ST. James's, May 18 The following Addreses have been presented to His Majesty.

An humble Adress of the Governour, Council, and General Assembly of the Island of Barbadoes. Presented to His Majesty by the Agents to the said Island, Introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Stanhope.

An humble Adress of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Burgeses of the Borough of Warwick, presented to His Majesty by William Colmore, Esq; one of the Representatives in Parliament for the said Borough, introduced by the Right Honourable James Stanhope, Esq; One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

An humble Adress of the Captain, Lieutenant, Ensign, &c. of the Associated Company of the Town and County of the Town of Nottingham. Presented to His Majesty by----- Plumptre, and George Gregory, Esqs; Members of Parliament, introduc'd by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Nottingham.

Which Adresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Lisbon, May 9 On the 2d Instant, at one a Clock in the Morning, the Queen of Portugal was brought to Bed of a Prince, who was presently Christened by the Name of Charles. Upon this Occasion we had Illuminations three Nights successively.

Vienna, May 9. On the 7th in the Morning the Emperour, attended by Prince Eugene of Savoy, and several other Ministers and Generals, took a Review of the three Regiments of Baden-Dourlach, young Lorraine, and Harrach; and afterwards saw two of the Vessels launched that are building here for the War in Hungary. In the Evening his Imperial Majesty went to Laxembourg-Castle, as is usual in this Season, and was followed yesterday by the Chanceries. He came back this Day, but will return thither to Morrow, and be here every Saturday and Sunday as long as the Empress is in Child-bed. Yesterday Count Herberstein, Marshal of the Court, was declared Captain of his Imperial Majesty's Horse-Guard, in the Room of Count Ulfeld lately deceased.

Ratisbon, May 14. We have Letters from the Frontiers of Hungary, which say that General Losselholz, Governour of Peterwaradin, had Orders from the Imperial Court, that if the Courier lately sent to Constantinople with the Emperour's last Offer of his Mediation, between the Port and the Venetians, should not come back to Peterwaradin by the 15th Instant at Midnight, he should then immediately dispatch an Express to Vienna, and the next Day send to Belgrade to declare War against the Port, as would afterwards be done at Vienna. He had also Orders to stop any Turkish Boats which should be sent up the River Save with Ammunition. But as these Directions were given before an Express from Sir Robert Sutton (the British Ambassadour at the Port) arrived at Vienna, 'tis likely they may have been changed, or at least delayed, on the Notice received by that Express of the Dispositions of the Turkish Court to accept the King of Great Britain's Mediation between them and the Venetians. On the 12th Instant Lieutenant-General Falkenstein, an Officer of Merit, and much esteemed by Prince Eugene, passed through this Place in his Way to Vienna, having particular Letters from the Prince to be there by the 16th Instant at furthest.

Dantzick, May 13, On the 10th Instant, the Czar, the King of Poland, the Lords and Ladies of both

Courts, and the foreign Ministers, were entertained some Hours on board the Russian Gallies; after which their Majesties parted; the Czar went and lay a League from hence, and the next Day proceeded on his Journey to Stetin: The Russian Troops and the Gallies are to continue here till further Order. Yesterday being the Birth-Day of the King of Poland, on which he entered the 46th Year of his Age, His Majesty received the Compliments of the Magistrates of this City, and of the foreign Ministers: There was a great Entertainment at Court, and afterwards a Ball. The Felt-Marshal Flemming, who was going to Berlin, being taken very ill on the Road, was brought back hither on the 10th.

Hamburgh, May 19. The Czar being arrived on the 16th Instant at Stetin, the King of Denmark will probably soon meet his Czarish Majesty, and 'tis now thought their Interview will be at Wismar.

Copenhagen, May 16. The Frigate called the White-Eagle arrived here on the 12th at Night, and has brought Advice, That the King of Sweden, notwithstanding all the Measures which the Danes had taken to surround his Troops, has found means to retire with his whole Army, without any Loss, by a Passage that was thought impracticable; and where, for that Reason, no Forces were placed. That King is now encamped at Fredericks-Hall, not far from the Frontiers of Sweden. The Squadron under the Command of Vice-Admiral Gabel, is expected to joyn Rear-Admiral Kaas, who continues at Elsinore. The Swedish Fleet was yesterday between Dornbusch and Meun. 'Tis supposed their principal Design is to prevent the Russian Fleet from joyning the Danes.

Edinburgh, May 11. Lieutenant General Cadogan designs to set out to morrow for London. The Dutch Troops remaining in this Country, are all ordered to march back into England.
