Ratisbon, May 14. We have Letters from the Frontiers of Hungary, which say that General Losselholtz, Governour of Peterwaradin, had Orders from the Imperial Court, that if the Courier lately, sent to Conferminally with the Hungary lately. Constantinople with the Emperour's last Offer of his Mediation, between the Port and the Venetians, should not come back to Peterwaradia by the 15th Instant at Midnight, he should then immediately dispatch an Express to Vienna, and the next Day send to Belgrade to declare War against the Port, as would afterwards be done at Vienna.
