces of Ordnance, having been quite eaten up by the Norms.

Rome, Dec. 27. Here is daily expected Don Pedro d' Arragon, in Quality of Ambassador of Obedience from Spain, with a Train of 50 domestick servants, besides 14 Gentlemen of Naples, each of them having 14 servants in his Excellencies Liverry, he will be received here with great honour and respect, not only as Ambassador from the Crown of Spain, but as Vice Roy of Naples. The Pope hath at last resolved to make a nomination of such persons as he will have succeed in the vacant Bishopricks in Portugal; and hath left three to be disposed of by this Crown, viz. those in the Indies, of which the Kings of Portugal are the Patrons, as for the other Nine now vacant in Portugal, he will bestow them himself, yet with regard to such as that Crown shall recommend. The Cardinal Ginatti continues very ill, little hopes being left of his recovery.

The 23 instant the Ambassador from the Duke of Savoy had his last Audience of the Pope, intending to have gone hence in a day or two in order to his return home, but it is said that upon the death of that Dukes Resident here, he hath altered his resolution and may remain here till farther Order. Here is lately dead Don Gb. de Cordeba, a peer of a vast Estate, having left his Heir Signor Branda to the dissatisfaction of all his Friends and Relations, who when living, employed all their endeavors to dissuade him from it, and when dead, would have made away with the Will, but that the said Branda took care to prevent them.

The Spanish Cardinals have lately had a conference with the Spanish Ambassadors concerning the rank which the Constable of Castile pretends to at the reception of Don Gb. de Cordoba as the Spanish Ambassador, but being not able to come then to any conclusion, they appointed to meet the Monday following on the same purpose. The Queen of Sweden is now perfectly recovered of her late distemper, having since had several conferences with the Pope, upon what subject is not known.

Paris, Jan. 24. The King and the whole Court have been these three or four days at Vincennes, diverting themselves with Dancing, Hunting, Comedies, and the other usual entertainments of the season, prepared by the Kings Command, with extraordinary splendor and magnificence. This night the King is expected back here, where the Grand Ballet is to be danced over again. The fellow that committed the late villainous attempt upon the Princess of Conde, its said will be condemned to be broken on the wheel, or at least to spend the rest of his days in the Gallies. We have advice here that the French have taken several Holland Barques which were Trading off their Islands in the West-Indies; and that the Hollanders have likewise seized on a French ship in those parts by way of Retribution. The King is dispatching Monsieur de Fenjus formerly Secretary to the Queen of Portugal, to the Kings of Sweden and Denmark, to negotiate concerning matters of Trade, upon the interruption of Commerce with Holland, and it is said he may suddenly depart on his journey thither. The King as the intercession of the Kings of England and Sweden, hath consented to a farther prolongation of the time, & assigned for the arbitrating the differences between the Crowns of France and Spain, concerning the dependancies of Liny, Conde, &c. for the term of one year more.

Denmark, Jan. 14. From Warsaw we have advised that the Great Marshal and under Marshal Demetrius Wisnowitsky, were daily expected there, to consult with the King about the means of reducing the Cossacks in the Ukraine, under the obedience of this Crown, but that having lately heard of the indispo-

disposition of this latter, it was believed he would not be there so suddenly as was first thought, and might likewise put a stop to his intended Marriage with the Princess *L. Osborn*, Niece to the Great Marshal *Sibirsky* for some time, that the King and whole Court have been much concerned at this sickness, which it is feared may in some sort hinder their designs against the Collacks. They farther write, that the winter hath been very mild in those parts, having hitherto passed almost without any Ice, which hath disappointed the Tartars from effecting the designe they had of passing the Marshes and Fens with their Army into the *Ukrayn*, however that they stand upon their Guard in those parts, and are provided against the worst that may happen. They have not lately heard any thing more from Turkey, that their Envoy is still detained at *Constantinople*, and almost not suffered to write, which make them judge, they scarce have any intentions to live in peace and Friendship with them. That the King is sending *W. Walsky*, a Polish Gentleman, to the Elector of *Brandenburgh at Berlin*, to complain to him of the violence that was lately offered to one Colonel *Kraksteyn*, who by the Electors order it seems was taken by force out of the Suburbs of that City, and to demand reparation for the affront done the King therein. The Queen is God be thanked perfectly recovered of her late miscarriage; but hath not yet been abroad.

From *Muscovy* we hear little further, then what we had formerly, That the Rebels under the conduct of *Stephan Radzin* are there very powerful.

Hague, Jan. 16. The States of *Utrecht*, have at last by their Deputies consented to the raising of the imposition on Corn, when it is carried to the Mill, a thing which hath been long under their consideration.

We have advice here that the Bishop of *Munster* hath drawn all his forces together, which gives us cause to believe, that he intends to make some attempt upon the City of *Hoxter*, to which he pretends, and which is the present difference between him and the Duke of *Wolfembutel*. By Letters of the 6th instant from *Munster*, from him who is at present there on the part of this States, we are told, that he had not yet had Audience of that Bishop, but expected it in a day or two, and that all the discourse there was, that he would not admit of any accommodation with the Duke of *Wolfembutel*, who in the mean time is raising considerable forces to joyn with those of the Dukes of *Lunenburg* and *Brunswick*, strengthening the Garrison in *Hoxter*, and making all other necessary preparations to meet his designs.

From *Stockholm* they write, that the Government there had appointed Two Senators, who were constantly to attend the Kings Person, for his better information in the affairs of State. That the Great General *Wrangle* had lately buried his Son, who some years since died in *England*, with great pomp and magnificence, and that their last advice from *Moscow* was, that the Rebels were as powerful as ever, and daily advancing towards that City.

Vitro, Jan. 23. This week the States-General received Letters from those of *Friesland*, *Zealand*, *Utrecht* and *Guelderland*, giving them an account of their having caused the late Placets or Ordinances for the forbidding the importation of *French Brandy*, and for the increasing the impositions on all *French Manufactures* to be published, and that

they would accordingly see them duly executed, the same care will be taken by the Admiralties of this Province, who have appointed Overseers in all places, for the more punctual execution of those Orders. The States of *Friesland* have by their Deputies pressed very hard, for the hastening the new Levies, in which it is thought they may now suddenly come to a resolution. The States General having sent an Envoy to the Duke of *Wolfembutel* about the present state of affairs, have received Letters from him on his way thither, telling them, That the Bishop of *Munster*'s force consists of 8000 Horse, 5000 Dragoons, and 12000 Foot; that he had appointed their Rendezvous to be at *Warendorp*, and that he was sending the Commander *Smiffing* to the Duke of *Lorraine* upon what errand, not said. They have received Letters of the 9th instant from their Envoys at *Munster*, giving them an account, That he had had Audience of that Bishop, who then told him, That he was very much obliged to the States General, for the good Offices and Mediation, which they offered him in the present conjuncture of affairs, that he was sorry he could not accept of them, till the Duke of *Wolfembutel* had drawn his forces out of *Hoxter*, that then he should very readily hearken to the Mediation of his friends, for the regulating his farther pretensions for Charges and Damages sustained through the Dukes refusal of yielding him the quiet possession of his rights, and this is all the answer he hath hitherto given this States Minister in that matter.
