THE following Address has been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Address from the Towns of Anstruther Easter and Anstruther Wester, Presented to His Majesty by Colonel Philip Anstruther, their Representative in Parliament; introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, One of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Vienna, April 29. On the 19th Instant the Count du Luc, Ambassadour of France, made his publick Entry here, which was not near so magnificent as that of the Venetian Ambassadours: His Livery was not splendid, he had but 4 Coaches with 6 Horses, 2 Doorkeepers on Horseback, 10 Pages, and 28 Footmen. On the 20th he had his Audience of the Emperour in Mourning. His Audiences of the three Empreesses are delayed till the Empreess Consort leave Childbed. On Occasion of the Archduke's Birth the Emperour has made several Promotions: Count Collnitz, Bishop of Waizen in Hungary, is declared Bishop of Vienna, and his former Bishoprick is given to Count Leslie. There have also been created several Grandees of Spain, Chamberlains and Privy-Counsellours. Directions are given for the forming of 9 different Camps in Hungary, betwixt the 10th and 20th of next Month, till the great Army assembles; and all the General Officers are ordered to be at their respective Camps within that time. The principal Camp is to be at Futach near Peterwaradin; and they are all so disposed, that they may soon be drawn together. The Empreess Consort, and the Archduke continue very well. On the 26th Instant the University of Vienna had a publick Audience of the Emperour, to make their Congratulation upon the Birth of the Archduke; to which the Emperour returned an Answer in Latin. That Afternoon Prince Eugene of Savoy took a Review of 10 Companies of the Regiment of Lorraine, which afterwards pursued their Journey to Hungary. The last Letters from Peterwaradin say all is quiet on the Turkish Frontiers.

Ratubon, April 30. The Dyet was assembled Yesterday on the Emperour's Demand of an Aid against the Turks; but tho' the States will doubtless comply with it, for which several are already instructed, no Resolution is

yet taken in Form. The Preparations in Hungary are carrying on, and the new Levies made in the Empire pass frequently by this Place down the Danube: The Rupture however is still uncertain, till the Return of the Courier last sent to M. Fleischman.

Dantzick, May 2. The Czar being recovered of his Indisposition was present on the 29th past at a great Entertainment given by the King of Poland to the Duke and Dutchess of Mecklenbourg. On the 30th his Czarish Majesty set out for Koningsberg. The King of Poland having appointed the Bishop of Cujavia and Field-Marshal Flemming to be his Plenipotentiaries, they are to go to Jaroslaw the Middle of this Month, in order to concert with the Deputies of the confederated Poles, the necessary Measures for holding a General Dyet at Warsaw the 15th of June.

Copenhagen, May 5. On the 1st Instant Rear-Admiral Kaas put to Sea with 6 Men of War and 2 Frigates, to fetch the rest of the Flotilla from Pomerania, and secure them from some Swedish Men of War which have appeared near Bornholm. Letters which came in Yesterday from Norway give an Account, that a Detachment of about 900 of the Swedes had been attacked at Mofs the 28th of last Month, by Detachments of the Garrisons of Friderickstadt and Fredericks-Hall, joyned by about 1000 Peasants, and was dislodged from thence with the Loss of 300 Men killed, and as many made Prisoners, among the latter Colonel Falckenberg, who died of his Wounds the Day after. This Action is the more advantageous to the Danes, because the Enemy's Magazine of Provisions was at Mofs. These Letters add, that the Swedes suffered by the Peasants of Norway, who were drawing together from all Parts of that Kingdom, and put to the Sword all that fell into their Hands.

Aberdeen, April 28. Last Night Lieutenant-General Cadogan arrived here from Inverness. He has received a Letter from Colonel Clayton, dated the 22d Instant, giving an Account that all the Rebels in the Isle of Skie had submitted to Mercy, and delivered up their Arms; and that Colonel Cholmeley was to sail on the 25th with his Detachment, for the other Islands; where the Rebels designed to make the like Submission. Sir Donald Macdonald has surrendered, and is to be sent to Fort-William
