THIS Day the following Address was presented to His Majesty.

To George, King of Great-Britain, &c.

The humble Address of the People called Quakers, from their yearly Meeting in London, the 26th Day of the 3d Month called May, 1716.

May it please the King,

WE thy faithful and peaceable Subjects, being met in this our annual Assembly, do hold our selves obliged, in Point of Principle and Gratitude, rather than by frequent and formal Addresses, humbly and openly to acknowledge the manifold Blessings and kind Providences of God which attended these Kingdoms ever since thy happy Accession to the Throne.

And as our Religion effectually enjoyns us Obedience to the supreme Authority, so it is with great Satisfaction that we pay it to a Prince whose Justice, Clemency and Moderation cannot but endear and firmly unite the Hearts and Affections of all his true Protestant Subjects.

We are therefore sorrowfully affected for the Unhappiness of those of our Country-men, who have so little Gratitude or Goodness as to be uneasy under so just and mild an Administration: Nor can we reflect on the late unjust and unnatural Rebellion, without concluding the Promoters thereof, and Actors therein, were Men insatuated and hurried by such an evil Spirit as would lay waste and destroy both the Civil and Religious Liberties of these Protestant Nations.

And as God, the Lord of Hosts, has most signally appeared to the contending that black Conspiracy, so we pray his good Providence may always attend the King's Councils and Undertakings, to the establishing his Throne in Righteousness and Peace, and making His-House a sure House.

Permit us therefore, great Prince, to lay hold of this Opportunity to approach thy Royal Presence with our hearty Thanks to the King, and His great Council, for all the Privileges and Liberties we enjoy.

To behold a Prince upon the Throne solicitous for the Ease and Happiness of his People beyond any other Views, to heightens our Satisfaction and Joy, that we want Words to express our full Sense thereof. And therefore we can do no less than assure the King, that as it is our Duty to demean our selves towards the King's Person and Government with all faithful Obedience, so we are determined, by Divine Assistance, devoutly and heartily to pray the God and Father of all our Mercies, to vouchsafe unto the King a long, peaceable and prosperous Reign; and that when it shall please the Almighty to remove from us so precious a Life, by taking it to himself, there may not want a Branch of thy Royal Family, endued with Wisdom and Vertue, to fill the Throne till Time shall be no more.

To which His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer.

I Thank you for the Assurances of Duty and Affection to my Person and Government, contained in this Address; and you may always depend upon my Protection.

All which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Vienna, May 27. Our Letters from Hungary relate, that the Courier dispatched to M. Fleishman, the Imperial Resident at Constantinople, for the final Resolution of the Port on the Emperor's Proposals, not being returned to Peterwaradin on the 15th Instant, General Loffelholz, pursuant to Orders sent him, has taken Possession of Mitrowitz, a small Town and Pass on the Save, in order to prevent the Turks from sending any more Ammunition or Provisions up that River. The said General immediately sent to acquaint the Bassa of Belgrade with what he had done, and that it was not intended for an Act of Hostility, but that it not being decided when the Limits were settling, to which Party that Place should belong, and the Turks having possessed it only by Connivance of this Court, the Emperor judged he had a Right to secure it till he should receive a favourable Resolution from the Port on his last Proposition. The Bassa answered, that he would send an Account of it to the Grand Signior, and that he supposed the Courier had been delayed by his Highness's Journey to Adrianople: In the mean while he continues to treat the Imperialists civilly.

Copenhagen, June 2. Letters from Norway dated the 27th past, which arrived Yesterday Morning, advise, that the Danish and Swedish Armies in that Kingdom were pretty near each other, the Danes being encamped between Moris and Frederickstad, and the Swedish Army lying almost in Sight of the latter Place, which they had also begun to invest. It being judged necessary to reinforce our Troops in that Kingdom, Vice-Admiral Gabel is, with his Squadron, actually taking on board 4000 Men in Jurland to transport them to Norway. The Swedish Fleet is retired to Carlscrona. On the 30th past Commodore Schindel, with three Men of War and as many Frigates, sailed from hence into the Baltick, in order to fetch home under his Convey the remaining Part of the Floilla from Pomerania. His Danish Majesty

jesty is expected here next Week. 'Tis said the Czar's Gallies are to come hither to be employed in a Descent on Schonen, and that the Czar himself will come and command in Person his own Troops which are to assist the Danes in that Enterprize.

Hambourg, June 5. On the 28th past the Czar and the King of Denmark had an Interview at a Place which they had chosen in the Suburbs of this City for that Purpose. Both their Majesties, and their Ministers, had frequent Conferences the following Days; and on the 3d Instant they parted, the Czar to go to Pymont, the King of Denmark to Pinnenberg, in order to be at Gottorp to Night, and at Copenhagen on the 8th Instant; where his Danish Majesty will hasten the necessary Dispositions for the intended Descent on Schonen. 'Tis reported that the said two Princes have resolv'd to employ above 20000 Men each in that Descent; and that the Russian Gallies, 48 in Number, which sail'd from Dantzick on the 28th past, are to transport to Zealand as well the Troops they have on board, as others which are now in the Country of Meklenbourg.

Hague, June 9. On the 1st Instant M. Heems, his Imperial Majesty's Envoy, gave an Entertainment, and made Rejoycings for the Birth of the Archduke Leopold, and the like were continued the two following Days. He had caus'd a kind of Dome to be built before his House, adorned with Paintings and Inscriptions, on the top of which, Statues were placed that spouted Wine to the People: A great Hall was built in his Garden, in which were three Tables, where the Deputies of the States, the foreign Ministers and other Persons of Distinction, were nobly entertained, to the Number of 64 Persons: The Healths of the Imperial Family were drank at the sound of Drums, Trumpets and other Musick; several small Pieces of Cannon placed in the Garden fired at the same Time; and every Night there were Bulls, Maquerades, and Fire-works. The Marquis de Prie is shortly expected here from Vienna, to treat with the States-General about some Alterations which the Inhabitants of the Austrian Netherlands are desirous should be made in the 17th and separate Articles of the Barrier-Treaty. Yesterday Mr. Horatio Walpole, the British Plenipotentiary, and M. Klingraef, the Hanoverian Minister, gave a very magnificent Entertainment on Occasion of His Britannick Majesty's Birth-day, at which the chief Members of the States-General, and all the foreign Ministers were present, to the Number of 40.

St. James's, May 31. This Day Count Gyllembourg, Minister from the King of Sweden, had a private Audience of His Majesty, to notify the Death of the Queen Grandmother of Sweden. He was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterell Master of the Ceremonies.

He had afterwards private Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, in their respective Apartments, to both which he was conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.
